#### Conclusion.

The suggestion for these little thoughts was: how things may have changed in Hague.

But what about the things that have not changed?

My first venture into this incredibly beautiful area was almost 60 years ago - to Sabbath Day Point, to the Gillett Cottage at the foot of Bloomer Mountain. The cottage is still there and also the boat house and dock - the cribbing of which I helped build.

The gorgeous view south from the Lookout is still the same. The Brodie Cottage and the Falconer House, the original house on the left which was once a camp, are still in use.

Of course the area which once was the wonderful old Sabbath Day Point House is now all built up and very modern - but we must have progress.

Many places between Sabbath Day Point and Silver Bay remain the same and on up to Hague. There are still The Sentinel Pines, changed perhaps but there, and Chipwick and Miss Foote's house and the late Miss Mary Beste's old home.

North out of Hague are those handsome old summer homes and the Watrous House, then the Island Harbor - all have changed ownership many times but all remain reminders of another era.

There are many changes in Hague proper but essentially it remains the same. A haven for many of us, still glorious in its comfortable and the foothills with beautiful Lake George enhancing all the charms of a little village.

The Lake itself remains the same, not only giving us the sustenance of its beauty but the sustenance of life itself, for from it we may still quench our thirst.

#### ZONING BOARD OF APPEALS - 27 OCT '83

Bruce Robinson of Pine Cove requested a variance to construct a 2-car garage that would extend 10 feet onto the Town's road right of way. This was granted due to the steep pitch of the driveway which would not allow a car access in winter months. Dan Belden stated in a letter that the construction' of the garage would cause no problem to the Town. The ZBA approved the variance with the condition that the legality of extending onto town right of way be cleared by our town attorney. APA has 30 days to approve, disapprove, or approve with conditions.

Ronald Graser requested a variance to construct a 24' x 38' garage that would be  $7\frac{1}{2}$ ! from the rear property line. 20' is the minimum set-back in primary hamlet. Denied. (Mr. Graser submitted conforming plans to the Planning Board on Nov. 3

wh'ich were approved)∴

The Board reviewed the request of Mr. & Mrs. Deleno Cheskey for a variance to sub-divide a 50' parcel of land into two parcels, one being 50' on the lake, another 50' off the lake. The hardship stated was that the Cheskeys had a buyer who did not want the shore frontage. Since granting this variance would make an already non-conforming lot even more non-conforming, the request was denied. ...Alison Craig

### PLANNING BOARD 3 NOV. 1983

The application of Ronald Graser for a permit to construct a garage at the rear of his Rt. 8 property was granted. The building will be used to repair small engines and to rebuild old cars. A condition was imposed that no more than 3 vehicles intended for renovation be located on the premises at any one time.

After the positive report of the Site Review Committee, the Board approved the application of Stephen Bevins to utilize an existing building at the rear of his house, with some alterations, as a firewood processing structure. The APA must review this application.

James Ward's application to construct a show-room on an existing foundation at his 9N property was approved following an inquiry as to the State's right of way.

Mr. Ward reduced the porch by one foot so that the building will comply with the required set-back.

The Board set Dec. 2 at 7 PM for the Public Hearing on the application of Malcolm & Luella Grimes for a minor sub-division of their By-Water property. They want to sell the restaurant with 12,335 sq. ft. of land and retain the remainder of 2.301 acres.

A raised or fill septic system site was approved for the John Pucek property just south of the 9N over-look, but no plans for the system have as yet been filed.

### TOWN BOARD - NOVEMBER

The 1984 Town Dudget was unanimously passed at the regular meeting on 15 November. The only major deletion from the preliminary budget was an item for \$20,000.00 for police protection. Only four residents attended the Nov. 10 public hearing on the Preliminary Budget and the use of Federal Sharing Revenues. The Soard is exploring the possibility of establishing a "Neighborhood Watch" and "Neighborhood Crime Prevention System" to alert police agencies to possible criminal or emergency situations. The majority of Hague taxpayers will see a decrease in the assessment per thousand, but those in the Hague lighting district will have an increase due to the removal of the former Dock and Dine Building, resulting in a decrease of \$37,000 of assessed value in that District.

On Oct. 27 the Eoard adopted the Community Matrix Health Insurance plan with Blue Cross and dropped the State Plan under the Dept. of Civil Service, thereby keeping the cost of health insurance at the same level, and with the same benefits, as 1983. The State Plan cost would have increased over 17%.

On May 10, 1983, the Town Coard began the legal process for owners of burned out buildings to remove the structure. Two owners complied within the time limit specified, one did not. At the Oct. Board meeting a number of citizens complained about the remaining burned out building and Supervisor Bolton said he would check it out with our Town Attorney. Because of a legal technicality another paper must be served on the owner who will then have 30 days to begin removal and 90 days to complete.

The Warren County Assessors Association has proposed that the County standardize and up-date assessments to bring assessments and equalization rates in line with market value.

It was interesting to note that the total property of Hague is greater than the town of Warrensburg.

At the November 15 regular meeting of the Town Board, I asked the following questions:

"I have the impression that elected officials are responsible to the voters, and that neither the Town Board nor the Supervisor can require regular reports on the work being performed or can they require elected officials to perform any work. Is my impression correct?" The answer from Supervisor Bolton was, "Yes." "Is this a State, County, or Town law?" "State", from Bolton. "Would it be possible for a supervisor, Board member, Town Clerk, Assessor, or Superintendent of Highways to do absolutely nothing and still receive a regular pay-check for the entire length of the elected term?" Again, "Yes" from Bolton. My last question was, "What means does the average voter have to determine if an elected official has performed his or her duties in a satisfactory manner?" Bolton's reply; "Read the Town Minutes or check with the Chairman of Assessors for information."

The majority of our elected officials devote a great deal of time and thought to their official duties. However, in order for voters to be informed, a quarterly report to the Town Board, voluntarily given, would help voters make informed decisions as to whom should be re-elected. Some already do.

It is the responsibility of the voter to determine if a candidate, seeking re-election, has done a satisfactory job. - ...Alison Craig
