## **Words from Our Pastor**

ost of us have grown up with the historical understanding of time being either "B.C." or "A.D." When I was in college and seminary, the academy sought to teach us a more sensitive or politically correct approach to time notation in the study of history. We were instructed to write time notation as either "C.E." meaning "Common Era," or "B.C.E." meaning "Before the Common Era." This was a way of removing the uncomfortable idea that human history should be numbered according to the birth of Jesus. It helped scholars in religious studies and particularly Old

Testament studies to interact more amicably with Jewish scholars who were studying together with Christian scholars in understanding the Old Testament (by the way, the Old Testament was not to be called the "Old Testament" – instead it was to be called "the Hebrew Bible" or "the Hebrew Scriptures.")

When I wrote papers at UCSD or Princeton, I used the new vocabulary in order to submit to the direction given by my professors (I wanted to get A's instead of D's). But since graduation, I have shifted back to more 'insensitive' or 'less politically correct' time notation of B.C. and A.D. I think it is important to be culturally and religiously sensitive when working with people of other faiths in academic and historic pursuits. However, when I am preaching and teaching in a church setting, the traditional vocabulary becomes a part of our faith stance. When we number time according to the birth of Jesus Christ, we are saying something important about what we believe.

In the historic writings of the human race, events were usually described according to the length of the reign of the particular king who ruled the region. This is why Isaiah writes in Isaiah 6 "In the year that King Uzziah died" since this was a way of telling people when a particular event took place. There was no universally understood calendar of years until quite late in recorded human history. With the rise of Christianity in western civilization, all of time began to be recorded with the birth of Jesus being the reference point. The understanding was that Jesus was the new "king" of all nations and that all time should be numbered according to his "reign" which was inaugurated the day he was born.

We are stepping forward into A.D. (Anno Domini, the Year of Our Lord) 2020. As followers of Jesus, we believe that all history and all time finds its true place in reference to this historic event. The birth of Jesus changed everything about world history. Before he was born, all of time was "B.C. – Before Christ." After he was born, all of time became "A.D. – Anno Domini – The Year of Our Lord."

## **Humility – Essential to Our Life**

appy 2020 to you all! This new year started out in an avalanche of learning the importance of humility in God's eyes. Without going into the details, I found myself learning even more deeply the vital place humility plays in the life of a Christian.

My Bible reading for the new year began with 1 Samuel 25. This chapter tells the story of Abigail and her husband, Nabal. Verse three in the New American Standard Bible version says "... And the woman was intelligent and beautiful in appearance, but the man was harsh and evil in his dealings."

Despite David's good treatment of Nabal's shepherds and shearers, Nabal treated him and his men with disdain and dishonor. Because of this David planned to kill Nabal and all the males in his family.

Abigail heard of her husband's treachery and hurried to intercept the 400-man army coming to kill her husband. She brought gifts and food, bowed before David, and asked him to restrain his hand. David acknowledged her discernment and intelligence and granted her request to spare her husband and his family.

As I read this story, I saw how Abigail used her intelligence to bring peace to her household. At the same time, she showed incredible humility in her actions toward David.

At the end of the story, the Lord "struck Nabal and he died." When

David heard of his death, he blessed the Lord for sending Abigail and sent her a proposal of marriage. Her response showed great humility as well. "Then Abigail arose and bowed with her face to the ground and said, 'Behold your maidservant is a maid to wash the feet of my lord's servants.""

1 Samuel 25:41.

This chapter began my new year and immediately I was challenged to respond as Abigail did – calling on God to give me a deep humility only he can provide.

he Lord has indeed been faithful to Trinity Christian School (TCS) for 50 years. We are thankful for all that he has provided. January 6th marks the beginning of in-house registration for the 2020-21 school year! Open registration starts February 3rd for those who are not currently enrolled. We are looking forward to what the Lord will do with his school here on the hill during the coming year. Trinity Church members are afforded a 20 percent discount for family members and can apply during closed registration in January until classes are filled.

This is an accreditation year and our visiting team will be here at the end of March. We are accredited with both WASC (Western Association of Schools and Colleges) and ACSI (Association of Christian Schools International). They will be here over a three-day period. They will spend time looking into all aspects of the school from the facility, to curriculum,

to finances, to staff and more to make sure that we are who we say we are and are doing what we say we are doing. Please keep us in prayer as we have been working on the required formatted self-study for the last year and a half. This is an ongoing process to be prepared for visits every six years with a midterm one day visit at three years.

We are looking forward to hosting a 50 Year Anniversary Celebration to be held on May 17th at 2:00 p.m. in Williams Hall. Please mark your calendar to come and join in the fun. A huge heartfelt "thank you" goes out to Trinity Church for sponsoring this backyard mission.

Our TCS Serve-a-thon will be run a bit differently this year because of all the activities mentioned above. This is our annual fundraiser that helps to supplement our mission. The students go out by classes into the community to serve in the name of Jesus. It involves such adventures as going to Feeding America, visiting rest homes, cleaning up and weed pulling around Trinity Church, making and taking food to our homebound elderly, doing yard work for elderly, beach clean up, and several other service opportunities. This year we will have students going out throughout the school year rather than focused on a one-day outing which we called the Serve-a-thon. Students have always done service outings, but the one-day event has been a great way for the entire school to jump in and get especially excited to work together and see what God can do through them in just one day. We have a donation button on our website and are inviting people to prayerfully consider donating to the mission of TCS. The community benefits from the service and the students learn how to serve and work together to make a difference. The money that is given to sponsor them helps to sustain our special programs which include such things as Spanish, Music, Physical Education, STEAM
