

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1. Radiant Sun for Everyone Fruit Snack as God's Grace for the Righteous and the Unrighteous Sunday, June 25, 2017

Dbjectives:

- Children learn about the true meaning of God's grace for all.
- Encounter Jesus' Teaching on the Mount, telling about God's love toward everyone, including the righteous and the unrighteous
- Help young children learn about the ultimate purpose of the gospel—deepening right relationship with God from the word for "being righteous!"

O Menu for the day: Radiant Sun for Everyone Fruit Snack

- Text in Context: Matthew 5:43-48
- Read the scripture and let the students talk about our attitude to others strangers, new friends at school, visitors, new neighbors, people of different culture, and different beliefs,
- While talking about our attitude to others, teacher/ volunteer helps young children learn about "a gift of hospitality" as the anticipated behavior of the children of God.

Matthew 5:43 - 48 ⁴³ "You have heard that it was said, 'Love your neighbor and hate your enemy.' ⁴⁴ **But I tell you: Love your enemies and pray for those who persecute you,** ⁴⁵ that you may be sons of your Father in heaven. He causes his sun to rise on the evil and the good, and sends rain on the righteous and the unrighteous. ⁴⁶ If you love those who love you, what reward will you get? Are not even the tax collectors doing that? ⁴⁷ And if you greet only your brothers, what are you doing more than others? Do not even pagans do that? ⁴⁸ Be perfect, therefore, as your heavenly Father is perfect.


Cooking Event: Radiant Sun for Everyone Fruit Snack *Prep 5 minutes; Ready in 10 minutes*

(Ingredients)

Original recipe makes 24 servings

3 cantaloupes or honeydew melons 1 Pineapple 24 white paper plates





(Kitchen Wares You Need*)

A knife, cutting board, biscuit cutter or circle cookie cutter, 24 paper plates *Please use them from Church's Kitchen and make sure of cleaning and placing as they were after the cooking event. Thanks!"

(Directions)

- 1. When shape cutting from cantaloupes or honeydew melons, cut slices from the side to have a good cutting surface.
- 2. Use a biscuit cutter or circle cookie cutter to cut out the middle of the sun.
- 3. Cut up pineapple slices for sun rays
- 4. Serve a sun on a paper plate. A teacher or a young student may explain for customers before serving.
- Serve Radiant Sun for Everyone fruit snack for the worshippers during fellowship hour.

Everyone including church members and visitors of the day is invited to fellowship!

- A young child may offer a prayer for refreshments and fellowship.
- Other children serves a dish for all participants.
- While sharing refreshments, all may greet with one another!





👌 Teacher's Help - Love Like God

Love Them? Are You Sure? It is easy to love someone who loves you. But try to love someone who doesn't love you. Try being nice to someone who is mean. It's not easy! But that's what God wants you to do.

When you love your enemy, others will notice. When you are kind to someone who is mean, people will see it. They will know God is helping you. That kind of love takes God's help!

Watch for your next chance to love someone who doesn't love you. Be nice to someone who is mean to you. That will surprise them. Ask God how you can show them love. Then do something kind for them. God will help you love others. All you have to do is ask him.

Who is mean to you? Will you let God help you love that person?



Tell your teacher about friends you would like to welcome. Invite them to church and other events in the church. Jot down the names of your friends, so that our church can help them learn about Jesus and His teaching through Sunday school program, beginning in September.

While cooking event, a mother or a teacher, may share a thought on what she or he is thinking when preparing food or refreshment for others.

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(example) "Children, when I prepare for a meal, I am thinking'

[Sermon on the Mount - Jesus' Inaugural Speech according to Matthew]

The **Sermon on the Mount** is a collection of sayings and teachings of Jesus, which emphasizes his moral teaching found in the Gospel of Matthew (chapters 5, 6 and 7). It is the first of the Five Discourses of Matthew and takes place relatively early in the Ministry of Jesus and preached in Galilee.

The Sermon is the longest piece of teaching from Jesus in the New Testament. It includes some of the best known teachings of Jesus, such as the Beatitudes, and the widely recited Lord's Prayer. To most believers in Jesus, the Sermon on the Mount contains the central tenets of Christian discipleship.


The last verse of chapter 5 is considered to be a focal point that summarizes the teaching of the sermon: "be perfect, as your heavenly Father is perfect", advising his disciples and followers

to seek the path towards perfection and the Kingdom of Heaven.

Read "Sermon on the Mount" during the week!

"Righteousness" or "Being Righteous"


The word for "righteousness" or "being righteous" used in the bible doesn't simply mean good behavior. It is a relational language. "Righteousness" indicates a right relationship with God. "Being righteous" is what is expected from the faithful children of God. Noah (Genesis 6:9) and Job (Job 1:1) are known as righteous persons. Blameless were they among the people. They walked with God. They feared God and shunned evil. "Being righteous" shall be the biblical notion of spiritual maturity toward perfection.

