#### **CCA Hires New Superintendent**

Dr. Corey Seymour, currently the executive director of leadership at Ector County Independent School District, Texas, has been hired as superintendent of schools by the Clear Creek Amana School District starting July 1.

Dr. Seymour will be replacing Joseph Brown Sr. now serving as the CCA district's interim superintendent, following the May 1, 2021 resignation of Tim Kuehl.

Clear Creek Amana School Board President Kara Prickett stated in a press release from the district, "Dr. Seymour has a 29-year career in education and leadership development. His most recent roles of Executive Director of Leadership, Assistant Superintendent, and Superintendent uniquely position him for the Clear Creek Amana School District. He is a charismatic leader that brings a passion for student success and betterment at all levels. We look forward to the impact he will have on our school district and community."

Dr. Seymour told the board, "There is no better place to set sail into a new era of education and emerging academic trends, while inspiring universal leaders and embracing the needs of the community."

Dr. Corey Seymour is a graduate of Rice University, where he was selected as a member of the AFCA Good Works Team and the Hitachi Promise of Tomorrow Scholarship recipient. He later earned a Master's Degree in Educational Administration from Texas Southern University and a Doctorate from Walden University in Organizational Psychology. He began his career in education with the Houston Independent School District, serving as an English teacher and athletic coach. He later became a K-8 administrator, earning Assistant Principal of the Year and Principal of the Year honors. At the Cedar Hill Independent School District, he served as a high school principal and leader of secondary schools. He later accepted the superintendent position for Santa Gertrudis Independent School District. During his tenure, student participation in Advanced Placement and Dual Credit courses increased. The district also achieved a 100% graduation rate, which included district historic highs in college scholarships and state recognition. He broadened his career as an Area Assistant Superintendent (Area Senior Director) for Portland Public Schools and as the Executive Director of Leadership for Ector County Independent School District: where he oversaw several schools.


- There will be a CCA Show Choir Showcase at the CCA High School Auditorium in Tiffin at 7 p.m.



### AMANA CHURCH VBS VOLUNTEERS NEEDED

The recent 50-degree, sunshine-filled days got us all daydreaming about Spring and Summer, and that means the Amana Church Youth Activities Committee is starting to daydream about (and plan) Vacation Bible School! There are three ways (so far) that we could use help.

- 1) We would appreciate some extra "Helpers" who are able to attend from 8:30-11:30 to help at the activity stations. Helpers will not be responsible for planning or leading activities but will assist the children in the activity that the Lead Teacher is instructing. Helpers are also essential in helping younger kids find the restroom, providing occasional TLC after a collision during games, and cleaning up small messes. Helpers can volunteer for one day or numerous days. Helpers need to be in middle school (have completed 6th grade) or older. There is no maximum age!
- 2) We need some "Babysitters" who are available to supervise children from 8:30-9:00 (before VBS starts) in the morning. Each morning, the Lead Teachers and Helpers meet to discuss the lesson for the day and complete a brief devotional; this leaves several children of Lead Teachers and Helpers unattended! Additionally, VBS attendees begin to trickle in around 8:45. Babysitters would supervise the children in the main Saal of the Amana Church, and supplies to entertain the children (colors, music, etc.) would be provided. Babysitters can volunteer for one day or numerous days. They need to be in high school (have completed 9th grade) or older (again, no maximum age!).
- 3) We are looking for new or used 4-inch Terra Cotta pots to use for a craft that each child will complete. We will need at least 60-70 pots in all.

### GARDENING SEASON JUST AROUND THE CORNER (Mostly from ISU Extension)

With daylight savings time starting on March 13 thoughts turn to the garden. This guide will help you schedule the planting of gardens so space may be used efficiently. Designed for central lowa, dates for southern lowa would be about 1 week earlier, for northern lowa about 1 week later. For more information on planting a vegetable garden, see PM 819, Planting a Home Vegetable Garden.

Radishes —Several plantings, 7 to 10 days apart, are possible. Radishes pass peak quality quickly, so several plantings are needed to provide high quality radishes throughout the spring and early summer. Radishes become spongy and make seed heads readily with the onset of hot weather. Several fall plantings can be made in August and September.

Lettuce—Sow seeds in early spring. Lettuce flowers and turns bitter with the onset of hot weather. Fall plantings can be made in August.

Onions —Sow seeds as soon as the ground can be worked in spring for mature (storage) onions. Plant sets and transplants in spring.

Peas —Sow seeds in early spring as soon as the soil can be worked. Plants stop bearing when hot weather arrives. A fall planting may be made about August 1 to 10.

Spinach—Sow seeds in early to mid-April. Leaves develop bitter flavor and plants make seed heads with the onset of hot weather. A fall crop may be planted about August 10.

Cabbages —Set out transplants any time from early April to mid-June. Early-maturing types may be planted in early August for fall crop.

Broccoli and cauliflower—Set out transplants in early to mid-April. Both are sensitive to hot weather so need to be encouraged to head as early as possible.

Carrots —Seed early or any time during spring and summer. Carrots seeded as late as August 1 may produce full sized roots by fall.

These are just some of the early seeds to be planted, for best results some crops, like tomatoes can be started indoors. Planning your garden and gathering seeds and or greenhouse plants will produce a rewarding result.
