What's Blooming At Edison & Ford Winter Estates? -

Visitors to Edison & Ford Winter Estates often ask me about which plants to use as hedges. Creating a privacy hedge can be a great landscape feature to hide swimming pools, unsightly buildings, undesirable views or as a buffer between



neighbors. Before you can select the type of plants to use, you must first decide what you want to accomplish and ask yourself if you are prepared to maintain the desired look.

There are several other questions that need to be answered before selecting the plants. I've created a checklist for homeowners to go over before purchasing any shrubs for use as a hedge. This checklist includes several things to consider, including sun exposure, water needs, maintenance and care (trimming and fertilizer), disease issues, space and esthetic beauty.

First, consider the design of the home. The hedge style should coordinate with the home's architectural design. If the design is formal, then hedges should be formal. In this case, a single plant species clipped frequently to keep the hedge symmetrical will coordinate well. This type of hedge is grown in a straight line usually along the perimeter of the property. Shrubs with small leaves work well in a formal-style hedge, such as podocarpus, many of the *Eugenias* varieties, silver buttonwood, Simpson's stopper and wax myrtle.

If the style of the home is more tropical, a hedge with groupings of three to five specimens loosely planted will achieve an appropriate look. This type of hedge can be created by alternating three of one kind and five of another – just repeat the pattern for the desired length.

If you want to have a more natural looking hedge, select from crotons, copperleaf, red-tipped cocoplum, clusia, large leaf viburnum (awabuki) and carissa. Many of these plants don't like to be pruned too much and won't work in a formal hedge design. Simpson's stopper and cocoplum are best grown as a tree form.

The amount of sunlight and water a plant needs for optimal growth must also be considered. Shrubs that get too much

irrigation without adequate sunlight will wind up with disease issues. Most hedges prefer full sun and adequate water at the root zone. Some shrubs, such as the silver buttonwood will develop a black substance similar to a fungus on the leaves if adequate sunlight isn't provided.

Available space is another very important consideration. When planting a hedge next to a house, be sure to allow sufficient room for growth. Typically, planting 3 to 4 feet away from the foundation is adequate; however, sometimes additional space is needed. It's important that the plant will have enough room to grow on all sides.

Proper pruning will keep the hedge looking its best. Branches should be pruned shorter at the top of the shrub than at the bottom. Selective pruning allows for light to penetrate through to the bottom of the plant, keeping the hedge full and lush.

When several types of specimens are used in groupings, it's not as noticeable if one plant dies or needs to be removed. This type of hedge allows for greater diversity and doesn't

depend on one type of plant. A few years ago, ficus hedges were very popular. Many people had problems with the ficus whitefly infesting their shrubs, which caused most of the leaves to fall off the plant.

In Southwest Florida, many homeowners plant rows of areca palms close together to serve as a privacy hedge along property lines and pools. Areca palms (*Dypsis lutescens*) can be messy as they drop palm fronds regularly. There are also many nutrient deficiencies that are attributed to these palms, so they require a large amount of fertilizer to keep them looking healthy. Two often-seen problems with these palms include yellowing fronds and an inability to tolerate cold temperatures.

Hedges have many great benefits, including the ability to attract wildlife, produce oxygen, sequester carbon, and provide esthetic value as well as exercise for the gardener. The most important item concerning gardens is to enjoy the space we are provided and make an informed choice with the help of a horticulturist. 

Lee County's First Female Welding Graduate Goes To Work

Janet De La Cruz has always been inspired by the teachers in her life. When she was younger, she first wanted to be an elementary school teacher and later a speech language pathologist.

"In elementary school, I had the most amazing music teacher so that was my inspiration for wanting to teach," she said.

Her career would take a drastic turn as a student at East Lee County High School, once again thanks to a teacher.

"My teacher, Mr. Filler was talking to me about what type of electives I could take," she said. "He talked about nursing, firefighting and emergency technicians, but those weren't really me."

Then he told her about welding.

"He said, 'Basically you'll be playing with fire,' and I said, 'That sounds awesome!'"

From the first class, De La Cruz was hooked and fell in love with welding. That elective led her to pursue dual enrollment her senior year in order to earn an industry certification through Fort Myers Technical College (FMTC).



The welding technology class at Fort Myers Technical College provides a fastpaced, highheat learning environment for its students. De La Cruz was the class's only female welding student.

