Here is what I'm thinking...

Only a week ago the trees in our yard were in full bodied beautiful color, made even brighter by rays of light from the sun. Now they are skeletons against the sky. Our newly mowed green grass is now covered with the fading brown and gold that fell from the sky like rain in the last couple of days. It must be November. It is cold and wet and gray. Not my favorite month.

But maybe this month, that we barely notice, tightly squeezed as it is between the commercial emphasis on Halloween and on the season of Christmas, is the perfect month for Thanksgiving. It is the pause we are offered from our many distractions, desires and dissatisfactions of life and notice the source of the gift of deeper joy that is with us even in ordinary times. I think Thanksgiving has the potential to be what Christmas would be if it were indeed observed primarily as a sacred Holy Day.

So here's what I'm thinking...This year we have moved our Congregational Meeting to a later date, November 22, the Sunday before Thanksgiving. This has been a particularly difficult year as a congregation on many fronts so it will be easy as we reflect to get lost in justified lament. This is always a time when we not only look back but also look forward to the future. In preparation for that planning, we will spend our worship times this month focused on how we are called to participate in God's mission for the world even in a time of our own community uncertainty. My hope for this time is that, even as we mourn our losses and honestly confront our fears, we will, in this Thanksgiving season, come together from a place of gratitude.

Christine D. Pohl, in her book: *Living into Community; Cultivating Practices That Sustain us,* writes; "Gratitude begins with paying attention, with noticing the goodness, beauty, and grace around us. The practice of gratitude becomes more central to our communities when we stop feeding the cycles of complaint and orient our lives around praise, testimony, and thanks. Our communities flourish when we regularly tell stories of God's faithfulness and goodness and when we find opportunities to express gratitude and celebrate the gifts we have received. Because of God's grace and work in bringing us together in Christ and in building our congregations, we are able to participate in congregational life "not as demanders but as thankful participants."

Karl Barth writes, "To believe in Jesus Christ means to be thankful." May it be so with us all.

Treasurer's report – Stan had developed the August financials and these were distributed. Insurance cost for 2015 was up \$600 over the 2014 year. Stewards have many expenses and projects that improve the building, but add up financially. The average offering amount for the month was almost \$1300. Karen/Larry, unanimous to accept

John/Larry, unanimous to accept all reports


New Business – Discussion was opened for envisioning the program, mission, and church building use. (This brainstorming list is in the Board file.)




