Israeli Salad



This would be a good side dish for a Lag B'Omer picnic (May 11-12) or to cool down any hot summer day.

INGREDIENTS

- 2 Kirby or 3 Persian cucumbers, diced
- 1 red bell pepper, seeded, veins removed, diced
- 10 grape tomatoes, quartered, or 1 beefsteak tomato, diced
- 1 tablespoon fresh lemon juice
- 1 tablespoon olive oil
- ${\bf 1}$ teaspoon dried parsley or ${\bf 1}$ tablespoon fresh minced parsley
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon black pepper

Fresh cilantro <u>,za'atar spice blend</u> or additional parsley, for garnish (optional)

PREPARATION

- 1. Combine cucumbers, bell peppers, tomatoes, lemon juice, oil, parsley, salt and pepper in medium-sized bowl and mix well.
- 2. Chill for 1 hour.
- 3. Just before serving, garnish salad with fresh cilantro or parsley, if desired.

We will celebrate Shavuot on Friday, May 29, 9:30 am, with a Yizkor service followed by the recitation of the 10 Commandments which have set the stage for all Jewish law that came after.



Shavuos

The second of our three agricultural festivals is Shavuos. It is the festival of the wheat-harvest, known as the Feast of Weeks. It is celebrated on the sixth and seventh of the month of Sivan (May 29 and 30), seven weeks after the first day of Pesach' it is also know by the name Pentecost (50th day of Omer). In our

tradition it connects with the covenant on Mount Sinai, the "Season of the Giving of our Torah".

First Day of Shavuot Think of Pesah as a birth, Shavuot as a marriage, and the Revelation at Sinai as a wedding between heaven and earth. On the first night of Shavuot a number of Jews stay up intil dawn and study Torah. This session is called the Tikun Leil Shavuot (repair of Shavuot eve). In a most meaning way Shavuot, the harvest of the first fruits, celebrates the union of sky and earth. As Rabbi Bloch's grandfather said to me years ago "Son it is like the Torah falling to earth to make our ethical and religious reasoning's fertile for another year.

The Feast of Weeks has no distinctive ceremony. We decorate the synagogue and our homes with flowers and greens to bring new fertility and creativity into our lives.

Second Day of Shavuot "Now Mount Sinai was all in smoke, for the Devine had come down on in fire, the smoke rose like the smoke of a kiln and the whole mountain trembled violently. The blare of the horn grew louder and louder. As Moses spoke, the divine answered him in thunder lit with a voice." - Exodus 19:18-19

In the Babylonian Talmud (Sotah 12a), today, the second day of Shavuot, is also the day that Moses' was conceived. Concisely, the Torah and the human heart are like flour and yeast, combined to make spiritual sustenance. The special Book of Service for this purpose is know as Tikkun heyl Shavos.

The spiritual readings follow: 1st Day, Exodus 19 and 20' Haftorah, Ezekiel 1.

2nd Day, Deuteronomy 15, 19-16, 16; Haftorah, Habakuk 8. And each day, Numbers 28, 26-31 from a second Safer.

Ruth On the Second Day, The Book of Ruth is read. It is the story of a woman who forsaking idolatry, enters the covenant of Sinai, and joins the Household of Israel. We have here the love for her mother-in-law, Naomi. She gathers grain to feed Naomi and meets Boaz the landowner. He admires her courage. They fall in love and marry. They also become the ancestors, as great grandparents of King David.
