

Carry

[Jesus said] "I have much more to say to you, more than you can now bear." John 16:12

Christian writer Corrie ten Boom tells a story about her father. As a child, Corrie was a very curious little girl. Once, however, she asked her father to explain a subject she was still far too young to handle. But rather than ignore her, Corrie's father did something in that moment to teach her a profound truth.

He was a watchmaker by trade, and at that time a travel case full of his watches and spare parts happened to be sitting next to him. He pointed to his travel case and asked, "Corrie, could you please carry this for me?" Corrie walked over to the case and tried. But the travel case was far too much for her to lift.

"It's too heavy," she said.

"Yes," her father replied, "and it would be a pretty poor father who would ask his little girl to carry such a load. It's the same way, Corrie, with knowledge. When you are older and stronger, you can bear it. For now, you must trust me to carry it for you."

Our Lord has the same loving attitude toward you and me. It goes without saying that there are many twists and turns in our lives. As you and I experience those twists and turns, ups and downs, it can be very easy to ask the question, "Why?" "Why is this happening to me now? Why is this happening to a member of my family? Why are things not going as I planned? Why is the Lord allowing this into my life?"

There are many possible answers to our questions, of course. But when the answers are not immediately apparent, remember the Lord's heart. His heart pulsates with a love for you and me we will never fully grasp. It's the same love that drove him to march to the cross and carry our sins away. All this he has done to make us his own.

Remember his heart when you are carrying a burden that seems too heavy to bear and you wonder "Why?" He may not reveal the answer immediately. But know that he loves you. And, he can carry what you can't.

Prayer:

Lord Jesus, when I am perplexed by what is happening and burdened with a load too heavy to bear, remind me of your love and carry what I can't. Amen.

The following is a little information on Pastor Luetke.

Julie and I (Pastor Joel Luetke) were married in 1976 in June at her home church of Salem, Owosso, Michigan. I was a vicar at St. Paul in Ottawa, Canada. There our first children – twins – were born. The Lord has blessed us with 5 children and 16 grandchildren.

I am a 1978 graduate of Wisconsin Lutheran Seminary. I served full time in two locations: Resurrection in Virginia Beach, Virginia, for nearly 20 years. While there I watched and worked as Resurrection daughtered 3 congregations. In 1998 I began ministry at Zion in Olivia, Minnesota. There the area pastors were in a cooperative ministry working to serve four congregations. In 2014 these congregations opened Little Lambs Learning Center, in Danube. I retired one year ago. The Lord enabled us to purchase a home here in Watertown about ½ mile south of LPS.

In retirement I have continued to serve 316NOW (formerly China Partners) by teaching various courses for Asian Christians [online] and by preparing some of the courses we offer through Grace Bible Institute. I have done some supply preaching in the area during the last year and serve about 6 times a year bringing God's Word to men and women at the Jefferson County jail. Julie works as a job coach for Bethesda here in Watertown and various places in Dodge and Jefferson counties. She enjoys this work very much.

Proclaiming the gospel in Dodge County, WI



The Praise & Proclaim training took place in Juneau this past June. About seventy people showed up for the training that included several guests from nearby congregations. They learned how to use tools to engage people in their community, invite them to a specific event hosted by the congregation, and eagerly give reasons for the hope they have in Christ.

In conjunction with the training, Praise and Proclaim organizes an opportunity for members to immediately put their training into action. The leadership team chose Horicon as a place to go door-to-door and help bolster their efforts in that community.

The city of Horicon is unique. With a population of around 3,500, there is a definitive small-town feel. Yet, a John Deere plant that employs a thousand people dominates the city landscape. The company is planning on expanding in Horicon and purchased hundreds of acres of farmland just outside the city limits to build a new plant. The timing is perfect for St. John's to launch another ministry site in Dodge County.

In conjunction with the outreach initiative, Praise and Proclaim encouraged St. John's to organize a community event to invite people to attend. When canvassing a community, we have found it to be very helpful to invite people to attend a community event organized by the congregation. The event gives instant credibility to the church and expresses that the congregation is not just interested in themselves, but cares about the entire community. This enables a member at the door a smoother transition to sharing a short gospel message. The citizens from Horicon were invited to hear a presentation from Dale Schmidt, the Dodge County Sheriff, about the growing opioid crisis that is affecting the community.

