TREASURERS REPORT Through the end of November:

We are still doing very well financially this year and are under budget in most expense categories. In total we are under budget by about \$22,400 up through the end of November. Subtracting about \$11,000 in checks that have yet to clear, and barring any surprises, we still should finish the year about \$11,400 under budget. Our operating cash less current liabilities stands at about \$79,000, which will be a nice cushion to carry over into the new year.

LANDSCAPING NOTES

Happy New Year to All. May 2021 bring us all health, safety and happiness.

Leaves are down and gone and our next project is tree trimming. Ryan Garrison, our arborist, is scheduled to be here in early January to trim all of our large trees. He is dedicated to keeping our large trees in the best shape possible to help ensure their continued good health and

longevity. We appreciate his hard work. Our Waldron crew will begin to trim the smaller trees and prepare them for their spring budding and growth. The birch trees that are located around the community have again been infected with birch bore disease and at the end of December we had them treated. The treatment involves boring into the ground around the drip line and injecting treatment to be taken up into the tree. This will probably need to be a yearly treatment as this disease is a continuous problem.

The conversion project to change the spray shrub irrigation to drip has progressed better than expected. The first two sections completed are as follows: Houses-100-104 S Temelec Cir. and 110-114 St James Dr This included 69 Plants, 26 sprinklers heads and 7 Beds. The second section included 118,122, 126,130, 138 St James Dr. This included 85 Plants, 39 sprinkler heads and 12 Beds. The work came in under the \$3500. Max that we allocated. This information will be shared with the Board and additional work will be discussed. We will keep everyone informed about the progress of this project.

As we are hoping for continued rain, the irrigation is currently turned off but we will keep an eye on the status of our lawns and plants and decide on a weekly basis our water needs. Let us pray for more rain. The whole area needs it!

GOING ELECTRIC AND SOLAR

by Leighton and Lynda Richardson Introduction: Energy conservation and greenhouse gas reduction are the future. Electric cars and solar energy are the means to get there. After being first day reservation holders and waiting about two years, we took delivery of our Deep Blue Metallic Tesla Model 3 in September of 2018. We had waited for the Performance version and purchased all available options, including dual motor all-wheel drive, enhanced autopilot and full self-driving. The performance model has about 450+ HP, 470+ ft-lbs torque, does 0-60 MPH in 3.2 secs, has a top speed of 160+ MPH and 310 mile range when fully charged. Over the past two years we have logged about 22,000 miles, making multiple long-distance trips to Bend, Anacortes, Port Townsend, the Olympic Peninsula, down the west coast on Hwy 101, Sedona, the Grand Canyon and Joshua Tree. The Tesla Supercharger network is not only extensive, the chargers are well placed for any road trip. There are also chargers available through

other networks, such as ChargePoint Electrify America.

Having owned Mercedes, BMW, Volvo, Ford and Citroen, the Tesla is hands down the best car we've ever owned. We love the quiet ride, the 15" touchscreen, the fabulous onboard maps and navigation system, the minimalistic interior, the advanced self-driving technology (forward radar, 12 ultrasonic sensor and 8 cameras) as well as the security system which tracks events both underway and while parked. So far, we have had zero maintenance costs and we thoroughly enjoy the car. By the way, not only does it handle like a sports car, it's a lightning FAST!

To reduce our carbon footprint, further embrace green technology and have a back-up for the PG&E euphemism "Public Safety Power Shutoffs" (PSPS), we have also installed a 5.04 kW solar array with a Powerwall battery backup. The installation was done in two phases, first with a 2.52 kW solar array and then a second phase which increased the solar array to 5.04 kW and added the Powerwall. Once the permitting and paperwork were completed, the actual installations were quite efficient. We are now energy selfsufficient on most days with solar energy to run our home, power our needs during a PSPS, and charge the Tesla from a 220V dryer outlet.

CINDY ADAMSON'S RECIPE FOR BISCOTTI Ingredients

Two sticks of butter 1 3/4 cups sugar four eggs 2 teaspoons of almond extract 4 cups of flour 3 teaspoons of baking powder 1/2 teaspoon salt 2 teaspoons anise seeds 1 cup of chopped nuts

Directions

Cream the butter well. Add sugar and beat with sugar. Add eggs one at a time. Mix flour, baking powder, salt, anise seeds and chopped nuts. Mix well.

Refrigerate overnight. Roll into four or five oval logs. Bake in 350 oven for 20 minutes or until brown.

Cut into 1/2 inch slices, turn cut side up and re-bake in oven for 15 minutes until brown.
