3rd Sunday of Lent - Year C 23rd - 24th March 2019

First Reading: Exodus 3:1-8, 13-15

This is what you must say to the children of Israel: I Am has sent me to you.

Moses was looking after the flock of Jethro, his father-in-law, priest of Midian. He led his flock to the far side of the wilderness and came to Horeb, the mountain of God. There the angel of the Lord appeared to him in the shape of a flame of fire, coming from the middle of a bush. Moses looked; there was the bush blazing but it was not being burnt up. 'I must go and look at this strange sight,' Moses said 'and see why the bush is not burnt.' Now the Lord saw him go forward to look, and God called to him from the middle of the bush. 'Moses, Moses!' he said. 'Here I am' he answered. 'Come no nearer' he said. 'Take off your shoes, for the place on which you stand is holy ground. I am the God of your father,' he said 'the God of Abraham, the God of Isaac and the God of Jacob.' At this Moses covered his face, afraid to look at God. And the Lord said, 'I have seen the miserable state of my people in Egypt. I have heard their appeal to be free of their slave-drivers. Yes, I am well aware of their sufferings. I mean to deliver them out of the hands of the Egyptians and bring them up out of that land to a land rich and broad, a land where milk and honey flow.' Then Moses said to God, 'I am to go, then, to the sons of Israel and say to them, "The God of your fathers has sent me to you". But if they ask me what his name is, what am I to tell them?" And God said to Moses, "I Am who I Am. "This" he added, "is what you must say to the sons of Israel: I Am has sent me to you".' And God also said to Moses, "You are to say to the sons of Israel: the Lord, the God of your fathers, the God of Abraham, the God of Isaac, and the God of Jacob, has sent me to you. This is my name for all time; by this name I shall be invoked for all generations to come."

All this that happened to the people of Moses in the desert was written for our benefit. I want to remind you, brothers, how our fathers were all guided by a cloud above them and how they all passed through the sea. They were all baptised into Moses in this cloud and in this sea; all ate the same spiritual food and all drank the same spiritual drink, since they all drank from the spiritual rock that followed them as they went, and that rock was Christ. In spite of this, most of them failed to please God and their corpses littered the desert. These things all happened as warnings for us, not to have the wicked lusts for forbidden things that they had. You must never complain: some of them did, and they were killed by the Destroyer. All this happened to them as a warning, and it was written down to be a lesson for us who are living at the end of the age. The man who thinks he is safe must be careful that he does not fall.

Gospel: Luke 13:1-9

Unless you repent you will all perish as they did.

Some people arrived and told Jesus about the Galileans whose blood Pilate had mingled with that of their sacrifices. At this he said to them, 'Do you suppose these Galileans who suffered like that were greater sinners than any other Galileans? They were not, I tell you. No; but unless you repent you will all perish as they did. Or those eighteen on whom the tower at Siloam fell and killed them? Do you suppose that they were more guilty than all the other people living in Jerusalem? They were not, I tell you. No; but unless you repent you will all perish as they did.' He told this parable: 'A man had a fig tree planted in his vineyard, and he came looking for fruit on it but found none. He said to the man who looked after the vineyard, "Look here, for three years now I have been coming to look for fruit on this fig tree and finding none. Cut it down: why should it be taking up the ground?" "Sir," the man replied, leave it one more year and give me time to dig round it and manure it: it may bear fruit next year; if not, then you can cut it down."

Jesus Offers us his Love, Care and Help

Now into the third week of this season of Lent we are drawn to reflect more deeply upon our personal and communal relationship with God and God with us. The reading from Exodus is a summary of Israel's faith that took its shape under the leadership of Moses who, in the name of God, led the people out of slavery. God is revealed not as a dominant, punishing God but as a liberator and champion of the oppressed.

Speaking directly to Moses and indirectly to us, God says, "I am the God of your ancestors, of your fathers and mothers. I have seen the miserable state of my people in Egypt...I am well aware of their sufferings. I mean to deliver them." Here is a God who is the source of being and active presence with humanity; who enters into a loving covenant, a relationship which liberates people, calling them to bring to the whole world the good news of God's generous and caring ways.

we could reflect upon these words of Fr Brian Gleeson: own dignity, which is derived from our common human dignity, and we work on becoming better persons, knowing that God is patient with us and hasn't finished with us yet. In relation to other people, we look for the good in them, and deal with acceptance, trust, affection and care. In relation to God we treat God as our origin, the ultimate source of our existence. We treat God too as the one who sustains us through all the ups and downs of life. And we treat God as our final destiny, the one who is waiting to take us into his embrace at the end of life."

May we stand with our grieving brothers, sisters and children in Christchurch who, like us, all are loved by God.



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In today's Gospel, Jesus makes the point that contrary to common beliefs, people who suffer tragedy in their lives are not being punished for their sins nor rendered unworthy. Using the parable of the fig tree, he suggests that those who make these assertions should take a closer look at themselves and how they understand God's relationship with them and theirs with others. He calls them to 'repent', to think again. And so must we. As we address the challenges that face our Church and the tensions and sectarian and terrorist aggression towards peoples of our world today,

Melbourne Church Celebrates the 2019 Rite of Election

On the Feast of St Patrick over 1,200 people gathered at St Patrick's Cathedral for the annual Rite of Election. It is at this Rite that those who are preparing for the Easter sacraments are presented to the Archbishop and the wider Catholic community.

Coming from over 60 parishes across the Archdiocese of Melbourne, there were 178 catechumens (those who are preparing for the sacraments of baptism, confirmation and Eucharist) and 57 candidates (those who have been baptised but have not yet come to the sacraments of confirmation and Eucharist and wish to be received into full communion with the Catholic Church). Among them were two our catechumen: Chris Freeman and Andrew Plain.

After listening to the Word of God in a simple but moving ceremony, the catechumens and the Candidates were called forward to join the Archbishop on the sanctuary, where he asked them to make public their commitment to journey towards the sacraments at Easter. In doing so, he also sought the commitment of their godparents, sponsors and the wider community gathered to support these people on their journey of faith.

The afternoon was truly a celebration of the local Church of Melbourne as people of all ages, from different nationalities and backgrounds, and different parts of the archdiocese boldly took the next step in their journey of faith which will result in the reception of the Easter sacraments at the Easter Vigil




