LASAR Members Earn Awards Iburg, Whitmyer Recognized for Volunteer Service

Two members of the Lower Alabama Search and Rescue (LASAR) unit received the President's Volunteer Service Award (PVSA) for 2019.

The PVSA was created in 2003 to "recognize the important role of volunteers in America's strength and national identity," according to the National Community Service website. The PVSA "honors volunteers who use their time and talents to solve some of the toughest challenges facing our nation."

Duane Whitmyer and Roger Iburg were presented their awards by former Alabama State Senator Bill Hightower and LASAR Unit Commander Ray Hogans during a LASAR monthly meeting. Both honorees were presented with a President's Volunteer Service Award pin, a certificate of achievement for over 500 hours of community service and a congratulatory letter signed by President Donald Trump.

"It is humbling to know I was chosen and approved for this award. Not only is this an honor, but it is a strong motivation for continued future participation," he said.

Whitmyer, who also received the





I won't tell you where to find them. You know who and where they are.





Know the Warning Signs of Alzheimer's

Alzheimer's is a brain disease that causes a gradual decline in memory, thinking and reasoning skills. According to the Alzheimer's Association, there are ten warning signs of Alzheimer's every person should know.

1) Memory loss that disrupts daily life. This kind of memory loss includes forgetting recently learned information, forgetting important dates or events, repeatedly asking the same questions or increasingly needing to rely on family or memory aids (such as reminder notes) for things you used to remember on your own.

2) Challenges in planning or solving problems. Some people with Alzheimer's experience a decrease in their ability to develop a plan or work with numbers. They may have trouble following a recipe, keeping track of monthly bills or balancing their checkbook. They also may have difficulty concentrating.

3) Difficulty completing familiar or daily tasks. Examples of this might be difficulty driving to a familiar location, organizing a grocery list or remembering the rules of a favorite game.

4) Confusion with time or place. Persons with Alzheimer's can lose

unusual places, such as putting

the television remote in the refrigerator. They may lose things and be unable to go back over their steps to find them.

8) Poor decision-making. Two common examples of this symptom are using poor judgment when handling money and paying less attention to personal hygiene.

9) Withdrawal from work or social activities. Persons living with Alzheimer's may withdraw from hobbies, social clubs, church attendance and other engagements in which they previously participated.

10) Changes in mood and personality. Persons with Alzheimer's disease can become confused, suspicious, depressed, fearful and/or anxious. They may become easily upset at home, with friends or anytime they're out of their comfort zone. The individual with Alzheimer's may accuse people of stealing, especially as the disease progresses.

It's important to know that we sometimes experience age-related memory decline, such as momentarily forgetting someone's name but remembering it later. Age-related memory decline is not Alzheimer's disease. But if you or a loved one are experiencing any of the ten warning signs of Alzheimer's listed above, you should schedule an appointment with your doctor to discuss them. For those persons on Medicare, the Medicare Wellness Exam now includes a memory test. According to the nurse who administered it to me, less than five percent of persons who take the test score 100 percent.

5) Difficulty with spatial relationships. Spatial problems include difficulty with maintaining one's balance, driving or judging distance. An example of spatial issues might be placing your coffee mug on the coaster and missing the coaster.

6) Difficulty finding the right words when speaking or writing. This symptom frequently manifests as difficulty following a conversation, losing one's train of thought when speaking or misnaming a familiar object (such as calling a "wristwatch" a "hand clock.")

7) Misplacing things and losing the ability to retrace steps. Persons

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Tax Changes Include Simpler Senior Form

Here we are at the start of tax processing season – the IRS began processing 2019 tax returns on Jan. 27 and there are a few surprises this year.

Congress, at the last minute, made some changes for the better.

I'll start with some of these before giving you a few basics for 2019.

• There is a new form just for seniors – Form 1040-SR. You must be 65 or older to use the new, simplified version. It has a larger font size and better color contrast. You can also claim the standard deduction or itemize deductions and there are no income limits or restrictions on the types of income reported.

