May Your Family Know The Mercy of God

I grew up not knowing my father as he passed before I was born. But also, due to hardships, my siblings and I grew up living with different relatives. I ended up with my uncle – my mom's brother. The closest memory I have of us living as a family unit was short but sweet – I believe it ended before I was five. Mine was not completely unique because again, we're used to living with relatives for various reasons, even when parents are alive. But I know what I missed coming from the kind of family I have.

So, as we celebrate the feast of the Holy Family today, and as we remember our families in these modern times, I am also aware (indeed all of us) of the changing face of the family. While the "traditional family" is still definitely the ideal, there are growing numbers of family configurations. We now have among others, single parent families, foster families and blended families. These make up a large percentage of the families in today's society.

For some, family now means more than being biologically related. For them family is now those people they are closely linked to; mutually supportive people with whom they interact with most.

While we may be sad about the situation of our modern family, it actually does not water down the feast we celebrate today. If handled well, something great could come out of this new normal, just as something evil could emerge from it too. Already, ISIS is now exploiting it as if offers people who have not really felt the true and sincere love of belonging (for various reasons) an alternative. It advertises itself as a community of love and peace and freedom and great ideal of fighting and dying for Allah and being rewarded in the next life. And we know how false that truly is! But for some reason, it resonates with a few disenchanted people.

As we celebrate the feast of the Holy Family and the Jubilee Year of Mercy, God offers us, once again, true love, peace, freedom, and virtues to fight for – the opposite of what ISIS is offering their recruits. Above all, God offers us His mercy and compassion. He offers us healing.

The New Year coming up could be a life changer for you and your family if you could rise up and take advantage of what Our Good Shepherd is offering us once again. The issue is not what kind of family configuration you have been dealing with. It's not how bad things have been. It's not how bleak the future looks in the present configuration. The issue is that God's love and mercy can change all that. How?

Well, God may not suddenly give you a father or mother if you don't have one; or give you a husband or wife or child if you don't have one. God may not suddenly change the configuration of your family if you don't like it. But I definitely know what God is capable of doing: He could, in spite of all our human weaknesses and faults (beginning with yours and then those of the people in your family) give peace, love, hope, joy, and mercy to your heart and the heart of your family! Yes, He is indeed God of the impossible! Who else would send His Only Son to convince us how much He loves us? Who else would allow Him to die – to save us?

May the joy of this beautiful and grace filled season fill your family, home and your heart. May you know true mercy and love and peace of the Lord in 2016. Amen!
