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Write Tight

I first heard that Write tight. admonition about two years ago in a discussion about flash writing. Writing tight is using a minimum number of words in a sentence to express an idea. Wordy sentences and flowery language can muddle what the writer is trying to convey and can frustrate and confuse the reader. Years ago, following a lengthy parental lecture my then-teenaged daughter remarked that her father was a "galloping elaborator." Writing tight means that the author avoids galloping elaboration. The best writing is economical. simple, efficient language to evoke vivid, specific images.

A writer's first draft many times is messy, wordy, and convoluted. Developing ideas often flow faster from the mind than a pen can move across paper or fingers tap on a keyboard. A conscious effort to express those thoughts in a concise manner can interfere with creative flow. The process of fine-tuning ideas and polishing expression takes place during editing. Writing tight is actually *editing* tight.

To ensure that one's writing is tight the first step is to eliminate unnecessary words. Rambling sentences filled with repetitious details should be hacked down to

concise statements. Strong verbs can replace the need for excessive reliance on adverbs. *It was obvious that he was very*

angry when he walked into the room becomes He stomped into the room. Words that have specific meanings result in tighter writing than the use of vague words. He got whatever things he needed for school and put them in his backpack is made tighter by stating He put his homework, notebook, and pen into his backpack. Tight writing is characterized by active verbs. Passive tense verbs can result in longer sentences that are often less precise. To eliminate the passive, make sure that the subject does the action rather than being acted upon. The gift for the birthday was purchased by his sister would become His sister purchased the birthday gift.

Writing can be tightened during editing by eliminating unnecessary words, by selecting strong verbs and precise nouns, and by using the active tense. It is a good practice to approach editing with a clear, objective mind that is best achieved by allowing some time to pass between writing and editing. A rule of thumb is to sleep on it. Another good habit is to read your writing out loud. When reading silently, your eyes can skip over words or insert words that are not there. Meeting the challenge of minimum word Flash Writing contests is another method of honing efficient writing techniques. practice and perseverance you can write tighter and avoid the ignominious fate of becoming a galloping elaborator.

General Information:

- 1. Open to any person age 15 or older.
- 2. Entries **must** be postmarked **between Oct. 1 and Nov. 30, 2020!** Entries posted earlier or later will NOT be accepted and will not be judged, nor will fees be refunded.
- 3. Categories with fewer than 5 entries are not eligible for prizes but may be critiqued, and, if possible, they may be added to another category for judging.
- 4. See categories, descriptions, maximum lengths and entry fees on page 3. Do **not count the title** of your entry in your final word count.
- 5. All entries must be your original work, unpublished as of October 1, 2020. Publication on the Internet is publication. The work must not have earned a cash award in any previous **AWG**<u>ANNUAL</u> Contest. However, Honorable Mentions from past annual contests may be re-entered and <u>any</u> AWG monthly members-only-contest entry is eligible if it fits the category. Use font size 12. No fancy fonts! Text should only be on one side of each page.
- 6. Cover Sheet (applies to ALL entries): <u>Each entry</u> must have a <u>separate</u> cover sheet. Upper left corner: your name, complete address, telephone number and email address. Upper right corner: list category and number of words or lines. <u>Space down to middle of page and center your title on the cover sheet.</u> <u>DO NOT PUT YOUR NAME ON ANY OTHER PAGE.</u>

First pages of entries of Poetry and Flash Fiction: Upper right corner: list category, (Rhy P, Unrhy P, FP or FF), and number of lines or words. Center the title of your entry, double space down and begin. Single space only! NO AUTHOR'S NAME on this page!

<u>First pages of Prose Categories 5-9</u>: Must be typed and DOUBLE-SPACED, with one-inch margins. Upper right corner: list category and number of words. Do not count your title in the number of words. Center your title, double-space down and begin manuscript. On any succeeding pages, type entry title and page number in upper right corner. <u>NO AUTHOR'S NAME</u> on any page.

To Mail Entries: Staple your cover sheet to your entry. Attach payment with a paper clip to your entry. For multiple entries, be sure your check covers all entries. If you want your entry/entries returned with judges' comments, please provide a large enough SASE with adequate postage, otherwise your entry will be discarded on or after May 31, 2021. (Rule of thumb: 1 stamp per 5 pages in a #10 letter-size envelope.) Our judges, professionals in their fields, are asked to critique each entry, but we cannot guarantee they will all comply.

Reminder: As in the majority of writing contests, entries not meeting the guidelines will be disqualified and fees will not be refunded. Please follow the rules carefully. **Decisions of the judges are final**. Winners will be announced at our Annual Awards Workshop to be held in March 2021, and will be published on our Website by April 15, 2021. Prizes will be sent to winners who cannot attend. Please check our website and/or newsletter for location, date and time of the March Workshop and other details. Entries will be available for pickup immediately following the Workshop.
