#### CULTURE OF FORGIVENESS

Joshua 5:9a, 10-12; Psalm 34:2-7; 2Cor. 5:17-21; Luke 15:1-3, 11-32

Whoever is in Christ is a new creation: the old things have passed away; behold, new things (a new beginning) have come! (2 Cor. 15:17).



Our God, as presented in the books of the Old Testament, has often been seen as a God Who is always filled with fury - a God of "brimstone and fire" Who is ready and willing to punish anyone who strays from His commandments. He is perceived as a non-forgiving God. This pseudo theology must have influenced a writer who once wrote: "Forgiveness is not the rule of our culture. We relish revenge, and we pray to get even or to inflict more pain than was delivered. Such is the culture of lawsuits."

In my opinion, such may well be the *culture of lawsuits*, but it is alien to Christian culture. Forgiveness is intrinsically God's design, thus, in the Book of Exodus 22: 20-23:9, the Lord God says, "You shall not wrong a stranger or oppress him...You shall not afflict any widow or orphan...You shall not join hands with a wicked man, to be a malicious witness. Neither shall you allege the example of the many as an excuse for doing wrong; nor shall you, when testifying in a lawsuit, side with the many in perverting justice..." Contrary to what the Scribes, the Pharisees, and sadly, many of us practice, the Lord further exhorts you and me, "When you come upon your enemy's ox or ass going astray, see to it that it is returned to him. When you notice the ass of one who hates you lying prostrate under its burden, by no means desert him; help him, rather, to raise it up." I believe that if the Pharisees and the Scribes were faithful to these commands by the Lord God, they would not have been upset that Jesus welcomed sinners and ate with them.

In the gospels, we read that the Scribes and the Pharisees always thought of themselves as righteous and saintly. They merely carried out religious obligations out of fear of punishment. The most obvious trait of the Pharisees was their calculation that they were righteous people, who diligently observed the laws of their religion, and expected God to give them salvation in return. They had no patience for those they perceived to be sinners. For them, forgiveness was a foreign concept, thus they did not understand why Jesus kept company with sinners and tax collectors. It was against this background that Jesus told them the "parable of the prodigal son" - a story about the unconditional love of God for sinners who repent from their sins and turn back to God. It is in the light of this that the Lord said through Prophet Ezekiel, "I do not want the death of a sinner, but let the sinner repent and live" (Ez. 18:32). Like the older son in Jesus' parable, the Pharisees and the Scribes, are not willing to share in the joy that exists when a sinner rejoins their fold. It is all about them and their self-centered interest.

On the contrary, for you and me, Lent should be a time of repentance - to acknowledge our sins and to confess them - a time of new beginnings - a time to rejoice in the love God has shown to us all. It is a time of contrition and true conversion. It is time for us to know that we do not and cannot live in a vacuum. The parable of the "prodigal son" teaches you and me that LOVE must be the only true reason behind our religious practices and sacrifices. We serve God, not because we expect Him to meet our needs, but because we love Him. We share our gifts, time and talents with others, not because we expect them to share with us in return, but because we love them. Mutual love and forgiveness is a Christian culture!

We can never begin on those new or renewed challenges earlier than today.

As Easter approaches, this is a tremendous time of opportunity and expectation for personal renewal and change. Let Spring be a time for new beginnings in your life and faith.

#### THE CONFESSIONS OF SINS

(Excerpts from the Catechism of the Catholic Church)

# 1455: The confession (or disclosure) of sins, even from a simply human point of view, frees us and facilitates our reconciliation with others. Through such an admission man looks squarely at the sins he is guilty of, takes responsibility for them, and thereby opens himself again to God and to the communion of the Church in order to make a new future possible.

# 1456: Confession to a priest is an essential part of the sacrament of Penance: "All mortal sins of which penitents after a diligent self-examination are conscious must be recounted by them in confession, even if they are most secret and have been committed against the last two precepts of the Decalogue; for these sins sometimes wound the soul more grievously and are more dangerous than those which are committed openly.