• The penalty for having no health insurance has been eliminated and the expense threshold has been reduced once more to 7.5% of Adjusted Gross Income (AGI) for claiming medical expenses.


• The cancellation of debt is not taxable for personal home foreclosures up to \$2 million and the deduction for Mortgage Insurance Premiums (PMI) is again allowed for itemizing deductions.

• The "above-the-line" deduction tuition expense is back for those high-income taxpayers who pay tuition but cannot use other education deductions. This deduction is either \$4,000 or \$2,000, depending on income.

• For those of you who may be subject to mandatory Required Minimum Distributions (RMD) on your retirement or Individual Retirement Accounts in 2020, the age requirement has been changed from 70-1/2to 72. This change does not apply to those already taking RMDs. And for tax year 2020, the 70-1/2 age limitation for contributing to an IRA has also been eliminated.

Here are some of the other tax items:

• The standard deduction: It will be \$24,400 for those Married Filing Jointly (MFJ), \$18,350 for Heads of Household (HOH) and \$12,200 for Single or those Married Filing Separately (MFS). Seniors (age 65) will get an extra \$1,300 or \$1,650 tacked on to the deduction amounts, depending on your filing status.



tions decrease with fewer or no children.

• Alimony: There is no deduction for those paying it, or income for those receiving it, for any settlements after 2017.

• Real estate, state income and sales tax: The deduction for all three combined are capped at \$10,000. You still have the choice of either state income or sales tax as a deduction, but the cap applies.

• Home mortgage interest: New acquisition debt is still limited to \$750,000 but debt incurred before 12/15/17 is grandfathered at \$1 million. Home equity loans not specifically related to the purchase, construction or substantial improvement of a qualified home are not deductible.

• Employee and miscellaneous deductions subject to 2% AGI: These have been suspended until 2026. This means that unreimbursed employee expenses (job search expenses, union dues, etc.) are not deductible. However, they may still be deductible as your state's itemized deductions.

• Mileage rates for deductions: Use of your vehicle for business increases to 58 cents per mile, for charitable work stays at 14 cents, and for medical expenses in traveling for medical treatment or to pick up prescriptions increases to 20 cents.

 Tax brackets: There are seven tax brackets, and most are lower with percentages at 10, 12, 22, 24, 32, 35 and 37%. These are in effect until 2025.

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

lines, but a recently passed piece of legislation could affect the IRAs and 401(k)s of millions of Americans beginning in 2020.

So if you have either of these accounts, or if you run a business, you'll want to learn more.

The new laws, collectively called the Setting Every Community Up for Retirement Enhancement (SECURE) Act, include these noteworthy changes:

• Higher age for RMDs – Under current law, you must start taking withdrawals - known as required minimum distributions, or RMDs from your traditional IRA and 401(k) or similar employer-sponsored plan once you turn 70 $\frac{1}{2}$. The new law pushes the date to start RMDs to 72, which means you can hold on to your retirement savings a bit longer.

• No age limit for traditional IRA contributions - Previously, you could

It might not have made the head- only contribute to your traditional IRA until you were 70 ¹/₂, but under the SECURE Act, you can now fund your traditional IRA for as long as you have taxable earned income.

• Limitation of "Stretch IRA" provisions – Under the old rules, beneficiaries were able to stretch taxable RMDs from a retirement account over his or her lifetime. Under the SECURE Act while spouse beneficiaries can still take advantage of this "stretch" distribution, most nonspouse beneficiaries will have to take all the RMDs by the end of the tenth year after the account owner passes away. Consequently, non-spouse beneficiaries who inherit an IRA or other retirement plan could have tax implications due to the need to take larger distributions in a shorter timeframe.

· No early withdrawal penalty for IRAs and 401(k)s when a new child arrives. Typically, you must pay a 10% penalty when you withdraw



funds from your IRA or 401(k) before you reach 59 1/2. But now, with the new rules, you can withdraw up to \$5,000 from your retirement plan without paying the early withdrawal penalty, as long as you take the money within one year of a child being born or an adoption becoming final.

