Kerry's Corner

In the January Beacon, I shared with the congregation the "possible" split that may be coming to the United Methodist denomination over disagreements of biblical interpretation regarding LGBTQ ordination and weddings. I will keep you up to date with information as soon as I get it. As of right now, the whole denomination appears to be in a holding pattern until the 2020 General Conference that will be held in May.

During this time, I want to remind you that nothing has changed at Burton Memorial and we are and will be about ministry to the community and the making of disciples for the transformation of the world. I would like to provide you with a letter that I think is very timely and one that will provide you comfort during these times. It was written by Gary E. Mueller, the Bishop of the Arkansas Annual Conference

The letter is from I am ready to admit something I've been in denial about for a long time. Even though I've invested a great deal of blood, sweat and tears trying, I simply cannot fix what's broken in the United Methodist Church. I can't fix the polarization that now imprisons us. I can't fix the outcome of this May's General Conference. And I can't fix the uncertainty we face as a church.



Even more significantly, the Holy Spirit has helped me realize I don't have to fix the church. It belongs to Jesus, and he's got it covered. This doesn't mean I'm stepping back, shrugging my shoulders and saying, "It's going to be what it's going to be." Rather, I will be focusing on what Jesus is calling every United Methodist congregation in Arkansas to do – becoming the most Jesus loving, disciple-making and sharing Jesus' love church you can be.

I love the United Methodist Church and the way of being Christian it shares. But ultimately, local congregations matter more than denominations – even our beloved United Methodist denomination. People need your local church, not a denomination. Your community needs your local church, not a denomination. And most importantly, Jesus needs your local church, not a denomination.

This means the single most pressing task is enabling your church that has a unique location, is filled with a unique group of people and possesses a unique history to become the church Jesus wants you to be -a vital congregation that makes disciples of Jesus Christ, who make disciples equipped and sent to transform lives, communities and the world.

Embrace your identity. Your church is literally the Body of Christ. So act like it! Love Jesus, follow Jesus, grow in Jesus, be transformed in Jesus and share Jesus in ways that make it clear whose you are. Get serious about investing in those things that form you as the Body of Christ: prayer, Bible study, involving people in intentional discipling groups and reaching out to your neighborhood in ways that touch real people in real ways with real love.

Live out your purpose. Jesus uses your church, and the disciples in it, to continue his mission of making disciples, forming disciples, and equipping and sending disciples to transform lives, communities and the world. Help people discover their spiritual gifts, bless them and then unleash them in your congregation and into the mission field that begins right outside the doors of your sanctuary.

Demonstrate the difference Jesus makes. Almost every congregation has figured out how to thrive with a diverse group of people who have perspectives that are diametrically opposed. Don't see this as a problem; see it as a wonderful opportunity to show how Jesus brings together people who normally wouldn't give each other the time of day. Keep people worshiping together on the same pew, praying together, studying together, serving together and caring for each other.

I want to be absolutely clear about something that some people may consider to be a scandalous idea. Yet I am convicted of its truth. The future of your church is not dependent upon what happens in the United Methodist Church. Don't let the uncertainty, or brokenness, paralyze you. Move ahead boldly and confidently. Your church will still be part of the Body of Christ. Your church will still make disciples of Jesus Christ. Your church will still form deeper disciples. And your church will still equip and send disciples to transform lives, communities and the world.

The painful reality is that we United Methodist Christians face an uncertain future. As Jesus leads us toward it, I want you to know something. I consider it an honor and a privilege to walk with you. I believe in you. I trust you. And, most importantly, I love you.

Be still, and know that I am God. The only way you can be silent around God is if you're comfortable in His presence. OR if you want to LEARN to be comfortable in His presence. You see, the way to learn to be truly comfortable around God is to start practicing being quiet in His presence.

We want to invite you to start the practice of being still before God. Every Monday from 8:00 am to 10:00 am we are opening up the sanctuary for a time of prayer and silent meditation. Consider it a way to kick off the work week putting God first and seeking God's direction.

We have the end of year giving information for 2018 for our Methodist Children's Home. Our financial goal for the year was \$2,076.00 (173 members at \$12.00 per member). For 2019, we gave \$7,041.41 to the Children's Home; so we gave 339% of our goal! We give God the glory as we thank you, each and every one of our Burton family, for your love, your prayers, and your stewardship in this mission.

In 2020 our goal of \$12.00 per member will remain the same as it was in 2019. Since the Children's Home is an extension of the United Methodist churches in Florida, the goal of giving is set each year at the Florida Annual Conference in Lakeland. We have four Fifth Sunday offerings this year to help us meet our goal – March 29, May 31, August 30 and November 29. Also, each Sunday that we partake in communion (the first Sunday of the month), the "Penny Jug" gladly accepts your pennies, nickels, dimes, and quarters.



