This is an amazing group of young ladies who combine for a GPA of better than 3.9 and are all top quality role models, members of the National Honor Society, and significant contributors to school and community activities.

In the process of writing sports articles, I have had the pleasure of visiting with countless student-athletes in the district and neighboring communities. It never surprises me how many of these amazing young people are strong, responsible students and top quality people destined to make our world a little better. These four are perfect examples.

In my comments prior to the game, I men-

tioned my mother's plaque that said, "Every child needs people in their life that believe the sun rises and sets on them." As their coach, I checked with NASA on this and the sun does indeed rise and set on these four student leaders.

The Mariners started strong with a pressure defense that helped them build a twenty point lead and the Mariners never looked back. Both seniors had strong performances. First Witness CAC Brings Prevention Training to Lake County Youth-Serving Organizations

LAKE COUNTY, MN - First Witness Child Advocacy Center is seeking organizations in Lake County interested in receiving Safe and Strong Communities training.

Safe and Strong Communities is a prevention training presented to adults in youth-serving agencies, faith organizations, sports leagues, and beyond. Participants learn how to recognize, respond to, and report child abuse. Safe and Strong Communities delves into dynamics of child abuse, how to respond to a child in a trauma-informed way, red flags of child

abuse, child resilience, Safe and Strong Child© body safety curriculum, and more.

Community-based prevention is key to help everyone stay safe in our communities. The Safe and Strong Communities prevention training supports adults as they interact with and hear disclosures from children, setting the stage for the beginning of each child's healing process.

This training also meets the requirements for Mandated Reporter Training. Mandated Reporters are "professional or professional's delegate who [are] engaged in the practice of the healing arts, social services, hospital administration, psychological or psychiatric treatment, child care, education, correctional supervision, probation and correctional services, or law enforcement; [or] employed as a member of the clergy and received the information while engaged in ministerial duties" (MN Statute 260E.06). An adult does not need to be a mandated reporter to take this training, and all adults who interact with children would benefit.

Safe and Strong Communities can be offered as an in-person or virtual live training by one of First Witness' trainers; the method of training would be dependent on community needs. There is no cost for organizations in Lake County to take this training.