Some provisions of the SECURE Act primarily affect business owners:

• Multi-employer retirement plans - Unrelated companies can now work together to offer employees a 401(k) plan with less administrative work, lower costs and fewer fiduciary responsibilities than individual employers now encounter when offering their own retirement plans.

 Tax credit for automatic enrollment – The new law provides a tax credit of \$500 for some smaller employers who set up automatic enrollment in their retirement plans. And a tax credit for establishing a retirement plan has been increased from \$500 to \$5,000.


• Use of annuities in 401(k) plans - It will now be easier for employers to consider including annuities as an investment option within 401(k) plans. Previously, many businesses avoided offering annuities in these plans due to liability concerns related to the annuity provider, but the new rules should help reduce these concerns.

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Color Connection

Hello again, February! Season of Mardi Gras, ground hogs and valentines. Did you know that the bright red coloring has some odd origins?

Lots of types of red dyes are made from bugs. Anytime you see an ingredient list that includes carmine, cochineal extract or "natural" Red 4, you can be sure that there's a little powdered bug in there. This type of red dye comes from a scale insect called cochineal. The word cochineal originated from the ancient Aztec words 'nochtil' meaning cactus and 'eztli' meaning blood.

Up until 10 years ago, the FDA allowed cochineal to fall under the umbrella of "natural flavoring." It is, after all, completely organic. Many people are allergic to this compound, so now it is listed independently.

Dactylopius coccus, or scale bugs, are part of the order of Hemiptera. They are part of the "true bugs" group, which contains 50,000 to 80,000 different species.

If all bugs are insects, but not all insects are bugs, how can you tell them apart? The short answer is by their mouth parts. All true bugs suck - as in suck up fluids. They have specialized piercing/sucking mouth parts to slurp up everything from plant sap to blood.

The sucking part of a scale insect or other true bug – like a bedbug, for example – is called a 'proboscis.' The proboscis is basically a beaky, semirigid straw that is rooted to the face. Other insects can have proboscis' like a bee or a butterfly. Butterflies mouthparts are more like a flexible garden hose, capable of rolling up and being stored inside the mouth.

Another way to tell a true bug from an insect is by looking at its development cycle. All true bugs go through incomplete metamorphosis, which means they hatch as nymphs from their egg. A nymph is a miniature version of the adult bug. Other insects, like a butterfly, go through complete metamorphosis. Complete metamorphosis means they start life as an egg, hatch into a grub, a worm or a caterpillar or some kind, form a cocoon of some type, and finally emerge fully adult.



by, can you guess? That's right, a scale. The ladies live out their little lives in one place. They only have one chance to move about when they are nymphs. Can you imagine that? Stuck in one place, unable to move ever? Males are luckier - they have legs!

These little scale bugs are harvested from prickly pear cacti in Peru or the Canary Islands. These bugs will be dried in the sun, crushed and then soaked in alcohol to extract their beautiful red color. About one quarter of the scale bug's body contains the acid needed to create the dye, so it takes around 70,000 bugs to create one pound of dye.

The Aztec Indians of South America discovered this little guy's secret. When the Spanish conquest happened, the Conquistadors were amazed by the bright red face paint and clothing of the natives. The Spanish brought the dye, in compressed bars, across the ocean to Spain. This red dye was a richer, darker red than seen before in Europe.

In fact, the Spanish monarchy worked to keep the source of the red dye a secret. It became a trade staple of the Spanish economy for 300 years. If you were caught smuggling dye from the New World, you faced the death penalty. The dye was second in value only to silver.

The British Army has often been referred to as Redcoats because of their uniforms. The British bought the red dye from the Spaniards.

Hopefully this little history of the color red and the little scale insect will help you see the world with rosecolored glasses. You can now be extremely well red (read) on the subject. Since you red (read) the whole article just for the corny joke at the end, you will wait no longer.