Less than a third of the people we met in Horicon told us that they were already members of a local church. There is a nearby Catholic church and a Lutheran Church (LCMS) in the city. The remaining number of people we met at the door did not express that they had a church home. This was another great opportunity for congregations in Wisconsin to learn that most of the people living in their community are unchurched and need to hear about Jesus. They never heard a clear gospel message of what Jesus has already done for us. Though many people may have grown up in a church or even attended a parochial school, they have stopped going to church. One young lady we met at the door was a perfect example. She happened to drive home when two "Praise and Proclaimers" were at her door. After learning about the new church in Horicon, she was interested to learn more. She had attended a Lutheran school in the area but had stopped attending church. She welcomed and appreciated our visit. There is a growing number of young adults in the upper Midwest who are like this young lady. They are just waiting to receive a personal invitation from a member. Even though church is still part of the Wisconsin culture, the message of Jesus has become lost. This is true even in rural areas.

The Lord blessed our efforts in two ways. First, he provided fabulous sunny days and temperatures in the 70s. Second, the city leaders of Horicon had organized a city-wide rummage sale that same day. Cars were pouring into the city on Saturday morning and there seemed to be a rummage sale on every block. It became a wonderful opportunity to greet and talk to several people at once.











At the end of the day, members from St. John's Lutheran knocked on the doors of 780 homes in Horicon and talked to almost 200 hundred people. As farmers were sowing their seeds in the fields that day, faithful WELS members from Dodge County were sowing seeds of the gospel. Members from St. John's were provided an opportunity to discover the power of providing the face of the congregation when going door-to-door. Granted, many people will not express interest to hear more about the gospel, but they are willing to meet a member from a local congregation in their community.

In conjunction with the outreach initiative, half of the participating members received an opportunity to employ a similar methodology and approach to making a follow-up visit with visitors and prospects. The visits were very positive. One young mother of four children had moved back into the area in the past year. She expressed gratitude for the visit and wanted the members to know that she is interested in having her young children be baptized. The members who made the follow-up visits expressed gratitude for the experience. May the Lord continue to bless the ongoing gospel ministry at St. John's Lutheran Church that is being led by Rev. David Brandt and Rev. Paul Schupmann. It is a blessing for them to have a summer vicar, Timothy Walsh, to help provide members an opportunity to further their training by visiting people in Dodge County and planting seeds of the gospel.

<u>Dodge County Human Services and Health Aging and Disability Resource Center</u>

Most of us dream of doing great things. Great things often start with small things in a great way. Do you want to do something small to help others? The Dodge County Human Services and Health Aging and Disability Resource Center (ADRC) is in need of people willing to help others.

Many of the ADRC programs rely on volunteers to successfully bring services to those in need. When we have a shortage of volunteers, not everyone who requests help receives it. We presently are in need of volunteers in the transportation and nutrition programs. All volunteers receive mileage reimbursement at the current IRS rate. You can choose to drive as little as one day or up to five days a week.

The transportation program offers rides Monday through Friday to those who otherwise would be unable to get to a needed appointment such as a visit to the doctor or to get groceries. The appointments are both within and outside of Dodge County. The nutrition drivers help deliver the meals on wheels to our homebound clients in the Dodge County area. Currently, meals are delivered in and around Beaver Dam, Horicon, Hustisford, Juneau, Lomira, Reeseville, Mayville, Randolph, and Watertown.

L DON'T DESERVE THIS!

Someone—feeling that life is unfair—may say or think these words. Christians could also utter them. However, by faith, they convey a completely different meaning.

Jesus and his disciples left Judea for Galilee. Unlike their countrymen, they traveled through Samaria. Eventually, they arrived at Sychar, the location of Jacob's well. Jesus sent his disciples to town to buy food while he waited at the well.

A Samaritan woman came to draw water. Jesus asked her for a drink. Immediately, her defenses went up. "You are a Jew and I am a Samaritan woman. How can you ask me for a drink?" (John 4:9). She knew that Jews did not associate with Samaritans or even share their cups. However, Jesus would not be dissuaded. He said, "If you knew the gift of God and who it is that asks you for a drink, you would have asked him and he would have given you living water" (v. 10).

This woman did not realize that the long-awaited Messiah sat before her. After further conversation, Jesus revealed, "I am he" (v. 26). This woman did not deserve this. Jesus could have avoided Samaria. He could have said nothing when she approached the well. He could have ended the conversation after her rebuttal. Yet, by grace, he revealed himself to her as well as to "many of the Samaritans from that town [who] believed in him because of the woman's testimony" (v. 39).

Those in Sychar did not deserve this. Neither do we.

We are "enemies of God" (Hebrews 10:27) through unbelief. We have "turned from following him and [have] no regard for any of his ways" (Job 34:27). This alone is grounds for God's rejection.

Yet, by grace, he reveals Christ to us through his Word. Scripture provides the gospel's "living water" (John 4:10) to identify Jesus as "that Messiah called Christ ... [who] will explain everything" (v. 25).

