### I am grateful

From the Desk of Rabbi Daniel Polish

Gratitude is one of the fundamental qualities of the religious personality. Frankly it is a hallmark of the civilized human being. As we prepare to celebrate Thanksgiving, it is worth noting that it is fundamentally the same holiday as the one we just celebrated not too long ago. The Pilgrims of Massachusetts intentionally patterned their autumn

celebration on the Biblical holiday of Succot. Both celebrate the harvest and express gratitude for the abundance of food it represents. They wanted to thank G-d for their bounty the same way that our ancestors did at the Biblically mandated Succot.

Which reminds me of one of the things I give thanks for. I am grateful that I am not my great grandparents. My great grandparents, most likely yours too, of course knew nothing of the holiday of Thanksgiving. They probably knew very little about America. My great grandparents, most likely yours too, were peasant farmers. They did know about harvests. But unlike me, and hopefully unlike you, their lives were very precarious. The harvest meant something to them that it does not to us. The harvest was a serious business, really a life and death thing. From the end of the harvest until the next Spring they had to depend on the food they had already gathered. We go to the grocery store. They had no place to go except to what they had stored up. So the harvest festival was a time of joy if the harvest was bountiful—but also a time of concern and even apprehension.

Which is why among the things I give thanks for is the fact that I do not live my great grandparents' lives. I am grateful that the subject of harvest is essentially of little consequence to me. I am not oppressed by the same terror of scarcity that must have been a part of their lives. I am grateful that I live in the welcoming environment that is part of the real (and hopefully enduring) character of America. I am grateful that my Jewish identity is not the source of legitimate fear and terror, and grateful that I can practice my Jewish faith with an openness and acceptance that my great grandparents could only have dreamed of.

Of course there are many other things for which I give thanks too. I hope you do as well. And I hope you take some time during your celebration of Thanksgiving to call those things to mind, and to give expression to them. For with all the things that trouble, even afflict us, we are a very fortunate generation. May your Thanksgiving be a time of celebration and sincere thanks.

From that day, I knew we would never go back to the city. Stu actually couldn't get out of the city until Tuesday evening, but I felt very safe in our new home. Our neighbors became friends. We helped with each other's children and watched them grow up together.

But yet, something was missing—fast forward a few years. It was time to add religious education to my children's lives. At that time, it was more important to Stu than me. Waiting on line in the Hopewell Junction Post Office was about to become a life changing moment. The yellow poster; the information to contact Shir Chadash. I made the call......we were invited to a summer service. That call fulfilled what was missing. I needed a Jewish connection more than I knew. I am also grateful that phone call was returned.

Of course, I am grateful for things I have been able to provide for my family. Many things most people take for granted but please don't. There are so many people unable to provide basic necessities for their families.

**Background:** Many years ago, the congregation purchased property along Freedom Road in Lagrangeville with the intention of building a synagogue. After much money, time, and sweat equity it has been determined that for the foreseeable future we will be unable to utilize this land. We have some money to continue to pay the mortgage, however that money will be depleted soon.

The net liability is \$21,000. Possibly we could actually pay off the mortgage and in doing so, gain some added flexibility as to the disposition of the land. If each member family pays \$18 (Chai) until November 2021, we could easily pay off the mortgage.
