Parish Council: Meets on the Monday evening after the third Sunday of the month.



"Behold the Lamb of God, behold Him who takes away the sins of the world. Blessed are those who called to the supper of the Lamb"



I was in Chicago when the Church introduced the new changes at Mass. Pastors were encouraged to use the opportunity to teach or remind parishioners about what we do at the various parts of Mass, their biblical background, and why we do them. The two quotes below should be very familiar to us. But let's trace their biblical background and hopefully, that will remind us of why we say these words and enrich our participation even more.

You surely recall the story of Joseph, his brothers and their descendants in Egypt from the final chapters of the Book of Genesis. Recall how God used Moses to deliver them from slavery (Exodus). That was the first reference to the Paschal Lamb, probably 1300 years before Christ. Read the details in Exodus chapter 12. Each Israelite family was to kill an unblemished lamb and "take some of its blood and apply it to the two doorposts and the lintel of every house in which they partake of the lamb" (v. 7). *"For the Lord will go by, striking down the Egyptians. Seeing the blood on the lintel and the two doorposts, the Lord will pass over that door and not let the destroyer come into your houses to strike you down"* (v. 23). And so, by the blood of the lamb, the Jews were saved from destruction.

The second reference is a familiar Good Friday reading from Isaiah chapter 53. It refers to the Suffering Servant, Christ, the Lamb whose suffering brought justification to God's people. *"Thou he was harshly treated, he submitted and opened not his mouth; like a lamb led to the slaughter or a sheep before the shearers, he was silent and opened not his mouth"* (v. 7). And thus, *"thru his suffering, my servant shall justify many, and their guilt he shall bear"* (v. 11), *"and he shall take away the sins of many, and win pardon for their offenses"* (v. 12).

The final reference is from the book of Revelation, chapter 5. Verse 9 speaks of the Lamb who was slain and whose blood was used to purchase for God those from every tribe and tongue, people and nation". Finally, the Lamb is now seated at the throne from where He reigns.

So, when the priest raises the Body of Christ and invites us to Holy Communion with those words, picture the three references or biblical foundations for this part of the Mass. Hopefully, those images will help enrich your participation at Mass and the grace you gain from it. Focusing on such images is definitely better than thinking of shopping and laundry and whatever else our minds wander off to.

Almost nothing is known of this saint except that she was very young-twelve or thirteen-when she was martyred in the last half of the third century. Various modes of death have been suggested-beheading, burning, strangling.

Legend has it that she was a beautiful girl whom many young men wanted to marry. Among those she refused, one reported her to the authorities as being a Christian. She was arrested and confined to a house of prostitution. The legend continues that a man who looked upon her lustfully, lost his sight and had it restored by her prayer. She was condemned, executed and buried near Rome in a catacomb that eventually was named after her. The daughter of Constantine built a basilica in her honor.
