Holy Week 2021

This installment of Weekly Connections will likely reach you in Holy Week. On Palm Sunday, Christians all over the world begin to slow down and contemplate on the death and resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ. This week is not like other weeks. Holy Week brings with it the true depth of God's love for the world.

PalmSunday

The beginning of Holy Week is marked by Jesus' triumphal entry into Jerusalem on a donkey. John 12 says that the crowds cut palm branches from the trees and shouted, "Hosanna!" 1 Kings 1:33-35 connects the riding of a donkey with a king. Palm branches have a history and symbolism of the desire for the people to be free of tyranny. Jesus liberates us from the tyranny of sin, death, and the devil.

MaundyThursday

Maundy Thursday is taken from the Latin word, *mandatum*, which means mandate or command. Jesus commanded the disciples in John 13:34-35 that they should love one another. Maundy Thursday is connected closely with foot washing, as Jesus washed the disciples' feet, and with the institution of the Lord's Supper.

600dFriday

The question I get nearly every year is, "Why do we call it *good* Friday if Jesus died that day?" True, this is the day that Christians set aside as a solemn day recalling Jesus' suffering and his death on the cross as recoded in John 18-19. While we know that Jesus rose from the dead, Good Friday is a time to ponder how the Lord took on our sins. Good Friday is good because it shows us that Jesus was willing to lay down his life for all people.

EasterSunday

The Resurrection of Our Lord is the most joyous of all our celebrations. Jesus has been raised from the dead! We proclaim, *Alleluia*! He is risen! He has risen, indeed. *Alleluia*! Easter means that nothing can separate us from God's love for us in Jesus Christ, not even death (Romans 8). Easter is not just one day but an entire season that lasts 50 days in the church, ending with the festival of Pentecost.

Ministry Areas in Action




During the winter quarter, both in-person and online worship continued. An exception to this pattern was the week that the severe winter storm hit Texas. Sunday February 14 in-person worship was canceled, but a skeleton crew managed to rec-

ord an online worship service. By Ash Wednesday on February 17, an even smaller crew fought the sporadic electricity and recorded a service. A blessing this quarter was the addition of new assisting ministers including Julia Fojt and Emma & Teena Davis. Monthly "Communion in Cars" took place. Both afternoon and evening Lenten services were held during the five weeks of Lent. March ended with *Hosannas* and Palm Sunday.



The challenge of teaching and learning in a pandemic time continued throughout winter quarter. Our Wednesday night GIFT program resumed meeting each week with just a few exceptions (winter storm, spring break, Holy Week). The pandemic modifications for spacing and meals remained in place. Our camper list was finalized with seven campers and Pastor Chris registered and paid. Teena Davis offered to plan









During the past quarter, David & Kristine Schroeder, with help from our members and others, provided a meal for the homebound or elderly as a "Neighbors Helping Neighbors" function in memory of Evie Kollous. Behind

the scenes, we resumed our monthly support of the breakfast meal at the Methodist Church in conjunction with Food Pantry Day. One group of domino players began meeting occasionally for a game, cautiously canceling the event when needed. Our Soup Ministry kept delivering homemade chicken noodle soup to those in need of healing. Our Hospitality Team helped with GIFT meals and planned receptions for spring. Hospitality also worked many hours sorting and reloading the many plates, pots, and utensils that were in storage during the kitchen project.



A primary mission of our Witness Ministry remains the streaming of weekly services on our Shiner Lutheran Facebook Page. This was most valuable during the week of the severe winter storm. In January, Church Council affirmed that the purpose of our Shiner Lutheran Facebook Page is to

Ministries Areas in Action



We are blessed that the severe winter storm did not result in any major repair issues for our facility. During the past months, the kitchen project made great progress. Following the work by Michael Pokluda Construction, Brian Pokluda donated much time and effort installing the backsplash and completing finish work throughout the kitchen. Many donations of materials and money supported this project. The Property Team scheduled Landscape Clean up Days in February and March. Because of the severe freeze and massive leaf drop, volunteers worked both days of the cleanup with additional work to follow. Both landscape and lawn are maintained by volunteers. Another facility issue has been our internet connection in the sanctuary. After much research and discussion, we

should see a new internet drop into the building along with hardwiring both the office and access points to provide quality wireless internet service through our facility. A few donations have even been received to help cover some of this expense. The Support Mission Group discussed the ongoing need to update our 1992 constitution and bylaws. Tammy

Guettner, Sandra Blum, Shannon Blaschke and Sharon Jaks all agreed to continue the work begun by Hóward Stridde and try to get the document submitted for approval in September. The Mutual Ministry Team met in support of Pastor Chris during March. The scholarship application deadline has passed and Scholarship and Endowment Committees will be meeting to discuss funding and awarding of scholarships.

