What will be our new normal? COVID-19 restrictions have devastated us financially. Three months of no rentals

equates to a loss of nearly \$12,000. We have exhausted our available funds and are relying on SAL and the Auxiliary to cover our basic bills. We cannot afford any building repairs, and we acknowledge the potential for a secondary flu impact. We are okay until September and will reassess at that time. However, we must be prepared to face alternate paths forward. And that means potentially selling our building. Of which, the executive committee is examining several options.

We could pay to rent meeting space and host functions at the Costick Center, Library, the Elks or another Legion Post's facility. If we are profitable enough in the sale of our building, we could possibly lease storefront space on a full-time basis. That would provide potential income of renting out to smaller parties with the possibility of transferring our liqueur license to another location.

Another alternative is to merge with another Post within the 18th District. The last thing we would consider is giving up our charter and disbanding our membership. No matter where we call home, we can continue to support the mission of the American Legion.

We are not willing to give up the ship! We Need All Hands On Deck!

Many of you have donated stock items to help the clubroom stay open as well as generously contributing to the "big donation" jar. The \$10s and \$20s there are very much appreciated. Members have also sent in checks for \$50, \$100 and more. We'll raise clubroom prices a bit and continue to enjoy our extended outdoor seating area on those glorious Michigan evenings, Monday - Friday: 4pm - 9pm. Eventually, we can also do some summer cookouts to raise money while providing a safe space to get together with our membership and friends.

While we wait for those rentals to start coming back, we need fundraisers to get use through once circumstances permit. Are there any volunteers out there to help pull together patriotic activities to reenergize and uplift our veterans and the community? A fair or car show would bring in some cash while we sell dogs and beverages. How about a giant garage sale where members can donate items and we could rent out some spaces to vendors?

Queen of Hearts Tickets are on sale now (\$1 each) with the first drawing on July 20th. Do you have an idea on where to target pre-sales of Queen of Hearts tickets? This is potentially good money for us as we keep 50% of the sales. We all need to keep brainstorming ideas... keep thinking... and start doing!

Should you be included in the Camp Lejeune Historic Drinking Water notification database?

In the 1980s, some of Camp Lejeune's drinking water wells were found to be affected by unregulated industrial chemicals. We do not know if past exposure to these chemicals in Camp Lejeune's drinking water caused adverse health effects in specific individuals. Our goal is to use the best



available science in an effort to provide our Marine Corps family members the answers they deserve and keep them updated as information becomes available. Since 1991 we have supported scientific and public health organizations that are studying these issues. We continue to work diligently to identify and notify individuals who, in the past, may have been exposed to chemicals in the drinking water.

The Agency for Toxic Substances and Disease Registry's (ATSDR) Morbidity Study of Former Marines, Employees, and Dependents Potentially Exposed to Contaminated Drinking Water at U.S. Marine Corps Base Camp Lejeune has been released. The Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) finalized a new rule on 13 January 2017 to consider eight diseases as presumptive for service connection. This presumptive service connection provides VA disability benefits to veterans who have one of eight diseases and served for no less than 30 days (consecutive or nonconsecutive) on permanent or temporary duty at Camp Lejeune between 1 August 1953 and 31 December 1987. Registered individuals will be notified of results from the latest scientific studies as they are finalized.

The Marine Corps is committed to finding and encouraging all those who lived or worked at USMC Base Camp Lejeune, NC in 1987 or before to be included in the Camp Lejeune Historic Drinking Water notification database. Reports of Fake COVID-19Testing Sites <u>- from AARP magazine</u>

Officials across the U.S. are warning about a worrisome new fraud involving fake drive-through coronavirus testing sites in several states. The FBI is investigating fake test sites in Kentucky, Alabama, Arizona, Florida, Georgia, New York and Washington state, government and nonprofit officials tell AARP.

James, a local retired police officer in Kentucky, hadn't heard of a local hospital offering drive-through tests in church parking lots and at homeless shelters. So he traveled to one site accompanied by a local consumer advocate. There was a line of waiting cars. People seeking COVID-19 tests were told to pay \$240 in cash or give their Medicare or Medicaid cards and Social Security cards to verify their identity. People who paid for tests told him that specimen collectors did not change their gloves between tests and could have been spreading the virus to others. The testing groups who had offered pop-up, drive-through services at different sites over four days, were run out of town. Kentucky residents experiencing symptoms have now been advised to seek COVID-19 testing only from hospitals, health care providers or government resources.

The FBI advises consumers to use only approved testing sites affiliated with trusted hospitals and providers. Be wary of people wearing clothing and uniforms resembling those worn by workers collecting hazardous material instead of legitimate personal protective equipment. The FBI also warned of exorbitant upfront cash fees for tests and cautioned Medicare recipients to stay away from testing advertised as "free to Medicare beneficiaries" because it usually isn't.

The vice president of Washington-based National Health Care Anti-Fraud Association says "Where there is fear, there are dollars to be made." Beware of testing sites that advertise on social media. Legitimate medical testing sites don't demand cash for tests and don't set up sites in church or gas station parking lots. If the testing is not done at a hospital or clinic, be suspicious. And don't give any personal information to anyone but your personal providers. All scammers need is your Medicare number and they can compromise your entire life. If you are interested in getting testing, consult your trusted physician.
