From the desk of the Congregational President

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

We have good news on the progress of the permit application for our mission building. We expect to have a permit in hand after the St. Mary's Health Department approves our documentation of the church's septic system. The use of the existing system for the new building eliminates the expense of having to install a new septic system or connect to METCOM.

The decommission ceremony for the chapel will be part of the 10:30 worship service on July 12. We will announce when the chapel is to be demolished. Keep watch for any schedule changes in your email, website notices, and announcements after church.

To help maintain the financial wellbeing of our church, we now have an online donation service that you can use for one time, weekly, or monthly contributions. Just go to the St. Paul's Church website and select Donation towards the bottom of the left menu navigation pane. Debit and credit cards are accepted. We hope that you will find this service convenient and useful.

Now available on the St. Paul's website are the church health metric package on the Church Business Operations page. The financial metrics cover offerings, budget expenditures, building funds, and the general operating accounts. In development are metrics for outreach which include attendance, connecting with new people, and Christian education.

The purpose of the church health metrics is twofold. First is to enable the council a better understanding of what is going on and to support decisions in utilizing resources. The second is for congregation members to gain insight to the church operations and see where they or the congregation as a whole take part in the health of St. Paul's.


Testing your Knowledge of Scripture

A Steward Thought

The people were surprised but finally agreed, since most of them did business with him and he was a trusted man. At the end of the year he gave his report:


- The church indebtedness of \$228,000 has been paid.

He quietly answered, "Most of you bring your grain to my elevator. Throughout the year, I simply withheld ten percent on your behalf and gave it to the church in your name. You didn't even miss it!"

"Do you see what we could do for the Lord if we were all willing to give at least the tithe to God, who really owns it?" he asked. And so the new treasurer had made his point.

A View from the Pew

"There is a vacant house on our road---"

There is a vacant house on our road today. Several weeks ago, while returning home, I was stopped by the intrusion of a large dumpster being backed into a driveway. There were two vans parked on the road edge in front of the house and I noticed the business lettering identifying these people as environmental disposal specialist. One of the van drivers was close enough and I



asked what happened. He said the person who lived there had "passed" (a generally used southern term to mean died) and evidently it was several weeks before anyone knew of the persons demise. During the following days, I observed the workers emptying the house of things which we surround ourselves as necessities for living.

Who was this person? Over the years, I only saw a man at the residence on two occasions! Everything was strange regarding the house, there was no grass- only wild saw grass and weeds around the limited view of the house front with an abundance of trash and containers strew everywhere. For years, there was a "No Trespassing" sign by the mailbox and on two occasions, the mailbox was dislodged from the post for months. Our mail carrier once told me that he had to contact him in person since the United States Post Office was prohibited from holding mail more than three months. I also inquired of our mail carrier at one point if there was anyone else in the house. My fears were that perhaps the man had a wife and was keeping her locked upthere were two cars in the driveway. Remember we are to be mindful of strange acting people (by Homeland Security) and perhaps my imagination got the best of me. Turns out that no one else lived there. By the way, the mailbox was once again on the ground prior to his demise. I could relate other strange actions, but that is not my point. Did this man know Jesus the Christ- was he saved?

As I relate this story, I am obliged to ask God for forgiveness for not venturing beyond the "No Trespassing" sign to meet and greet this man in the name of the Lord. Why did I not consider that this person too was acceptable to God? The truth is that I had written this --- "person off", as he was just too odd. It is only now as I pen the words that I recall 2nd Peter 3:9 (NIV) The Lord is not slow in keeping his promise, as some understand slowness. He is patient with you, not wanting anyone to perish, but everyone to come to repentance.

Thus, while I am too late to share the Gospel with this man (and I still don't know his name) - a sin of omission is now laid at my feet due to my inaction. From my perspective, I called him odd and did not heed the Holy Spirit's promptings to speak with him about Jesus. All I can do at this point is to *trust that the Judge of the earth will do right*. (Genesis 18:25, NIV.)

What do I do now? I can only ask God to renew a new spirit within me and boldly go forth daily proclaiming salvation to the unsaved irrespective of how I perceive people. Cleanse me merciful God each day that I may walk in your light. Let me begin with family, neighbors and co-workers. Pray before you speak and God will provide the words.

John 9:4 (NIV) As long as it is day we must work for Him who sent me. Night is coming when no one can work.

















I'm just not feeling it, Jesus. I know we're supposed to praise you, but too often, for me anyway, it's just words.