Administration & Finance



Some members have not yet returned to in-person activities Offering and have not picked up their Envelopes 2021 envelopes. As part of maintaining active membership, a contribution of record is needed. Offering envelopes help the

financial secretary record these contributions. Envelopes may be picked up in the Gathering place; After Easter, we will mail or deliver the envelopes if members have been unable to pick them up.



January Noisy Offering of \$104.10 was put in the Camper Fund. In February, \$120.55 was sent to the Texas Severe Storm Fund thru Lutheran Disaster Response. The March Noisy Offering was desig-

nated for youth. Since 2021 camp expenses have already been met, the March offering was set aside for youth attending the 2022 National Youth Gathering in Minneapolis. Loose change (or bills) are gathered as a special Noisy Offering on the last Sunday of the month for special mission work. Faith formation is supported through camping and youth gathering participation.



According to the REPORT dictionary, a budget is "an estimate of income and expenditure for a period of

time." For our congregation, a budget team pro-

poses a budget for the calendar year that must be approved at the annual meeting.

As of the end of February 2021, our expenses tracked at 1% less than the budget had estimated, so we are in line with the plan. By far the greatest portion of our budget goes to pay our pastor, staff, utilities, etc. and then fund our ministries. We continue to list the building loan as a separate budget item, but it is also monthly expense that must be paid. Our facility, as well as our debt, belongs to the congregation. Of our total budget, only about 3.5% is sent out to support the greater church in our local conference and synod.

Estimating income is more complex. As a congregation that does not use pledges to estimate church income, we courageously trust faithful giving. Recurrent giving that occurs regardless of attendance has been our mainstay. Monthly giving and electronic giving tend to be recurrent. Some members have also begun sending recurrent or special gifts to the church directly from their tax sheltered retirement funds, a process that eliminates taxes on their withdrawals. Even with that faithful giving, our weekly offerings vary widely. This has always been true—giving to the church varies by weeks and by seasons. Often finances may look dim until end of year giving or special gifts appear. We try to be good stewards in spending, but also have trust in faithful generosity as we move forward living out our mission.



Planned legacy giving enables churches and non-profit organizations to continue to exist, despite the uncertainties of offerings and donations. Such gifts have come to our congregation throughout the past, either in monetary funds or by means of oil leases. Our congregation, unbeknownst to us, was listed as one of the beneficiaries of the John and Elda Fritsche Charitable Trust. Both John and Elda have passed away and funds from

the trust will be distributed over the next few years. The Fritsches were not members here, but Elda worshipped with us and later was treated as "one of our own" through our nursing home ministry at SNRC. The total amount of this gift will not be known until all trust funds are dispersed. Any amounts received will be set aside until our Finance Team and Council review our policy on bequests. We are thankful for this blessing that will help us continue our ministry and mission.

Ways to Serve or Give



Our congregation has traditionally functioned with faithful volunteers who tend to the altar and chancel area—candles, communion preparation, altar paraments, banners, liturgical decorations etc. We are grateful to all who have graciously served, but realize much responsibility sometimes has fallen upon just a few people. In the coming months we will be working to restructure this area of ministry into an Altar Guild. This would help share the responsibility and joy of serving among a trained group of people. Pastor Chris and Gemayel Heinold will be working on this project. Who should serve on Altar Guild? Baptized, worshiping, communing Christians who are filled with gratitude and are called to serve with a sense of joy, praise and reverence for our worship space, liturgy, and the people of God. Please

prayerfully consider if serving on Altar Guild would be one way you could serve God and his people.



Another way to serve is by participating as a worship leader. Ushers, greeters, and gift bearers (usually families with children) are needed for each worship service. Young people serve as acolytes. Older youth can choose to lector, and we recently WORSHIP LEADERS added some high school aged youth who have volunteered to be assisting ministers. Training and support will be provided for these leadership position; talk to

pastor or call the office if you are interested. For our musicians, we hope to welcome new members in choiand hand chimes when those groups restart in late summer. For those with technology aptitude, we have a critical need for sound and video technicians. Our volunteers here are doing a terrific job—but we rely on just a few people to handle all the worship services and facilitate online streaming. Prayerfully consider if you can volunteer to help as a leader to enable others to worship and praise God.

- Bring nonperishable food to our little red wagon in the Gathering Place. These donated items will go to the Shiner Community Food Bank.

- Support faith formation by donating towards Vacation Bible School expense or GIFT.
- Donate & dedicate flowers for Sunday worship. Sign up for future dates in the office.
