Here's what I'm thinking...

At the start of this new year I turned to an old favorite. It is a book by a favorite devotional writer, Joyce Rupp, titled *Fresh Bread; And Other Gifts Of Spiritual Nourishment.* She includes a chapter for each month of the year. Within each monthly chapter she shares reflections, lists short scripture references related to her thoughts, and also includes original prayers and poetry. After many years I was drawn back to this book and as I began reading the chapter for January, it was like a gift hiding in my closet that I had forgotten to unwrap. Her January chapter is about the freshness and the sometimes-unsettling unknown of new beginnings. It is about the glancing back and then moving forward into the invitation to that freshness—God's "Happy New Year!" In John 5:19-30, Jesus speaks of the God who is the "source of new life." It struck me as particularly relevant in my life and the life of our church this year.

So here's what I'm thinking... As we move into this new year and all the changes it may bring into our personal and our church lives let us listen for God's call to new beginnings. Let us stay alert so that we may see and hear and follow that call to freshness and believe in God's presence with us. I want to share Joyce Rupp's January poem; *Welcoming A New Year*.

a new year stands on my doorstep ready to enter my life's journey.

something in me welcomes this visitor: the hope of bountiful blessings the joy of a new beginning the freshness of unclaimed surprises

something in me rebuffs this visitor: the swiftness of the coming the boldness of the entrance the challenge of a year's good-bye

something in me fears this visitor: the unnamed events of future days the wisdom needed to walk love well the demands of giving away and growing

a new year stands in my doorstep. with fragile caution I move to open the door for its entrance. my heart leaps with surprise, joy jumps in my eyes, for there beside this brand-new year stands my God with outstretched hand! He smiles at me and gently asks of me: can we walk this year together?

and I, so overwhelmed with goodness, can barely whisper my reply:

welcome in!

Action Alert on Drone Warfare from the Office of Public Witness

Drone strikes by the United States consistently violate the basic human rights of people in targeted regions of the world. Using "signature strikes," the military kills human beings without a trial--not because they are known threats, but because they fit the profile of someone who may be a threat. Civilians often are killed in the strikes, and the strikes erode the trust between the US and affected populations.

Call your senators and representatives and tell them to end the CIA's authority to carry out drone strikes.

Sample script: Hello. My name is _____, and I am a constituent from _____. As a person of faith, I believe in the dignity of each human life. The CIA's drone program lacks transparency, and results in an unacceptable level of civilian deaths. Please work to end the CIA's authority to carry out drone strikes.


