

New parishioners are requested to visit the parish office.

Sick & Shut-ins: The priests are available to administer the Sacraments to those who are unable to come to Church. The Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick is part of the healing ministry of the Church, and should be received early in an illness or before a serious operation.

Baptisms: Please call the parish office to make arrangements.

Marriages: In order to provide sufficient time for the Marriage Preparation Course, please call the parish office and ask to speak with the pastor at least six months in advance of the wedding.

I HAVE THE RESURRECTION AND THE LIFE WITHIN ME

Though both are referred to as resurrections, what Jesus did for Lazarus is not the same as God's raising of Jesus. Lazarus was



truly dead and then brought back to life, to be sure, but to an earthly life that would come to an end once again. However, it would be wrong to say that Lazarus was brought back to the life he had before. One cannot imagine him picking up right where his old life left off prior to his illness and death, as if he had been asleep for a few days. He has literally been given a new lease on life. Unbound from the finality of death, unwrapped from the suffocating coverings,

untied from his restraints, he has been reborn, free to move and act and live in a new way, in a resurrected life.

We look forward to the Resurrection, but as we already have Christ within us and Jesus is the resurrection and the life, we each already have the resurrected life within us. Our challenge is to break the bonds of sin and apathy, rise from the graves of addiction and selfishness, unseal the lambs of hopelessness and despair, and live this new life out.

"Now many of the Jews who had come to Mary and seen what He had done began to believe in Him" (John 11:45). The Gospel we hear today ends on a victorious note. Jesus raises Lazarus from the dead and many came to believe. But this is not the way this passage from John ends. The whole mood turns with the very next verse: "But some of them went to the Pharisees and told them what Jesus had done" (11:46). Not only did some not begin to believe, some decided to turn Him in. The Sanhedrin determined that this Messiah would ruin their relationship with the Roman rulers, for Rome would not tolerate a Jewish miracle worker who attracted thousands of followers. Thus, "from that day on they planned to kill Him" (11:53). Saving the life of his friend directly led to the loss of his own. Jesus valued the life He would give higher than the life He had.

QUESTION OF THE WEEK:

Do I believe I have the one who is the Resurrection and the Life within me? How does this motivate me to live my life in a new way?

Special Lenten Challenge

Each month our Social Outreach Group along with a half dozen parishioners makes trays of baked ziti which we then donate to Immaculate Conception Parish on Gun Hill Road in the Bronx for their soup kitchen. This provides just a small amount of the food needed each day for the Helping Hands Ministry at Immaculate



Conception Catholic Church to feed the 450-480 people it now serves during this unprecedented COVID-19 pandemic.

As a special Lenten Project we like to invite parishioners to make either a half tray of baked ziti or a half tray of

rice and beans and drop it off to our Food Pantry before any of the Palm Sunday Masses next weekend. (Someone will be available at our Food Pantry to receive your tray from 4:30- 5p.m. on Saturday and on Palm Sunday from 9-9:30 a.m. and from 11-11:30 a.m. (The food pantry is located in the rectory basement right next to the garage doors. Door is on the right when facing the garage). Trays will be available in the back of the church beginning today for you to use. (Note: For those who make the monthly ziti meals for Immaculate Conception, this is in place of the April 1st meal)

Those who come to the kitchen at Immaculate Conception Catholic Church are from various backgrounds (African Americans, Latinos, Asians and some from the Middle Eastern Countries). Many elderly people come for their meals as well as children when the schools are closed for vacation. A significant number of unemployed and homeless people come regularly for food as well. The soup kitchen always served hot meals five days a week but has now had to cut back to three days a week due to a lack of food. Please join us this month. If we each do our small part collectively we can make a difference.