"I don't deserve this!" No. It should be, "I don't deserve <u>this</u>"—"the incomparable riches of [God's] grace, expressed in his kindness to us in Christ Jesus" (Ephesians 2:7).

My Mission Journey: Forest

Wisconsin Lutheran Chapel on the University of Wisconsin – Madison campus sent out a Mission Journeys team during their spring break to assist Fount of Life Lutheran Church in Colorado Springs, Colo., with canvassing and handing out invitations for worship and the pre-school program. Forest Wu, a senior at UW-Madison, was a member of the team and shares his experience:

Another semester, another spring break, and a mission trip – all in my final year at UW-Madison. It has been an ongoing tradition at Wisconsin Lutheran Chapel to invite college students to go on mission trips during spring break. Instead of becoming a "couch Cheeto" and binge-watching "The Office", students are provided an opportunity to do something memorable for themselves, interact in a community, and most importantly, to serve the Lord.

With the help of the WELS Mission Journey program, and through the support and prayers from our homes and the local congregation, I joined Pastor Bilitz and five other students. We were invited to serve Fount of Life in Colorado Springs, Colo. For two days, we canvased through neighborhoods in teams; we walked a total of 25 miles! In total, we handed out 2,700 invitations for people to come to worship or to check out the church's pre-school program. In fact, by God's blessing, some people had already expressed an interest after our first day.

During our canvassing, we were also fortunate enough to talk to some residents and personally invite them to church. Contrary to the expected rejections, most were



happy to take the invitations while some even identified themselves as Christians. This experience reminded me of the time Elijah felt he was the only believer, but God said to him "Yet I reserve seven thousand in Israel – all whose knees have not bowed down to Baal and whose mouths have not kissed him." (2 Kings 19:18) To me, as a college student in a secular college such as UW-Madison, this is the comfort I needed to spread his gospel. Coming back from the mission trip, I have been more comfortable sharing my beliefs, especially in my Philosophy class and Theatre class, and I am comforted to find that it is true – I am not the only believer left, even in my secular community.

If you want to do something more to serve the Lord in your downtime, I recommend (12 out of 10!) participating in mission trips. Not only will you see the wonders that he has made, but God might also use and inspire you in an unexpected yet wonderful way.

True Community

One of the challenges of serving in an eastern Canadian context is the strong influence of the Roman Catholic Church. Ontario is full of folks who have a "Catholic background," but have not gone to church in years. This is a challenge for us because many people believe that they know "The Church" already and know that they don't like it because of their experience with a Roman Catholic Church.

However, we have found that one thing that breaks that barrier is true community. That's what happened with Ambyr. Ambyr grew up Catholic but was not attending church when she was invited to come to Cross of Life by her boyfriend, Nicholas (a life-long member of Cross of Life). And though she would say that not everything made sense to her right away and that she was nervous to be in a Lutheran church when she grew up Catholic, she kept coming back because she found a community. She found people who actually cared about her and wanted to see her at church.

She requested to take Faith Builders (our Bible Information Class) with me every week at a Tim Horton's. Sometimes we just drank coffee and chatted about life, sometimes we studied Scripture, but all the time I got to be part of her life and show her that church is more than a big scary institution. It's people who love Jesus and love people. During the class, she learned how free the grace of God actually is, and she was hooked. "Cross of Life has changed my life," she has said to me multiple times.

But that's not all. We confirmed Ambyr into our fellowship in January, and since then, she has joined a Bible study group, volunteered to help with A/V at worship, has brought a couple friends to Cross of Life, and all of this without even owning a car. She has to bus or taxi everywhere she goes. In fact, she has been so committed, that one time she even paid for a \$40 taxi ride to get to church because she was volunteering for worship. Would you still come to church if it cost you \$40 just to get there?

Oh, and one other thing: Ambyr is 19. She's part of the generation that the church is struggling to reach. If Ambyr is any indication, maybe the best strategy for reaching young people is to just take time to love them enough to buy them coffee, listen to their story, and share Jesus with them for a couple weeks. No one is saying it's efficient, but it's certainly what builds true community.

God has truly worked a good thing in Ambyr's heart, and our congregation is blessed to have her. And it all happened because someone invited someone they cared about, a congregation shared the love of Christian community, and a pastor shared the gospel.

I am reminded of Philip's sharing of the gospel with the Ethiopian in Acts 8. Philip didn't have to do any "pre-evangelism" or make a special program to get the man in the door. No, God set him up for success. All he had to do was share Jesus. Of course not all mission work is like that, and in a country like Canada that is even more post-Christian that the United States, frankly, it rarely is. But it's stories like Ambyr's that remind you that God knows his sheep, and his sheep know his voice. We just simply open our mouths to let his voice be heard.
