Please remember you must be a member in good standing in order to march in the parade.



CHAPLAIN'S CORNER

To me, one of the most perplexing Gospels is the one in which the woman asks Jesus to leave the scraps from the table and reminds him that even the dogs get them at times. Jesus rewards her for her insight. Here is a condensed version of the story from the Gospel of Mark.

Jesus went to the district of Tyre. A woman begged him to drive the demon out of her daughter. He said to her, "Let the children be fed first. For it is not right to take the food of the children and throw it to the dogs." She replied, "Lord, even the dogs under the table eat the children's scraps." Then he said to her, "For saying this, you may go. The demon has gone out of your daughter." When the woman went home, she found the child lying in bed and the demon gone. (Mk 7:24-3)


Have you ever felt like you were under the table with the dogs? That life is just too much and even the scraps God throws at us aren't enough? I imagine the answer is yes. Sometimes our experience of God feels like this. We ask for a cake and we get the crumbs. I usually complain and eventually realize that from God, even the crumbs are enough. Unless I'm having a full-blown pity party, I try pray to trust Him to help me let go of control, of the false belief that I know better than God. When the pity party is over, my perspective shifts. I remember that my experience of God is that God gives us what we need, when we need it, and often in abundance. God is abundantly generous and gives us "more than we can even ask for or imagine" (Eph 3:20).

In keeping with Irish heritage month, many outlandish stories about Saint Patrick have circulated for centuries. Some are factual, some are not, but all have a "wee bit of the truth" in them. Consider this one.

Once upon a time at a pub, Saint Patrick ordered a whiskey, but was shocked and offended when the bartender's pour did not fill his glass. He said the man had a devil in his cellar feeding on his dishonesty, so he'd best get his act together. The man immediately changed his ways. Like Scrooge on Christmas Day, he became the guy who filled everyone's glass to the rim. Today that story is remembered in the "Drowning of the Shamrock." Each St. Patrick's Day at the very end of the night, shamrocks are dunked into the last round of drinks (ideally whiskey) and a toast is offered to St. Patrick, in honor of his preferential option for the full pour. Do not try this at home!!!

God is the Divine Bartender and we don't even have to tip Him to get a "full pour." God is willing and ready to give us the more than we can ask or imagine: cake and crumbs and scraps. God will even get us out from under the table. We just need to let Him. Let us trust in God as we honor Saint Patrick and our Irish heritage!

In Case You Missed February's Irish History Report:

The Irish Roots Behind America's Groundhog Day

In the U.S., Groundhog Day predicts the end of winter with the appearance of a shadow by a groundhog, but its true history lies with a witch of Celtic myth, Imbolc, the holiday associated with St. Brigid, and Roman hedgehogs!

The true history of the day goes right back to the Irish Celtic festival, Imbolc, which marks the beginning of Spring. Celebrated on February 1st and associated with the goddess of fertility, now known as St. Brigid, Imbolc marks the halfway point between the winter solstice and the spring equinox. It is a celebration of the upcoming spring and the longer days ahead. It was said that on the eve of Imbolc, the Celtic fertility goddess, Brigid was said to travel from home-to-home granting blessings to virtuous inhabitants while they slept. The people even left milk and food for Brigid as she went about her travels. The goddess was believed to have had the power to shift the season from the months of darkness to the months of light, and people would light candles to symbolize this.

Fire was always a central theme in this battle between winter and spring. In Celtic myth, it was said that an old woman or witch, known as the Cailleach, gathered firewood for the rest of winter. The Cailleach wished winter to last longer and would ensure February 1st was bright and sunny so she could collect enough wood for the rest of the winter. If the day was dark and cloudy, it meant the Cailleach would sleep and be unable to gather more wood and, therefore, spring would surely arrive soon.

Eventually, these pagan traditions merged with Christianity and became what is known in the Catholic Church's calendar as Candlemas. Celebrated on February 2nd, Candlemas is the commemoration of the purification of the Virgin Mary and the presentation of Christ in the Temple. Candles were traditionally blessed at this festival. It is believed that if there is bright weather on Candlemas, there would be more bad weather to come (just like the Cailleach).

You might well ask well, where did the groundhog come into the telling this tale? For that, we must look back to the ancient Romans who also believed they could predict the year's weather. However, in their case, it was linked to soothsaying. The Romans looked to hedgehogs for guidance. It was said that if during hibernation, the hedgehog looked out of his den on February 2nd and saw his shadow, it meant there was a clear moon and six more weeks of winter, so he would return to his burrow.

This tradition was carried through Europe, including in Germany. It was with the arrival of Germans to Pennsylvania that they took up the tradition once more. However, as hedgehogs are not native to the state, they turned to the now-famous groundhog for their predictions.

So as Punxsutawney Phil in Punxsutawney, PA is held aloft each February 2nd, remember the ancient Irish and European history of this day, and pray for an early spring!



- 4 Scoops vanilla ice cream


Directions:

Add ingredients together in blender and mix.










