PASTOR LEANNE'S MESSAGE...

A few years back, pastors' circles shared their alarm about the news that well-known Pastor "came out" as an atheist. He hadn't begun that way; he started his journey in ministry like the rest of us: idealistic, excited, inspired and determined. But, over the years, something changed. Ministry became a job and only a job, theology became performance calculation, and church health transmuted into formulaic approach to membership, attendance, and giving metrics. Something in his soul dried up – he experienced himself as inauthentic – trapped by a theological education that could not be



experienced himself as inauthentic – trapped by a theological education that could not be easily re-packaged for secular employment. Apparently, he functioned like this for years, before he decided he had to make the break. It was, for most pastors, a disturbing story, as many of us have had pivotal times when our faith gripped us and called us back from inauthenticity and performance to one simple value that sustains us all: "Jesus loves me... this I KNOW. But more disturbing than that was the response of his congregation. A few had suspected for a long time and didn't mind, they wanted the pastor to stay on *as pastor*, knowing he did not believe. Others felt incredibly betrayed and hurt, understandably so – it made them question their own faith. There was a lot for us to ponder as we looked at the deterioration of his calling and used it as a lesson by which to examine our own.

When it became known, folks were quick to point out that his reading material would "make anyone an atheist." Jung and Neitzsche were blamed, which to my mind, having sampled Jung and Nietszch was a pretty bogus reason. I almost never believe that education creates a loss of belief – the crushing of true faith is a complicated matter, only part of which is intellectual. Admittedly, I did not know this man, but by his own account, I gathered that his slow slide into disbelief started in a tender place of his soul where his passion lived, not in his pursuit of psychology or philosophy. First, he lost his love.

The temptation for pastors is not so different from the temptation of lay-people. Service to Christ through the church can actually backfire on faith if one does not nourish a personal prayer and devotional center and stay attached to one-on-one relationships who share and encourage love for the person of Christ. We give ourselves on committees and to activities, we sacrifice the most precious thing we have – TIME – and spend our energy for this community – and in so doing the temptation for rote disinterest to set in is palpable. Add to that frustration with how things sometimes function, or the feeling of being unappreciated, and the malaise that can set in when those things happen alongside a job that is dissatisfying, or a life that has significance challenges... well, I am not being judgmental at all, just honest... to stay authentic in love takes extra attention, extra energy, and extra Christ-devoted time. Sometimes, we are just too tired. And that's when the slide begins.

The bottom line – at least for me – is to recognize the importance of worship and a personal devotional life. I often feel blessed that I am able to truly *worship* while on the platform, instead of "lead worship" as a job – some pastors find that difficult. Prayer, confession, and especially, *the music* are intimate reminders of why this journey is worth it, and how this calling is about a relationship to Jesus that transcends responsibilities. My love is renewed in worship. But even as I do, I am aware: that many who lead and serve in our congregation are also serving, and this is my firm hope: that the scurrying that must be done to keep things running smoothly is not being allowed to smother the genuine love of Christ. I pray that we are not using the passing of the peace as a time to make sure our committee emails were acknowledged, that our minds are not fixed on a leaky pipe in some corner of the church as we sing out our praises, and that we are not missing out on the WORD among us, because we are busy serving. Scripture, the sacraments, prayer, music, the encouragement of like-minded believers – these are the resources provided to us to help us keep our true and authentic purpose healthy, passionate, and joyful. To what purpose am I referring?: Q. What is the chief end of man? A. To glorify God, and to *enjoy* him forever. *ENJOY!*



PASTOR LEANNE'S MESSAGE (cont.)...

This is just a little musing – mixed with a lot of hope and respect for the people who really keep things together around here. And perhaps a reminder: don't forget your love. Don't forget to enjoy. Don't forget to be nourished even as you are giving nourishment.

NURSES NOTES...



The Flu season is here. According to the WebMD, you can have cold symptoms like a stuffy nose or sneezing that start slowly and gradually get worse. Flu symptoms typically hit your body all of a sudden — and they'll probably feel a lot stronger. Chills occur when you shiver due to body temperature changes; this is an early sign of infection and high fever. Chills are signs of pneumonia or flu. Fever is a sign that your body is trying to fight an illness or infection, but it's rarely caused by a cold. Flu, bronchitis, and pneumonia are more common causes of fevers. You may have some slight body aches with a cold, but stronger ones are usually a sign that you have the flu. This is because short-term achy muscles often

happen along with a fever. Wheezing occurs when your breathing sounds like a whistle. If you wheeze, it's a sign of a more serious infection like pneumonia or bronchitis, especially if it happens when you lie down. Wheezing can also be a sign of anaphylaxis, a severe allergic reaction to something you ate or an insect bite. If you cough up mucus — slimy stuff from deep down in your chest — this is a sign of bronchitis or pneumonia, especially if there's any blood in it. Flu causes fatigue and lack of appetite. It can also be a sign or pneumonia or a sinus infection, which is common but more serious than a cold. Sore throat is a typical symptom of a cold and sometimes the flu. It should clear up once your cold or flu does. But a very painful sore throat that comes on quickly can be a sign of strep throat. That's a bacterial infection that should be treated with antibiotics. Headaches are not usually common with a cold. It's a common flu symptom and can be a sign of a sinus infection. But painful sinuses (the spaces above and around your nose), can also be caused by hay fever, or rhinitis. Chest tightness or chest pain is a symptom of a more serious respiratory infection, like bronchitis. That can also make your chest feel tight, and you may have a hard time taking a deep breath. Sharp chest pain that feels worse when you cough can be a sign of pneumonia, and chest tightness is also a common symptom of asthma. Seek medical attention if any chest tightness or pain occurs without cold of flu symptoms. Colds can cause a very stuffy nose, which make breathing a little harder, but real shortness of breath is a sign of something more serious. It's common symptom of asthma or a flare-up of Chronic Obstructive Pulmonary Disease (COPD) and it also can be from a serious infection, like bronchitis or pneumonia. If you feel pressure in your ears, it may mean you have a sinus infection. That also causes pain and pressure around your eyes, cheeks, or forehead that gets worse when you bend over. And if you feel fullness in one ear, it may be a symptom of an ear infection. Flu symptoms may be bad, but they usually get better within a few days. A cold can last up to 10 days. But pneumonia symptoms can stick around up to a month or longer. And bronchitis can last several months in some cases. To help prevent serious complications of the Flu contact your private medical provider to determine if you should receive the Flu vaccine.

