Jaycees Stage Successful Dorval Day Celebrations

Last Saturday, the City of Dorval celebrated the fourth anniversary of its becoming a city. The program of events included opening ceremonies, a parade, and the crowning of the Queen of Dorval.

The coolness of the day did nothing to hamper the ceremonies which were well attended. At the opening, the crowd was addressed by Bill Milson president of the local Jaycees and Mayor John Pratt said: "We celebrate Dorval Day to show people the workings of their community and to bring out in them an esprit de corps resulting in identification and pride in their community."

"We are anxious to attract trade and commerce to Dorval to further its physical and financial growth."
Activities at the City Hall included the crowning of the Queen of Dorval. Judges for this event were Jimmy Tapp, radio and television star, Dorval alderman Mitch Bourke, Mrs. Dorothy Dow, Mr. Alan Capel, and Mr. M. Gilbert. Six contestants were vying for the title and they were sponsored by local community associations. Sandra Neal, the 100 club representative was the winner and was crowned by Mayor Pratt. Last year's Queen, Gail Allard presented the new Queen with a bouquet of flowers.

The scene then shifted to the half-mile long parade with Miss Dorval at the head and her five escorts, the other contestants. The parade consisted of various floats bands and marching detachments from local associations, over fifty units in all, included in the parade was Dorval Civil Defence Unit under the leadership of Air-Vice Marshall Alan Ferrier, its co-ordinator.

At the termination point, the Dorval Shopping centre, Miss Dorval was presented with gifts from the merchants in the Centre. A civil defence display was given on the south lot along with a demonstration of disaster control by the Dominion Bridge Sissater unit.

Later in the afternoon, a reception was held in honour of Miss Dorval. Working behind the scenes to make Dorval Day a success was alderman Mitch Bourke, Chief of Police, A.R. Noel and the entire Dorval Police Department. Working along with these officials were the Jaycees Dorval Day Committee composed of Chairman Ed Van der Wee, Doug Duncan, Norm Robinson, Phil Tolcher, Jack Baird, Everett Alexander, Peter Romer and others.

Pratt Questions Airport CD Setup

Mayor John Pratt, MP, has been told by Federal Transport Minister George Hees that Civil Defence plans based on dispersal of vital functions, are being made for Montreal Airport at Dorval.

Answering questions posed in a letter from Dorval's Mayor, Mr. Hees added: "However, since the over-all matter of Civil Defence for the Dorval and Montreal areas is still under consideration, final plans of my department are not possible at this time."

Answering other questions from Mr. Pratt, Defence Minister George Pearkes replied that it was not possible "at the present time" to give more detailed information.

"I wish to assure you, however, that in planning for their new role regarding Civil Defence, the Canadian Armed Forces will consider the importance of establishments such as you mention and make the

necessary recommendation".
Health Minister Waldo Smith said protection of the airport was the responsibility of the Department of Transport "since it is charged with its administration".

FIREWORKS DISPLAY DISAPPOINTMENT TO ALL

Dorval Day ended with a bang Saturday night at St. Charles Park. All set for a mammoth fireworks display by the senior Chamber of Commerce, quite a crowd turned out, despite the cold, threatening clouds and earlier rain.

Up went the first colored lights, then another and another. Then something went wrong. A rocket misfired, sparked two large boxes of fireworks and the whole lot went up in smoke and bangs.

According to police no-one was hurt.

CN Request Early Closing Of Lachine Run

Approximately \$200,000 could be saved by the CNR if it closed its Dorval-Lachine-Montreal service Aug 1 instead of at the end of 1960.

Giving evidence at hearings into a joint application with the CPR to boost commuter fares by an average of 37 per cent, the company asked permission of the Board of Transport Commissioners to make the earlier closing.

Lachine counsel, Jacques Viau, QC and Leonard Seton, expressed surprise at the CNR request.

J.W. Macdonnell, for the CNR, said the Board had granted the company the right to suspend service after it removes its tracks from Lachine to an area above and parallel to the CPR line beside Metropolitan boulevard.

This scheme is a multi-million dollar one planned by both rail companies in co-operation with Lachine, it calls for eliminating rail crossings and building grade separations. It will also mean that commuters in Lachine - numbering

up to 800 - will have to use the CPR or find other means to get to and from Montreal.

It was claimed by Mr. Seton that the application appeared to be a "by-product" of the railways' earlier application to remove tracks, and would leave commuters without any alternate, comparable service.

He said the CPR line only skirts the edge of Lachine, maintains no real stations, and does not go through the built-up area.

Mr. Macdonnell replied that it should not be a surprise to anyone as it had been on the records before the Board since 1955. It was found that a loss of \$200,000 a year far outweighed the service rendered to commuters.

