The Commemoration of the Faithful Departed

How often have we heard this exchange of words? ... "Do you love me?"..."Yes, you know I love you"..."Oh yeah?, then prove it". Maybe we ourselves have had that very same conversation

There are some things we know in our hearts that is more than a fact we get from argument. We can also know some things from argument that we don't experience in our hearts. Some have argued that the Bible says, For God so loved the world that He gave His only Begotten Son (John 3:16). We say, "I am part of the world, therefore God loves me". That's one way of knowing that you are loved by God. Then we might go further and say, "Christ told his disciples, "Greater love has no one than this, that one lay down his life for his friends", We say "I am one of his friends because I follow him and keep his commandments, therefore, Christ loves me with the greater love". These are ways of knowing you are loved by the use of argument. And that is important, we need to see things and use them as part of our arsenal in our fight of faith. But that is not what Romans is talking about in today's second reading. It says that" Hope does not disappoint, because the love of God has been poured out within our hearts through the Holy Spirit who was given to

The experience of knowing that we are loved by God through the Holy spirit is supernatural, not worked up by human means. This experience has factual, objective content; it is not only mediated, but also communicated, through the truth about Jesus Christ. You don't get this experience by emptying your head, you get it in seeing the glory of the love of God in the real historical work of Jesus Christ. In some measure, all true Christians have tasted the outpouring of God's love in their hearts. Every true Christian knows the love of God, not just as an argument, but as an experience. The Holy Spirit has opened the eyes of our hearts to see the preciousness and beauty of the love of God in Jesus Christ for what it really is, and in our hearts we have been moved spiritually by that love; to cherish, value, treasure and trust this Jesus and love of God in Him. What more God have to do to prove His love for us?

BLACK CATHOLIC HISTORY MONTH A Brief Background Exposé By Father Stephen Sohe

In a 1984 Pastoral Letter on evangelization titled What We Have Seen and Heard by the Black Bishops of the United States the bishops noted that "the Black Catholic Community in the American Church has now come of age." As Black Catholics in the American Church we have come to know, appreciate, and celebrate our history, heritage, and the truth about who we are and our mark on Christendom. Against the myth that Africans were heathens with no past, no history, no God and no religion, we have come to know that our ancestors were in fact among the first set of Christians to accept the gospel about Christ. Before the conversion of St. Paul, the great apostle of the Gentiles, in chapter nine of the Acts of the Apostle (cf. Acts 9:1-19), there was the conversion of the Ethiopian Eunuch, a black African in Chapter eight of the same book (cf. Acts 8:26-40). The Ethiopian Eunuch was clearly not an ignorant heathen. He was a wealthy literate black African and a convert to Judaism before his conversion to Christianity. Further, against the myth that Catholicism is a "white Church", we have also come to know, that some of the Church's earliest popes, mystics, monastics, and martyrs who made the church what it is today were blacks. People like Pope St. Victor I, St. Cyprian, St. Anthony of Egypt, Ss. Monica and Augustine, Ss. Perpetual and Felicitas, and many more others were all Africans who helped to shape the Church with their way of life and their teachings.

The Black Catholics in the American Church have truly come of Age. Prior to twentieth century no American black could aspired to the priesthood in the American Church. Thank God for the Courage, dedication and determination of Augustine Tolton, the first black American priest. His ordination, and ministry in Quincy, IL could be said to have pave the way for the black Catholics involvement in the hierarchical structure of the American Church.

These and many more historical facts were the factors that inspire the National Black Catholic Clergy Caucus, on July 24, 1990, to designate November as Black Catholic History month with the aim of telling, appreciating, and celebrating our history and heritage. As we remember and pray for our departed relatives especially in this month, we want to also remember and pray for our Black Catholic heroes who have contributed greatly in shaping our history and heritage. One of these heroes is Augustine Tolton, whose cause for sainthood is on. Attached to this bulletin is a prayer for the cause of canonization of Augustine Tolton. We pray that through his intercession God will grant us the favors we ask. Amen. Happy Black Catholic History Month.