One of the favorite events each year at the Children's Home is the Day on Campus, which will take place on Saturday, March 28, 2020. The day will provide an opportunity for guests to see the breadth of the Children's Home ministry and to learn about the many ways your Children's Home is serving children and families in need. The purpose of the event is to thank all of the individuals and churches who continue to support and empower the ministry being done through the Children's Home.

There will be a special program, and informative campus tours will be continuous from 9:30 am to 11:00 am and from 12:30 pm to 2:30 pm. Breakout sessions will be offered in the morning (by RSVP only) to better educate about the services the Children's Home provides. 

Green Team "Are We There Yet?"

Tim Bricker That was the question that served as the theme for Pastor Kerry's Advent sermon series. A question born of curiosity, anticipation, and anxious expectancy that precedes a life altering event. When will we get there? How much longer do I have to wait?

Life is full of longing anticipation, great expectations, and hope for the future. But what if the forecast for the future is dire? What if the future holds overwhelming challenges?

As a Green team member, I am concerned about the future, not my own, but a more distant future. I am concerned about predictable circumstances and foreseeable impacts that will have little or no effect on me during my own mortal life. My concern is for the future of our planet, which is currently experiencing a measurable and increasing decline in environmental quality on so many fronts. "Climate change" or "global warming" is a fact attested to by an overwhelming majority of climate scientists.

I know, some climate scientists say that it isn't as bad as all the others are saying (it's "cyclical"). But, would I take the word of one doctor who disagrees with the concurrent diagnosis of nine other doctors? Even if I preferred to believe the one doctor who told me it was okay to continue smoking my cigarillos, should I ignore the consensus of nine other experts?

It's easier to deny that anything I am doing is having a negative effect on the environment, as to admit otherwise is overwhelming. It seems there is so little I can do to stop harming our environment, or even more impossible to reverse the seemingly insurmountable, and exponentially expanding consequences of what is occurring. Can I cut back on eating meat? Sure. Can I fly on one less jet this year? Of course. But, can I drive fewer miles in my truck? Whoa! Hold on a minute. How can I do that and still go where I need to go? Maybe it really is hopeless. Maybe I should just give up. Maybe I should just deny that there is a problem.





Maybe not. There are two things we all can do as individuals that could have a significant, positive impact on a depressingly negative situation: 1) we can contact our representatives, at all levels of government, and urge them to do anything and everything they can do to keep our water clean, assure that our air is breathable, and protect the creation over which God gave us dominion; and 2) we can pray.

With faith in action, we are nearly there.


Possible services that we are also considering are as follows: Caregiver relief (2-3 hours); Meals to shut ins or those recovering from illness or surgery; Shopping; Yard work or help with things like hurricane shutters; Child care (2-3 hours) – scheduled or emergency; Driving individuals to doctors' appointments, etc.

Ash Wednesday Service

Ash Wednesday is a Christian holy day of prayer, fasting, and repentance. It is preceded by Shrove Tuesday (Mardi Gras) and falls on the first day of Lent, the six weeks of penitence before Easter. We will be having an **Ash Wednesday Service** on **February 26th at 7:00 pm** in the sanctuary of Burton Memorial UMC.

We will have the imposition of ashes in the sanctuary. Ashes are imposed on the heads of participants in the Ash Wednesday service as a sign of mortality and penitence. The ashes are imposed with the words, "Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return" (BCP, p. 265). Ashes are typically imposed by inscribing a cross on the forehead. The imposition of ashes has been practiced on Ash Wednesday since the ninth century.

Mardi Gras, Carnival, Shrove Tuesday / Fat Tuesday: whatever you call it, it's one of the biggest parties of the year. Practically every culture has some kind of celebration before **Lent**. And while it seems as if the festivities are a way to party and get wild, there actually is a purpose to the celebrations. *Mardi Gras has its roots in Christian traditions*.

Why Is It Called Shrove Tuesday in most churches?

The word "shrove" comes from the word "shrive," which means to absolve. Shrove Tuesday is the day before Ash Wednesday, which marks the Lenten season.

The night before Ash Wednesday, the house had to be cleared out of luxurious foods, such as butter, fat, chocolate, sugar and eggs. Christians would turn those items into pancakes, fudge, cakes, pies, etc. to use them up. Over time, the day became known as Pancake Tuesday in many churches.

Almost every culture makes some kind of rich pastries for Shrove Tuesday, whether you call them pancakes, malasadas (Portuguese fried dough) or king cake, the idea is the same.

On **Tuesday, February 25th from 6:00 to 8:00** Burton Memorial will be hosting a Mardi Gras party with **LIVE MUSIC** and a **DESSERT POTLUCK**. We will be asking members of the congregation to bring their favorite sweet desserts to share with others. **Those attending will be asked to judge the dessert giving beads to the top tasting delicacies**. *Free beads will be provided to all who attend*.