It was the railway's duty to mitigate its losses and there was adequate time for Lachine to make alternate plans for commuters before Aug. 1 by negotiation with the MTC and the CPR.

John Pratt Reports From Ottawa

We have received a petition signed by scores of members of the Montreal Lakeshore University Women's Club Branch of the Canadian Association of Consumers. The petition reads as follows:-

"The undersigned members of the Montreal Lakeshore University Women's Club do hereby declare our opposition to the use of Trading Stamps in our Canadian merchandising system.

"Trading Stamps constitute an added expense and inconvenience for customers while adding nothing in value or service to the merchandise purchased with our consumer dollar.

"It is our understanding that the intent of certain provisions in the Criminal Code is to prevent their use in Canada.

"Therefore, we request that the Criminal Code be amended to ensure that it can be adequately enforced."

There is a strong, rising tide of opposition to the use of these stamps and it might be very good public relations for the companies concerned to drop the whole matter before it becomes embarrassing.

A constant source of irritation to parliament is the number of letters received from constituents asking the member to use his influence in getting them jobs with the Civil Service. Apparently, there are still hundreds of people who do not seem to realize that the whole purpose of the Civil Service is to put such jobs beyond the reach of political influence. We have even received requests from people, who realized they were not capable of passing Civil Service examinations, suggesting that we arrange for them to bypass this unpleasant barrier to their obtaining a job. We sincerely hope that all who read this will appreciate the fact that the Civil Service is beyond the influence of a member of parliament and that, in the long run, this is for the good of everyone.

It is reported that Governor-General Vincent Massey will head a movement aimed at beautifying every corner of Canada for this Country's 100th Birthday in 1967. It is profoundly to be hoped that this movement will help stir Canadians out of their apathy towards the gradual degradation of our beautiful country-side by sheds, hot-dog stands, and other hideous commercial outcroppings.

A recent newspaper article states that Britons laugh quicker than

Americans. This was a fact that was of particular interest when we had the opportunity during the late war to entertain Britons, Americans and other races in many places from Korea to Berlin. Apparently the British have a larger vocabulary of things that cause laughter, whereas the Americans have a limited field in this respect. We have often wondered whether this might be due to the fact that Britons went out to the world during the last two centuries, whereas in America the world came to them. In any case, it is an interesting point and open to a great many arguments on both sides.

This will be one of nearly two hundred Road-e-os which are conducted at this time of the year by Jaycees in cities and towns across the Dominion.

When contacted, the local Road-e-o Chairman, Hal Lilly stated that the Road-e-o would start sharp at 10:00 a.m. Saturday morning with the written examinations being taken in the Dorval Gardens Elementary School and the Driving Test taking place in the south lot of the Shopping Centre. "Teen Agers can obtain entry forms at all the High Schools along the Lakeshore as well as at the Lachine-Dorval Y.M.C.A. and Steve's Place" in the Dorval Gardens Shopping Centre", he said.

The Jaycees are receiving valued assistance from the Lachine Auto Timing Association, a group of young auto enthusiasts in the Lachine area.

Strathmore United Men's Club Charter Night

Strathmore United Church Men's Club held its Charter Night on Tuesday, May 19th, in the church hall.

The Charter was presented by the Valois United Church Men's Club, represented by Wm. Dunn, President and Wm. Heatley, Past President of the Lakeshore Council. About 75 men attended, including delegations from St. James United Church, Chateaugay United Church, Cedar Park United Church, Pointe Claire, Valois United Church.

Roger Flumerfelt, Assistant District Manager, London Life, St. James Street, Montreal, was the guest speaker. Mr. Flumerfelt said that the United Church Men's Clubs were the fastest growing men's organizations in Canada. The first Clubs were organized in 1925 in

western Canada. Similar groups in the east were organized with the United Church Board of Men in 1956 to create a national linkage. It coordinated the operations of all laymen activities in the churches across Canada.

He said that memberships have increased at the rate of two clubs a week. There are now approximately 775 clubs across Canada with a total membership of 40,000. He predicted that within 10 years the membership would rise to 150,000.

He said the objectives were to broaden the fellowship of both the members and the adherents of the church, to increase the spiritual life of its members and to assist the church as a great manpower pool in its undertakings.

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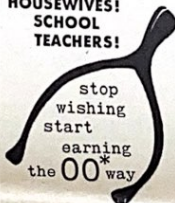
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Moonlight Cruise Sponsored By P.C. Association

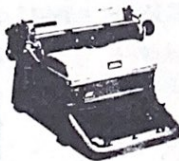
Our Junior "B" team the Dorval Builders Supplies Ltd. opened their schedule last Monday evening against the powerful Lachine Tigers. The local boys played a good game until the fourth inning when the lack of practices started showing up. A few costly errors and their weakness at bat, both things that could have been corrected with proper training facilities, caused their defeat. It will take a few games to get their eyes back at the plate but it will come. We can look forward to good baseball in that league.

