The Epiphany of the Lord

Year C

Mt 2:1-12



"When Jesus was born in Bethlehem of Judea, in the days of King Herod, behold, magi from the east arrived in Jerusalem, saying, "Where is the newborn king of the Jews? We saw his star at its rising and have come to do him homage." When King Herod heard this, he was greatly troubled, and all Jerusalem with him. Assembling all the chief priests and the scribes of the people, he inquired of them where the Christ was to be born. They said to him, "In Bethlehem of Judea, for thus it has been written through the prophet: And you, Bethlehem, land of Judah, are by no means least among the rulers of Judah; since from you shall come a ruler, who is to shepherd my people Israel." Then Herod called the magi secretly and ascertained from them the time of the star's appearance He sent them to Bethlehem and said, "Go and search diligently for the child. When you have found him, bring me word, that I too may go and do him homage." After their audience with the king they set out. And behold, the star that they had seen at its rising preceded them, until it came and stopped over the place where the child was. They were overjoyed at seeing the star, and on entering the house they saw the child with Mary his mother. They prostrated themselves and did him homage. Then they opened their treasures and offered him gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh. And having been warned in a dream not to return to Herod, they departed for their country by another way."

Pastor's Study **Desk Notes**



Dear St Anthony & St Pius Families,

Feast of the Epiphany Year C

Intriguing Gospel! John le Carré (Greatest spy novelist) has nothing over Matthew. In today's gospel, we hear that King Herod is visited by foreign citizens wishing to give honors to the newborn royalty within His own Kingdom. Herod understandably thought, "Wait, the last time I checked, I was still sitting on the throne, and I haven't birthed any son". Questions likely raced through Herod's head: Did my wife not tell me something? Did I miss a memo from Caesar? Are my councilors brewing something in my palace? Or is it espionage-Are the Wise Men 'spies' (Joshua 2:1-24), and for whom? Of course, such paranoid speculation, leads Matthew to add, "when King Herod heard this, he was greatly troubled, and all Jerusalem with him" (Matthew 2:3). King Herod's ego-mania has all of Jerusalem feeling jumpy, much like a 'long-tailed cat in a room full of rocking chairs!' Of course, as it turns out, the innocently curious and divinely inspired Wise Men, are guided by the Holy Spirit. They sense the danger and feel God's warning nudge for them never to return to Herod. They correctly saw through Herod's duplicitous flattery that he poured on them, and maybe gifts Herod gave them, too as he invited them back to his palace to report-informant style-back with him what they discover-Matt 2:8). However, Herod's homicidal paranoia erupts after they don't return, leading to his evil command to slaughter all the children in Bethlehem under age two (Matt 2:16-18), like a dragnet to eliminate any possible rival king. That is the world Jesus is born into in Judea.

Christmas is a celebration of light! We do bask in the splendiferous light from the sky (the star & illuminated angels), the glorious light from the manger since Jesus is the 'Light of the World' (John 8:12, Rev 21:23) and from the brilliantly radiant faces of the Blessed Mother and St Joseph proudly looking upon their newborn Jesus-God (who like Moses' face glows after looking toward God Ex 34:29-35). It is a magnificent celebration of birthing light. Matthew 4:16 quotes the prophet Isaiah (9:2) and gives voice to the people's expectation of a coming new day and the dawn of hope- new light in a dark world, when he says, "a people in darkness have seen a great light' (Also, keep in mind that Jesus will be called the 'morning star'-new day- in Revelation 22:6). However, we know too, that it is 'darkest before the dawn'. The world is as it is – much in need of a Savior. Though we hold to Christ our hope, we still trudge through a world ensnared in selfish evil and senseless cruelty. This can be a torment to the innocent – the world is a fallen place. So as Christ is born, we can say with Charles Dickens, "This is the best of times and the worst of times." As good as the refugee holy family over at Bethlehem is, Herod's palaces of power over in Jerusalem plot evil. We speak about 'epiphany' as a 'coming to see' or a flash of insight. It is a manifestation of realism. Jesus Himself will say in John 3:19, "that the light came into the world, but people preferred darkness to light". Sin-shadows of death will try to eclipse the pure light. But John first announces Darkness will not overcome the light" (John 1:15) and Jesus will confirm us in goodness in John 16:33, saying, "I have overcome the world" (John 16:33) So, this appearance of Christ in the world is meant to be our strength of virtue, and incitement to grow good despite the darkness. Seeing things as they are, and yet keeping and carrying light forward, we have 'eyes wide open' to the reality of evil around us, yet aspire to cultivate the better among us. Like the cynic philosopher Diogenes, (404-323 BC) who walked the streets of Athens even in the middle of the day carrying a lantern looking for a good man, regardless of the world, Christians are to always seek grace and cultivate goodness, to be 'the light in a darkened world' (1 John 5:4 "everyone born of God overcomes the world). Jesus is our light and hope! And as rock group 'Disturbed' sing in their song, 'Light', "It takes a bit of dark to rekindle the fire burning in you......Sometimes, darkness can show you the light." Christians, shine on!
