

PARISH NURSE NEWS -

It is already August! Every summer goes by faster and faster! August is always the big reminder of back-to-school time and that means more kids out and about and new drivers galore. Let's talk about driving safety! As we age, several factors can affect our ability to drive. These can include:

- Stiff joints and muscles
- Vision impairment
- Hearing impairment
- Slower reflexes and even
- Medications



-Be physically active to help with strength and flexibility – Strength and Balance class will return on Tues. and Thurs. at 11am after Labor Day in Ramstad Hall – would love to see you there!

DRIVE SAFE

- -Avoid driving at certain times of the day- school drop off or pick up times and after sunset
- -Consider your car certain cars now come with parking assistance, back up cameras, and other sensors to assist with driving
- -For vision and hearing impairment always wear your corrective lenses and hearing aid and have an up-to-date prescription

Having "the talk" about when to stop driving may be difficult, but remember it is about safety. Safety for you and your loved ones and other members of the community. Here are a few questions to ask yourself to help you decide whether it is time to quit driving:

- Am I having trouble seeing road signs, exits, or lanes?
- Am I still flexible enough to turn my head to check blind spots?
- Do I get lost frequently?
- Have family or friends said they are worried about my driving?
- Have I had an increase in fender benders and accidents?
- Do I have trouble moving my foot between the pedals or do I confuse the two?

Grieving the loss of driving is a natural response. Make sure to share those feelings with others and don't bottle them up. Emotions for this step in life can be strong and it's okay to discuss those feelings with healthcare professionals or those close to you. Take steps now to plan for the various ways to access drivers or services available for transportation. Safe driving and safe back-to-school transportation for all!

Since 1972, Bismarck Meals on Wheels (MOW) has been committed to providing nutritious home-delivered meals to those in need within our community. What started as a compassionate initiative by a group of community leaders, with the support of Bismarck Hospital, has evolved into a cornerstone of support for many individuals. We owe a debt of gratitude to Sanford Hospital for their steadfast partnership in this mission, spanning over 52 years. However, as communities evolve, so must the organizations that serve them. The transition to home-delivered meals by the Burleigh-Bismarck Senior Center, supported by the Older Americans Act Nutrition Program, marks a natural progression in meeting the changing needs of our community.

As a result, Bismarck Meals on Wheels will be discontinued, effective August 31, 2024.

Thanks to all who signed up or who planned to volunteer for MOW in September. The Burleigh-Bismarck Senior Center will continue to serve those who have received meals through the MOW program. These agencies provide donated furniture at no cost.

First Presbyterian Hospitality Committee

Bismarck Public School's Students in Transition (S.I.T.) Program is charged with ensuring that children and youth who are homeless have equal access to the same free, appropriate public education as provided to all other students. These services include the right to....

- Attend school.
- Stay at the school they attended before becoming homeless
- Transportation services to and from school of origin (dependent on situation.)
- Participate in school programs and activities and receive the same school services that are offered to other children.
- Title 1 Services.
- Free/reduced meals.

In an effort to support this program, the Hospitality Committee has purchased gas gift cards to enable parents of homeless children to buy gas in order to get their children to school when other transportation options are not available. Attendance of these students is monitored and regularity in attendance will be rewarded with addition gift cards.

First Presbyterian Church has supported the S.I.T. Program in the past through a towel drive. Both our congregation and S.I.T. are members of the Missouri Valley Coalition for Homeless People. The Coalition is comprised of over 40 non-profits, government agencies, churches, businesses, and citizens all interested in assisting the needs of the homeless population.



Supporting the AARC

During **August**, the Hospitality Committee will be collecting personal hygiene products for the Abused Adult Resource Center (AARC). Donations such as soap and shampoo, razors, toothbrushes, tooth paste or feminine hygiene products are welcome. All items can be dropped off at the donation box in the church narthex.

The Abused Adult Resource Center has been helping survivors of domestic violence and sexual assault for more than 40 years. Serving south central North Dakota, they provide emergency support, crisis intervention, temporary shelter, food, counseling, and advocacy to survivors of domestic violence, sexual assault, and human trafficking.

Funding to support the Abused Adult Resource Center is a patchwork of many sources: foundation grants, the United Way, state and federal programs, profits from Seeds of Hope Gift Store as well as corporate and individual gifts.

The AARC provides all of its services to victims free of charge.
