TREASURERS REPORT Through the end of January 2021

Two HOA Certificates of Deposit matured in the month of January. Most of the money from these accounts were used to open two new CDs at Redwood Credit Union. Interest rates are in the cellar nowadays, so we will be taking a hit on interest income over the next few years until interest rates start going back up. On the other side of ledger, our expenses for the first month of 2021 were lower in all categories. and in total we under budget by about \$4200 for the year. We also carried over a nice cushion of cash from last year, which will come in handy to help cover the cost of planned projects this year. We have three delinquent resident accounts for a total of about \$1087, which the management company is in the process of addressing. In summary, we are starting off 2021 in very good financial shape.

LANDSCAPING NOTES

At the February HOA Board meeting the proposed lawn revitalization project was approved and Waldron was notified. The

work will be scheduled. Fertilization of the lawn and shrubs COVID, the California DMV has has already been completed. A quarterly schedule will be worked out and Waldron will provide the committee with this information. Work on the irrigation conversion was also approved with a cost cap of \$5000 for this segment. This work has also begun and time and material costs will be monitored. The current location of this work is on St James Dr. So far. this project is progressing well. Our Waldron crew continues with spring trimming and lawn care. Currently our irrigation is turned off but is monitored weekly for need in relation to rain.

EDITOR'S NOTES

Next in my house journey. Our attic was unbearably hot. Spray and foam insulation solved that problem, it's amazing how much insulation works. Then we installed an exhaust attic fan in each attic. They go on when it's 80 degrees and then off automatically. Genius. There's one big fan company that everyone uses. Home Depot sells out in Summer. Buy now if you want one.

In order to vent out the front and back, you have to adds grills that work. Our front vent was just a prop, didn't vent at all. I found a woodworking company in Texas who makes any size wooden vents. Paint them and they look like they've been there forever.

Last thing I'm in process with are Vulcan vents. You replace existing vents with vents that automatically close when the temperature is high enough to burn. This prevents burning embers from coming into your house in case of wild fires.

We also sealed the under the house crawlspace with heavy plastic that seals all water out and makes it much easier for the plumber and electrician to crawl in a clean space and it prevents anything from growing down there.

We put in an electronic air cleaner, garage door and opener and all new appliances: hybrid electric hot

water heater and hybrid electric dryer. They are very energy efficient.

We also fixed all the downspouts and underground drains that were broken. Finally, 6 inches of the top soil/rock in the garden was removed, new sprinkler and iPhone-controlled sprinkler timer. And that's it, I think! If you are thinking of doing any or all of what we did, we did it because something was broken or half working. For example, our dishwasher filled with water, it was 2 hours til PGE black out and then nothing. They had to wheel it out of the kitchen with water and detergent in it. That's what started all these projects. That lousy dishwasher!

Julia Child's French Onion Soup Recipe

Cook 90 minutes · Makes 6 ·

Ingredients

- 2 tablespoons butter
- 1/4 cup olive oil
- 3 lbs onions, halved and sliced thin
- 2 cloves garlic, minced very fine
- 1 teaspoon granulated sugar
- 2 cups dry white wine
- 6 cups beef stock or chicken stock (the beef will make a darker, more robust soup)
- salt and freshly ground black pepper
- 6 ovenproof soup bowls
- 12 toasted slices of French baguettes, 1/2 inch thick
- 2 cups swiss cheese, grated
- 3 teaspoons parmesan cheese, grated

Directions

In a large saucepan over medium heat melt the butter and oil together.

Add the onions, garlic, and sugar. Saute until slightly colored, stirring occasionally (don't stir too much - you want them to brown) for 7 minutes.

Add the white wine, raise temperature to medium high, and bring to a boil.

Lower temperature back down to medium and cook for 5 minutes.

Add the stock, raise temperature to medium high and bring to a simmer.

Lower temperature to low and simmer *uncovered* for 1-1/2 hours (90 minutes).

At this point you can freeze the soup for reheating later (after thawing).

To serve at this point, continue with steps: first, preheat your broiler.

Ladle the soup into the ovenproof soup bowls (6 of them).

Place two slices of toasted baguette onto the top of each soup bowl.

Sprinkle each serving with 1/3 cup of Swiss cheese, then 1/2 teaspoon of Parmesan cheese.

Place soup bowls onto a baking sheet and place in oven under preheated broiler.

Broil until the cheese melts (watch them carefully - depending on your broiler and how far the rack is from the heat, it can take anywhere to 45 to 90 seconds or so).

Serve immediately.