The Little League players auction took place last Thursday 21st. As usual a lot of action took place with the coaches trying to outbid the opponents for such and such a player but as usual everything was conducted in the best sportsmanship spirit and ended after a few hours of hard business deals. It seemed that the coaches have done a good scouting job. Many players were paid a lot of points and on the other hand some teams will have a lot of good players on their rosters. For those not familiar with the auction system used in Little League here is how it works: Each team is allotted 36000 points; each team must be formed of fifteen players their total cost must not be over the 36000 points limit. Players who played last year can be retained by the same team for an option price of 500 points but all released and new candidates are on the auction block for the highest bidder and believe me some cost a lot of points for some teams. The reason for that system is that a team cannot be packed with the best players, each team has fair chances to get good players and complete the roster with players with less capacity and it is up to the coaching staff to develop these players the best they can. Each team cannot have less than four 10 years old or under players and not more than 6 players of 12 years of age. The normal roster is formed of 6, 12 years old, 5, 11 years old and 4, 10 years old or under. It helps the boys to gradually take a most important part in Little League. At the beginning he will most likely play one or two innings in the outfield and be replaced by another young player or he may play a full game and sit on the bench the next one, it all depends on how the coaches are playing their team, and there the parents support is needed the most to help the coaches, if their boy didn't get in the game. Go see the coach and find out when your boy will be playing. 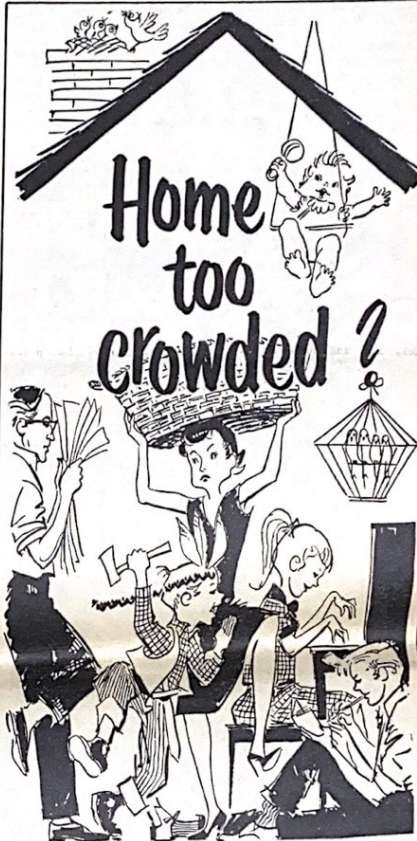
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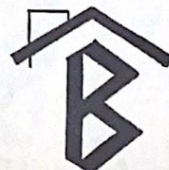

Warning Given re Abandoned Ice Boxes

Canadian manufacturers of refrigerators are advancing this year's campaign to guard against possibilities of children becoming trapped in discarded ice boxes and refrigerators.

"We know we can help to control this situation," said R. A. Phillips, chairman of CEMA Household Refrigeration Section. "The wonderful co-operation of Canadian newspapers has had a noticeable effect in reducing this type of fatality as the warm season draws on. It seems as if such deaths occur most frequently in the early spring months before Canadians are aware of this problem."

Mr. Phillips said there are some three-and-a-half million ice boxes and refrigerators in use in Canada today, with about one hundred thousand old units discarded each year -- units that are often left lying in summer camps, back yards, porches, basements and garages.

Working individually and through the Canadian Electrical Manufacturers Association, manufacturers are working to ensure that appliance servicemen and purchasers of new refrigerators remove doors, lids and latches from old cabinets before discarding them. Precautionary measures include reminders to dealers, and warning stickers which are placed inside new Canadian refrigerators.

CEMA started on this annual warning program some six years ago, as a result of a number of deaths of small children suffocated by being locked in a variety of airtight containers casually discarded. Deeply concerned about the problem, the refrigerator manufacturers took the lead in inform-

ing the public of safety measures which could help to eradicate such hazards.

These tips were given on how the cabinets can be made harmless:

- 1- Remove the door. Even with the latch removed, many freezer cabinets of the chest type have lids too heavy for a trapped child to lift.
- 2- Remove latch stops so the door can't lock. This you can do, usually, by removing four screws.
- 3- Drill holes in the cabinet and remove the rubber gasket around the door.

"While there have been comparatively few deaths from this cause," Mr. Phillips said, "we must nevertheless be on guard against the danger involved. If, by taking these simple precautions, we can save the life of one child, we will be amply repaid for our efforts."
