What Is Sweet Now Turns So Sour

BIBLE

Yahweh's angel came up from Gilgal to Bochim. He said, "I brought you out of Egypt, and have brought you to the land which I swore to give your fathers. I said, 'I will never break my covenant with you."

He had in his hand a little open book. He set his right foot on the sea, and his left on the land.²

I went to the angel, telling him to give me the little book. He said to me, "Take it, and eat it up. It will make your stomach bitter, but in your mouth it will be as sweet as honey."³

He went out again by the seaside. All the multitude came to him, and he taught them.⁴

He told them this parable: "Now on the mountainside there was a great herd of pigs feeding. They all ate, and were filled."

"Behold, I have found this," says the Preacher, "one to another, to find out the scheme; put a knife to your throat, if you are a man given to appetite. Don't be among ones drinking too much wine, or those who gorge themselves on meat. 10

BIBLE COMMENTARY

"For the drunkard and the glutton shall become poor; and drowsiness clothes them in rags. 11 Yes, the dogs are greedy, they can never have enough; and these are shepherds who can't understand: they have all turned to their own way, each one to his gain, from every quarter. 12

"Like a city that is broken down and without walls is a man whose spirit is without restraint.¹³ Or don't you know that your body is a temple of the Holy Spirit which is in you, which you have from God? You are not your own.¹⁴

"All chastening seems for the present to be not joyous but grievous; yet afterward it yields the peaceful fruit of righteousness to those who have been exercised thereby.¹⁵

"My son, don't despise Yahweh's discipline, neither be weary of his reproof. The fear of Yahweh is the beginning of knowledge; but the foolish despise wisdom and instruction." 17

His brothers also went and fell down before his face; and they said, "Behold, we are your servants.¹⁸ The entrance of your words gives light. It gives understanding to the simple."¹⁹

He said to them, "Come again to me after three days." The people departed.²⁰
