How exactly do you narrow down where to go and how long to stay?



Union Square, Lombard




Street and, of course, the Golden Gate Bridge. For a unique perspective, walk or rent a bike to cross the bridge then return via ferry past historic Alcatraz Island.

WalletHub ranked San Francisco as the country's fourth best food city, and this is not the place to hold back on restaurant selection. Local chefs focus on organic, local and sustainable food sources and the city is home to six Michelin-starred restaurants. Three-star Atelier Crenn offers multi-course pescatarian experiences known for their artistry. The restaurant's curated wine list enhances the experience with regional character.

Just north of San Francisco is Napa Valley, home to some of the world's best wineries. A wine tour is the best way to explore the area's many vineyards and savor tastings of different varietals.

Traveling through the fertile Sacramento Valley brings you to the splendor of Lake Tahoe.
This alpine scenery of rocky



outcrops, evergreen pines and shockingly blue waters is truly a unique sight. A cruise on the lake's pristine waters is an ideal way to appreciate this dynamic landscape.

WONDERS ABOUND

When there are so many famous man-made attractions to see, it's easy to forget just how incredible the landscape itself is. California is the third largest state in the U.S.—only Alaska and Texas are larger—and the geographical diversity is simply astounding. It's a state of beautiful dichotomy: barren deserts and breezy beaches, massive rocky mountains and picturesque wine-growing valleys, dense forests and waving palm trees.

There are 28 national parks in California, which preserve dramatically different features. In fact, California national parks are home to both the lowest and highest places in the continental U.S.



Death Valley National Park

(one of three UNESCO World Heritage sites in California) is a desolate desert, but it's a shockingly scenic one. The iconic undulating vistas of Zabriskie Point were shaped by the powerful forces of water and are now a lingering testament to its absence.

While it's stunning, it's also just downright hot, so lunchtime at the nearby (and aptly named) Oasis at Death Valley is key. The 1849 Restaurant is on theme with its dark leather, Wild West-style furnishings.

After you've hydrated and refueled, head about 20

minutes south to get to the lowest place in the U.S. At 282 feet below sea level, the park's Badwater Basin is an expansive salt flat that was once an inland lake.

A little more than 100 miles away, Mount Whitney stands 14,494 feet above sea level as the towering Eastern border of Sequoia National Park.

Southern California may be home to many famous stars, but this popular park—which welcomes more than a million visitors each year—is home to some famous trees. The park's giant sequoia trees are among the oldest living things on the planet; one is 3,000 years old.



The General Sherman Tree is the largest tree in the world with a 36-foot diameter at its base and height of 275 feetthat's nearly an entire football field tall! Here you will also find the Tunnel Log, a unique drive-through tree.



Yosemite National Park is

one of the country's most famed and popular national parks. Visitors come from around the world to see Yosemite's waterfalls, granite cliffs and diverse wildlife. Hiking, cycling and horseback riding trails take visitors along rivers, through meadows and on mountains. Photographs can't do justice to the beauty and splendor of the park's popular landmarks, including Half Dome, Mirror Lake, Glacier Point and Yosemite Falls.
