

Our Purpose and Objectives

• To increase access to social services and counseling services.

• To increase access to youth programming.

• To partner with existing stakeholders such as the school district and Shippensburg University to meet educational and community needs.

The SCRC was started in 2010 in response to the growing need to help residents find and utilize social services. Shippensburg falls between the counties of Franklin and Cumberland which means that services can be difficult for community members to access if the services extend to Shippensburg at all. The Resource Coalition has brought service providers and community members together since this time, with the aim of connecting clients with resources as well as developing programs to meet needs.

The SCRC is a Shippensburg University Center For Excellence and serves as a "learning lab" for the university. The Word of God Alive:

Discussing the Readings w/your children

Here at our parish, we are transitioning away from Children's Liturgy of the Word during the Mass, and instead, we would like to encourage parents to discuss the weekly readings or homily with their children either before or after Mass occurs. This spiritual conversation, even if it is simple or a bit scattered, can be very powerful, and it is a way for God's word to come alive in our hearts. We will provide questions and discussion points to help parents start this conversation with their children, and please consider doing this with your family each week!

During this Ordinary Time, when Father Ben is wearing green, we listen and learn about Jesus's ministry and how he taught his apostles to live a life of love and giving.



During the time Jesus walked on the earth, they did not have refrigerators to keep food cold, so the people used salt to preserve food. Salt is also used to flavor

food. Have you ever

made popcorn from scratch? The kernels are put in a pan with oil and heated until the kernels pop. If you tasted the popcorn it would taste very bland. As soon as you add salt to the popcorn, it tastes so much better and helps to bring out the flavor that was there all along in the corn.

What could Jesus have meant when he said, "You are salt?"

Another comparison Jesus made is light. We know that Jesus is the light of the world. Today we hear Jesus tell his apostles to <u>be</u> light. Jesus explains that a lamp, when lit and put under a basket, does not give off much light. We live in a community of people. In that community, we might be part of a neighborhood, school, sports team, music group, friends group. We are meant to bring something good to each of these groups to help them become better.

Salt and light are best when inside something else. Light under a bucket will not shine brightly. If you don't add salt to food, the flavor of the dish does not change. When we shine our light and flavor, we change the world.



On February 17, 1950, Bishop George L. Leech of Harrisburg made Shippensburg a parish in its own right. This church would also be responsible for the mission chapel of Doylesburg. Dolyesburg was part of the parish until 1965. On February 18th, Father Norman Koller took up residence at the Hotel Shippens. Fr. Koller was a native of Buffalo, New York. Daily Mass was started on February 19, 1950.

In 1950 the Hosfeld property, 4.5 acres and buildings was purchased for the parish. A large house was remodeled to include the rectory and small meeting rooms. A former stable was made into a chapel. This was a time of anti-Catholic feelings in the general area populace.

On Sunday December 3, 1950, the Holy Mass was offered for the first time on the new site.