In May, she became Lee County's first female student to receive an A m e r i c a n Welding Society certification and recently started her full-time career as




a welder with Direct Industrial Products and Machining in LaBelle.

"Women are better welders," said Michael Landrum, welding instructor at FMTC. "They have the three things that all my students need to succeed: patience, attention to detail and focus."

When Brent Kettler, executive director with the Hendry County Economic Development Council and a member of the FutureMakers Coalition, learned of De La Cruz's certification, he reached out to Mark Chapman, president of Direct to tell him about her accomplishments.

Direct is an industrial construction supply store and fabrication/machine shop that has partnered with the FutureMakers Coalition in the past on student mentoring. Chapman offered De La Cruz a position with his company the day of her interview.



"This is a great example of how the FutureMakers Coalition's effort to connect education and business to transform the workforce is working," said Kettler. "Business education partnerships are the key to filling in-demand jobs, improving the economy and creating social mobility."

"Oftentimes students will get a certification or degree but then don't know where to turn to get a job," De La Cruz added. "FMTC was so great because our instructor would bring businesses into the school to talk to us and tell us about career opportunities. It was really helpful for a student like me who wanted to go to work as soon as I finished school."

The FutureMakers Coalition's goal is to transform our workforce by increasing the number of Southwest Florida residents with degrees, certificates and other high-quality credentials by the year 2025.

celery, garlic and onions briefly. Add broth and wire whisk pan to remove meat pieces.

Return beef cubes, add spices and potatoes. Add carrots, sliced mushrooms, green beans, diced tomatoes and tomato paste. Simmer for 11/2 hours. Add barley and simmer very slowly for 1 more hour. Chop parsley and add to top. Can serve with noodles or rice. Serves 8 to 10.

Mailbox Maintenance And Repair

Mailbox doors have a closure spring that eventually breaks after thousands of openings. It is important to replace them as soon as they are discovered as they usually result in a broken door,




which is a much more expensive repair. Call Dennis Shelley, (239) 887-1042. The cost of installing a new spring is \$34. If the door casting breaks, it costs an additional \$112 to repair the door. Dennis also has specially manufactured flagpole holders to match the lampposts. They are available for \$89 installed. Your mailbox and lamppost can also be repainted for \$49, which will bring them back to their "like-new" appearance. Dennis also offers handyman services.

The heavy rain and flooding that recently pounded Southwest Florida have left many homeowners with leaky roofs, water intrusion, loose tree limbs, and crumbling infrastructure. If you are one of those affected by Mother Nature, listen up!



The Lee County Sheriff's Office realizes you want to have your problems repaired as quickly as possible so you can regain a sense of normalcy; however, the mindset to rush into repairs without first doing your homework can leave you vulnerable to fly-by-night con artists looking to make a quick buck by way of home improvement scams. Fortunately, you can avoid being left with an empty wallet and unfinished repair work by following these tips that will help you steer clear of a shameless scammer:

• Avoid door-to-door solicitations at all costs. Hiring someone who randomly provides an unsolicited offer is a disaster waiting to happen. Many of these scammers have little to no experience in home repair, use high-pressure sales tactics, quote too good to be true prices and ask for payment up front.

1. Check for complaints with the Better Business Bureau.

2. Contact the DBPR (Division of Business and Professional Regulation) to verify professional licensing.

3. Confirm they have a business tax receipt with your county or city tax department.

4. Check the Division of Workers' Compensation for proof of coverage.

5. Ask for proof of general liability insurance.

• Insist on a written contract detailing the work to be done, terms of service, etc.

• Never pay in full before the work is finished, especially when paying with cash.

Lee County Yard Waste Regulations

- Do not place out for pickup more than 24 hours early
- Yard waste must be containerized (50 pounds or less), or securely tied into bundles not heavier than 50 pounds and no longer than 6 feet in length.
- Up to 50 pounds of unbundled palm fronds may be placed at the curb. Any excess palm fronds must be tied into bundles, each weighing 50 pounds or less.
- When using plastic bags, make sure that the contents can be easily identified by the refuse truck driver (leave a twig or small branch sticking out).
- Call 239-337-0800 for a cost estimate for large-scale yard waste disposal projects when containerizing or bundling is difficult.
