They formed the duo *Bardic Sisters* in 2017 to create and perform "The Music and Lore of Ireland: A St. Patrick's Day Celebration" to entertain guests with music and stories at the St. James Tearoom. They will reprise that program at our January IAS meeting!



At our November 30th meeting, we discussed *Looking under Stones: Roots, Family and a Dingle Childhood*, by Joe O'Toole, who is an independent senator and President of ICTU (Irish Congress of Trade Unions). A teacher by profession, he was formerly General Secretary of the INTO, Ireland's largest teaching union. He grew up in Dingle, County Kerry, and this book is a memoir of his happy childhood. We all found this book to be quite charming, but also relentlessly cheerful and so without much conflict to keep up our interest. (We rated it "Meh." ©)

We should inform you that our method for picking our monthly books to read is quite random: We found a list on the web of "Contemporary Irish Authors You Should Be Reading," and once a month we randomly pick a book from the list. Thus there will be a clunker every now and then, but mostly good reads (and sometimes grand new discoveries) overall.

Bucket List Filled: The Shermans Go to Ireland

[Editor's Note: On August 28th, 2017, IAS members Natalie Sherman and her husband Ash arrived in Dublin for their first-time-ever visit to the Emerald Isle. Ash kept a journal of their daily adventures, and I'm including here—and in subsequent newsletters—some of his particularly interesting observations of Irish life and culture. Also please note that after their return on September 8th, Natalie's cancer came back big time and she is now in hospice but hanging in there (as of this writing), and really appreciates your good thoughts and prayers.]

The Streets of Dublin

Every day in the paper there were stories about a housing shortage in the country, and the government's failure to do anything about it. Dublin is an old town, typified by red bricks and grey stones. Much of it was built before the end of 19th century, which makes urban renewal a tricky beast. No one wants to disturb the historical nature of the place, and yet modern electrical and sewage needs are pressing. The result, I think is a hodge-podge of little fixes that don't always suit the longer-term needs. Typical are the long row houses, some of which had no running water, much less an efficient and effective sewage system. That the streets are as clean as they are, even far back from the tourist attractions, is a testament to the city's effort to supply the needs of a modern urban area. We got caught in one of those "little projects." Trying to get to a particular place, our driver familiar with Dublin streets took a turn onto a small street that turned out to be cordoned off so that a connecting street could be torn up. The barricade was manned by a young fellow leaning against the barricade, who signaled our driver to go back. "Can't do that, mate. One way, you know; besides there's room to get over to that street I want." They argued with one another for a few minutes before we were allowed to proceed. Within a dozen yards, men working on excavating equipment were shouting insults at us and shaking their fists at the barricade man. When we got to the street our driver wanted to get to, we found it to be a dead end. Back

up a twisted five yards, we found ourselves facing back the way we had come. More shouting and fist shaking, but then we discovered an even narrower "street" that took us back to the street we started from. No signs anywhere, and I suspect that some of the "streets" don't appear on any city map. Given that kind of difficulty, modernizing housing has got to be frustrating for everyone.

The Irish Countryside

Natalie's cousin Betty Cleary arrived at our hotel early to drive us out into the countryside, specifically to Avoca in County Wicklow. Avoca Is sort of like Knott's Berry Farm without the roller-coaster and rides. It was, and is a large farm producing vast amounts of fresh produce and dairy products, then they branched out to tap into the consumer market. In their central building is an amazing variety of products aimed at weekend travelers and tourists. There are probably a dozen small specialty restaurants to serve most tastes, but even the most basic serves a far better quality than most restaurants. Betty took us to one of the best. The restaurant was in a large solarium whose walls were of glass windows (12 over 12, with double sashes). Table linens were thick and luxurious, and the dinnerware had the feel of silver, though it was stainless steel.

On to Waterford

In Waterford, we were met by Natalie's cousin Chris, who drove us to our hotel (The Marina Lodge). Chris waited (smart woman) while Natalie and I saw the town's famous Viking Tower, and their museum devoted to the town's historic past. Uphill and down over narrow cobbled streets whetted our appetites. Later, we visited Chris at her home. She lives in a very small, but very common row house that is only about sixteen



feet wide, with narrow stairs leading up to the bedroom above. Cozy, but a bit crowded with her many golf trophies and mementoes. "I come down in the morning, and go up at night." Fading photos pinned to walls, and a large collection of Waterford crystal that she was rightly proud of. She gave Natalie one of her prized Waterford cups to add to our collection, and showed us more of her needlework. Gorgeous hardly describes the intricate designs and patterns she is able to achieve. Some of her white on white work has won her trophies in local competitions. It seems that Cousin Chris uses much of her time creating intricate needlework by the light from her small window onto the street. I was impressed by two of her chairs, and later when touring Muckross House saw two identical chairs on display. Well, the upholstery was different. It was a very pleasant visit, and more enjoyable than tramping from tourist attraction to tourist attraction.

That night, we ate at MacLeary's Restaurant. Like everywhere else in Waterford, there was rising excitement over the town's up-coming hurling team championship bout. We were honorary citizens of Waterford for that match, and we watched closely as the championships grew closer. MacLeary's fish & chips was the best I tasted on the whole trip.




