The forest service has a major fuel reduction plan for our area in progress because we have been identified as a high value of resources and assets with about a total of 360 homes. Actions to mitigate threat include thinning, burning, and grazing 61,000 acres with responsibility on state, county, USFS, and private landowners. Costs for all programs is

Welcome back! Our summer season has officially begun. It has been quiet and uneventful. The day time temps are about 75 degrees and nights about 45 degrees. Every day does come with a HIGH FIRE WEATHER WATCH, so we are still asking everyone to clean their lots.

We have the flat bed dump truck available on the mountain now. Please call John Miller 435-682-2712 or the Fire Station 435-682-2700 or Don Carle 435-682-2805 for availability and pricing. Don't forget to fill out your time so the dept can get credit for the in kind money for our grants. Forms are available at the Fire Dept.

Our 5 Ton water truck is almost ready. We have the pump (thank you Mammoth Creek Home Owner Association) and it is currently being installed. It should be ready for use in about 1 ½ weeks.

Reminder: ice is available at the Fire Station with a donation of \$1.00 per bag; we greatly appreciate it as these funds allow us to purchase some of the equipment that the station needs.

As we wrote about before, there will be 2 CPR classes in August, dates still unknown. One class is for the fire fighters only and one class is for the public. These classes are limited to 18 people. Without a date, I know it is hard to commit; but, if you are interested, please let us know because space is limited.

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\$30 million which would include newer equipment for our fire station, training, and public education and outreach. The state of Utah also has a catastrophic wildfire reduction strategy plan in force from the Governor, Gary Herbert. Our community is named in the plan with acres to be treated as 41,000 and with a cost of action \$29.7 million. Same money as above.

The next speaker was Mike Hadley from the Utah Division of Wildlife Resources who talked about our creek and native fish to Mammoth Creek and its tributaries. The native trout for our stream is the Bonneville Cutthroat Trout. To prevent them from being listed under the endangered species act, they are proposing to restore them to the Mammoth drainage. To do so, they have to remove Brook Trout from the upper tributaries with a chemical upstream and another chemical downstream to deactivate it so the trout below the springs would not be affected.

With our guest speakers done, we started our meeting with Julia Hodson reading the minutes from the last meeting. Bill Luthy gave our treasurers report, and a report from Fire Chief John Miller on our fire and the burn dump. The burn dump has new signs on the gate and 200 foot of new fence put up by John Miller, Larry Hughes, Brian Lundberg, and Dick West. The signs states who is allowed to dump and how to pay if not a member of MCHOA, who has an agreement with the forest service to maintain the dump. The fence is to stop four wheeler traffic per the forest service.

It was brought up that when we had our fire, people on the mountain needed keys to the fire station to access the equipment inside. If you want access to emergency equipment and fire trucks, become a volunteer fireman and get the training. It was also brought up that people need access to the Automated External Defibrillator (AED) for heart attack victims. Once again, get the training and

become certified! It was stated at the fire station in Duck Creek, an AED is outside for residents to use. We checked. The units are put up under lock and key. The only people with keys are trained and certified to use the equipment. Please check your facts.

As I am on the fire board also, I see the tax money from the county. The money we get from all the taxes we pay to run our fire department is \$40,000 per year. That's why as home owners and MCHOA, we do as much as we can to help, such as buying the food for the fire department fund raiser and pumps and tanks for our trucks. Some people think their tax dollars allow them access to all the fire equipment. This just isn't true.

We are going to have a CPR class this summer at the fire station for residents. John will comment in his article.

The members voted to have 2 construction dumpsters on the 4th of July weekend for everyone to get rid of extra things around your cabin. MCHOA will pay the cost for these dumpsters.

The question was asked if we had a trailer to rent for lot clean up consisting of burnable fuels. We have better than that. The John Miller and Don Carl have a dump truck. For \$100 a day, they will bring you the truck, you load it, you call when it's full, they will come get it, dump it, and bring it back. This is as many times a day as you can load it. Great value.

At the meeting after my last column about some lots and cabins that were not being kept in a fire safe condition, it was voted on for me to go to the county about possibly writing an ordinance. Well guess what? There is already a law on the books. You can contact the fire chief. He will look at the problem, contact the county attorney and he will address the issue. Or you can contact the county attorney yourself. His name is Barry. His number is (435) 676-1107.

When we bought our street signs last year for \$12000, we voted to have our fire department put them up and in turn spent \$4000 on a water tank for our new truck as payment. The truck is ready with a new 2000 gallon tank, but no way to spray water, so our MCHOA members voted to spend \$5000 to put a pumping system on the back of the truck. Good job guys!

Once again you hear "Why belong to MCHOA?" In the last 6 years your board has spent your money on: lot signs for members \$10,500; culverts for all of our roads \$9,000; equipment for the chief's truck \$3,200; canopy for the fire station so fire trucks can come out in winter \$3,800; street signs so emergency responders can find us \$12,000; stop sign and speed limit sign \$1,400; water tank for new truck \$4,000; dumpsters for major holidays \$2,000; new pump and hoses for new truck \$5,000; new 4'x10' map for fire station with all streets and lots \$1,000; and, new signs and fences \$500 for the burn area. You should all be proud of what your \$50 per year in VOLUNTARY MCHOA dues has accomplished!!

Forest Service Comments on Fish Kill

At the MCHOA meeting, Mike Golden of the Forest Service talked about the fish kill needed to prepare for restoring native cutthroat trout to Mammoth Creek. Here is how they will neutralize the poison used before it will reach our area:

Potassium permanganate will break down the rotenone mixture to the point where it is not effective within approximately 0.25 miles downstream from where the potassium permanganate is applied. There are two potential areas where potassium permanganate would be applied under the current tentative plan:

- 1) At a fish barrier that has not been constructed, nor has the location been determined, other than somewhere upstream from Mammoth Springs.
 - 2) Near the confluence of the Reed Valley and/or Dead Lake tributaries with Mammoth Creek.

Mammoth Springs is about 0.4 miles upstream from our community and the tributaries are 0.8 miles to over a mile upstream from your community, so Mike would not expect there to be any impact to the fish population through our community under the current tentative plan for chemical application and neutralization. UDWR uses sentinel fish to make sure the chemical is being deactivated downstream from the target area (which would be those to tributaries listed above and the area above the fish barrier under the tentative plan) and usually has a backup station to deploy additional neutralizer if necessary.
