# 2023 Annual Meeting

The TAIA Annual Meeting and Membership Banquet was held January 24, 2024 in connection with the TAWC Water College in Lubbock, Tx. Some 25 members and guests enjoyed a meal at Cagles Steak & Barbeque. In the absence of President David Wiens, VP Jeromy Gowdy called the meeting to order.

Education Advisor, Dana Porter, introduced the speaker for the evening, Dr. Hope Nujki Nakabuye. Dr. Nakabuye is the recently named Assistant Professor, Irrigation Research, Texas A&M AgriLife Research, Lubbock. She briefly compared irrigated agriculture in her home country, Uganda, and the United States. She related some of her research experiences with the University of Nebraska, then introduced current research topics she will be pursuing in her hew position in Texas. One of her interesting conclusions was, "all farmers have the same heart".

Officers and board members elected were: President, Jeromy Gowdy; Vice President, JD Martinez; Secretary-Treasurer, Jason Simkins; South Region Representative, Josh Brown; At-Large Representative, Bobby De Leon; North Region Representative, Ross Roberts.

It was noted that the financial resources of TAIA continue to decline for various reasons, including the declining membership and discontinuing the High Plains Irrigation Conference which generated revenue for the Association. Considerable discussion followed on recruiting new members, raising the membership dues and fund raising activities. Action was deferred to the incoming 2024 Board of Directors.

Incoming president Jeromy Gowdy assumed the 2024 Presidency. The Presidents Plaque for 2023 will be presented to David Wiens at a later date.

# From Here and There

No day gets by without news or comments about global warming, climate change, changing weather patterns. Whatever your take is on these there is little doubt that the distribution and availability of water is critical, particularly with regard to irrigated agriculture production and its role in feeding and clothing a growing population. Water shortages are growing in the West and supplies are unable to meet all the demands of power generation, municipalities and agriculture.

The state of Texas has it's share of water supply problems as well. Of particular concern for much of Texas is the Ogallala Aquifer, largest underground storage reservoir in the US, underlying parts of eight states. Unfortunately, the Ogallala Aquifer is being depleted due to excessive withdrawals that exceed natural recharge. This depletion poses a significant challenge to the sustainability of agricultural industries and rural communities that rely on this water source.

The Ogallala Aquifer Program, beginning in 2003, is a significant initiative aimed at addressing the challenges posed by the Ogallala Aquifer. Its primary focus is on innovative scientific research and technology transfer to enhance water management practices. The program brings together various stakeholders, including producers, scientists, groundwater managers, students, and public and private organizations. Their collective efforts support research and encourage the adoption of practical approaches to extend the productive life of the Ogallala aquifer.

Scientists and researchers have made significant strides in understanding the aquifer's hydrogeology and behavior. Their findings have informed better management decisions and policies. For instance, studies on recharge rates and groundwater movement have guided efforts to protect the aquifer. A recent study in Kansas indicates 18% to 32% cut in groundwater pumping may stabilize aquifer.

Farmers and ranchers in the Ogallala region have adopted more efficient water management practices including precision irrigation techniques, soil moisture monitoring and crop rotation strategies. As a result, water use efficiency has improved, leading to sustainable agricultural production. TAIA, both as an organization and as individual members, play a significant role in the adaptation of improved irrigation water management practices.

Annual Ogallala Summit meetings are held with all of the interested entities participating. This year's Summit was held in Liberal, Kansas, March 18,19, where some 250 were in attendance with a great mix of producers and agencies. All aspects of the agricultural industry were present, from production to transportation. Seed companies, farmers and ranchers, cattle feeders, national security experts, and more gathered and had impactful round table discussions. One standout idea was the push from both cattle producers and crop producers for better and more efficient water use and consumption.

"Change is not necessary, but survival is not mandatory," was a recurring theme at the 2024 Ogallala Aquifer Summit.


These retirements remind us all of the need to recruit new members and carry TAIA forward!





# Dick Laursen Memorial Scholarship

The Dick Laursen Memorial Scholarship was created in honor of Dick Laursen, a life-long irrigation specialist. Dick was born in 1942 into a Nebraska ranching/farming family. He began his career as a purchasing agent for a pivot manufacturer; then moved on to Rainbird Ag before partnering to open SWISH Inc., an irrigation company. With his partners, Dick spent the rest of his life building SWISH, until his death in 1998. He was one of the founding members of TAIA. The scholarship was established in 2002 and has assisted students pursuing ag related majors in each of the years since.



The Scholarship Committee; Craig Jones, Edie Canale and Jeromy Gowdy reviewed and evaluated the 34 applications received for the 2014 Scholarship. Justin Hill, Dumas, was named this year's recipient.