ST. ANDREW'S DAY CELEBRATION

We are planning our fifth annual St. Andrew's Day celebration. The feast day of Saint Andrew, patron saint of Scotland, is a national holiday in Scotland where Scots culture is celebrated with traditional food, music and dance.

Once a year, many Presbyterian churches observe St. Andrew's Day as a means of celebrating their Scottish roots. This year we are celebrating November 10th. Music will be Celtic in flavor, including traditional Highland bagpipes, Celtic hymns and songs.

Following a form of worship ceremony that dates back to 1564, various traditions are observed, most notably the "Kirkin' of the Tartan" - Kirk being the Scottish word for church. Kirkin' is a "symbol of freedom" that dates back to the defeat of Scottish highlanders by the British in 1746. English penal laws banned all things Scottish, including wearing clan plaids, speaking and singing in their native Gaelic tongue and the playing of bagpipes. Although unlawful kirkin' was punishable by death, Scots would sneak a bit of their tartan under their clothing on St. Andrew's Day and when the minister said a certain phrase, they would clutch their cloth and silently say a blessing in Gaelic.

Nowadays members, guest, and visitors are invited to present pieces of their heritage or tartan for blessing during the service. The blessing is open to everyone, whether of Scots heritage or other ethnicity.

In keeping with the spirit of the occasion, you are encouraged to wear plaid and bring a fabric of your heritage for the special "Kirkin' of the Tartan".

CLERK'S REPORT

Membership remains at 364. Clerks from four area Presbyterian Churches met and read Session Records on October 14th.

Jim Skaret stated that there is some historic evidence that the current deficit might be erased by the end of 2019.

MODERATOR'S REPORT

Pastor Leanne thanked the Stewardship and Business and Finance Committees for all their efforts on the most recent pledge drive and budget process. She expressed appreciation to Worship & Music Committee for organizing the Blessing of the Pets on October 19th. Special thanks to Charee, Vickie and Nathan who are the best staff a church could have!

In 2020, Pastor Leanne plans to offer new classes/seminars and hold meetings with the Visibility Team.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Administrative and Personnel—Session voted to approve a Board of Deacons with 17 members beginning 2021, rather than 15 as approved by Session in September. A new church manual policy for Child and Youth Protection (at the request from Christian Education), including background checks, was approved. The yearly fee of \$144 will be paid by the A & P Committee.

Business and Finance—Joe Bachmeier and Keith Magnusson reviewed the 2018 church financial records and found no problem. An official audit was budgeted for 2020.

Christian Education—Third-graders will receive Bibles on November 24th. Confirmation students are required to complete a service project; 4 participated in the CROP Walk. More volunteers are needed to help teach Sunday School and PAC lessons.

Membership—Chili cook-off was held October 16th. Book club continues each month.

Mission and Outreach—Higher Power Lunch will be November 20th. 192 jars of peanut butter and 107 jars of jelly were donated by FPC for the backpack program. Church members will help with the Thanksgiving dinner.

SESSION HIGHLIGHTS...(continued)



Property and Equipment—Sandbags at the northwest corner of the church have prevented rain from entering the church. A more permanent fix will happen in the spring. An engineering firm will provide a detailed report concerning a new heating/cooling system. Duemeland's Outdoor Services was contracted to provide snow removal. The stained glass cross will be hung once braces are in place.

Stewardship—Thanks to all those who have returned pledges and helped with the campaign. Possibly 82 more pledging units will be contacted.

Worship and Music—A new, larger handbell table will be ordered. St. Andrew's Sunday is November 10th.

Nominating—There will be one less Elder and one less Deacon nominated for the class of 2022.

Board of Deacons—Deacons approved \$100 for a member in need. Money comes from the Crisis Ministry Fund. \$300 was given from the Gift of Giving Fund to the Child Care Center to help purchase new walkie-talkies.

Child Care Center Board—The number of children has been reduced because there are staff positions unfilled. The center currently has a net income of \$29,845 largely due to the transfer of Endowment funds of \$26,000. Donations will be accepted for the CCC staff dinner.

NEW BUSINESS

CCC Budget—Session approved the proposed 2020 budget based on \$3.00 per child per week increase. Total income \$633,856 with \$46,000 coming from Endowment and Memorial transfers, total expense \$596,646.

General Fund Budget—Session approved the proposed 2020 church budget with pledged income of \$340,000 plus other income for a total of \$556,085. Total expenses \$566,390. Employee wages increase 1.5% with pastor's increase of 2.6%. C. E. Youth Director's hours increased from 780 to 850. The budget provides for the Parish Nurse hours to be extended to full-time (40 hours) after July 1, pending review. A formal audit was budgeted at \$6,100. All committee budgets were approved as submitted.

Session discussed the need to raise money for the Parish Nurse fund if the position becomes full-time.