2. Berry Cracker Star Spangled Banner, Celebrating Christian Freedom Sunday, July 2, 2017

🕯 Objectives:

- Celebrating The 4th of July, children learn about true meaning of "Christian Freedom."
- Encounter the epistle lesson of Apostle Paul concerning "Christian Freedom" from Galatians 3;22-4;7
- Help young people learn about true freedom from their faith in Jesus Christ
- Č Menu for the day: Berry Cracker Star Spangled Benner
- Text in Context: Galatians 3:22-4:7
- Read the scripture and let the students draw underline on the lessons for Christian Freedom.

Galatians 3:22 - 4:7 ²² But the Scripture declares that the whole world is a prisoner of sin, so that what was promised, being given through faith in Jesus Christ, might be given to those who believe. ²³ Before this faith came, we were held prisoners by the law, locked up until faith should be revealed. ²⁴ So the law was put in charge to lead us to Christ that we might be justified by faith. ²⁵ Now that faith has come, we are no longer under the supervision of the law. ²⁶ You are all sons of God through faith in Christ Jesus, ²⁷ for all of you who were baptized into Christ have clothed yourselves with Christ. ²⁸ There is neither Jew nor Greek, slave nor free, male nor female, for you are all one in Christ Jesus. ²⁹ If you belong to Christ, then you are Abraham's seed, and heirs according to the promise. **4:1** What I am saying is that as long as the heir is a child, he is no different from a slave, although he owns the whole estate. ² He is subject to guardians and trustees until the time set by his father. ³ So also, when we were children, we were in slavery under the basic principles of the world. ⁴ But when the time had fully come, God sent his Son, born of a woman, born under law, ⁵ to redeem those under law, that we might receive the full rights of sons. ⁶ Because you are sons, God sent the Spirit of his Son into our hearts, the Spirit who calls out, "Abba, Father." ⁷ So you are no longer a slave, but a son; and



since you are a son, God has made you also an heir.

Cooking Event: Berry Cracker Star Spangled Banner Prep 10 minute; Ready in 10 minutes

On a large white plate make a star spangled banner with crackers.

[Ingredients]

- 2 boxes of crackers
- Whipping cream
- 1 lbs of Blackberries
- 2 lbs of strawberries


(Preparation)

- 1. Line up crackers on a large white plate
- 2. Wash gently black berry and strawberry with running water
- 3. Slice berries as shown in the picture
- 4. Spread whipping cream on the crackers and place sliced berries on each cracker

📖 Paul's Letter to Galatians: Christian Freedom

(From "Galatians," Interpreter's One-Volume Commentary, pp. 832-833)

In his pastoral letter to Galatians, Apostle Paul talks about "true" freedom. Freedom he argues about is not simply from a political oppression of the Roman rules. As an act of salvation, Paul mentions true freedom is from the bondage of sin and death. This freedom is a gift from God through Jesus for all—Jews and Gentiles. Before the gospels were written, Apostle Paul suggests a serious spiritual concern of the early Christian community - "Can the Gentiles who were not circumcised be received as the children of Abraham?"

Apostle Paul addresses true meaning of the gospel of Jesus Christ: Justification comes, not by law but through the Spirit by faith. It is not an event on which the Christian may look back with pride, but a goal to which he looks forward in hope (Galatians 5:5-6).

Freedom is not to be confused with libertinism. Freedom from the legalism of life under the law does not mean release from responsibility but constitutes a summons to the greater responsibilities of life under grace.





3. Kiwi Lollipop - Faith of Mustard Seeds Sunday, July 9, 2017

Dbjectives:

- Children learn about the unlimited power of faith
- Encounter Jesus' Parable on Mustard Seed from Matthew 13:31-32
- Help young children understand that Kingdom of God is established from small act of faith
- O Menu for the day: Kiwi Lollipop
- Text in Context: Matthew 13:31-32
- Read the scripture and memorize the verse.

Matthew 13:31-32 ³¹ He [Jesus] told them another parable: "The kingdom of heaven is like a mustard seed, which a man took and planted in his field. ³² Though it is the smallest of all your seeds, yet when it grows, it is the largest of garden plants and becomes a tree, so that the birds of the air come and perch in its branches."

- 50 sticks or tooth picks


(Directions)

Further Study

Parables

(from NIV First-Century Study Bible, p. 1213)

Parables were short stories that had a moral or ethical point related to matters of Jewish law and interpretation. Jesus' parables were often misunderstood, even by his own disciples, and often had several layers of meaning. The use of parables was popular in all stages of Jewish literature, from the Bible to the writings of the rabbis.

The Parables of Jesus in the Gospels (Matthew 13; Mark 4; Luke 10)


In the gospels the parables play a significant role, especially unpacking the mystery of God's Kingdom. Jesus used the parables for the explanation of God's Kingdom he brings forth among the people. Each gospel includes a series of the parables: Parable or sowers, mustard seeds, weeds and wheat, hidden treasure, etc. Mark testifies to the secret of the coming of God's Kingdom through the parables. The parables in Luke emphasize God's Kingdom as socio-economic justice for

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all. Matthew understands them to what God is doing in Jesus as a fulfillment of prophecy.



4. Fishy Fruit Slices as A Call to Become Fishers of Men

🕯 Objectives:


Children learn about Jesus' Call for workers of God's Kingdom

- Encounter the Call of First Disciples in the sea of Galilee from Luke 5:1-11
- Help young children learn evangelism as the important task of the church
- O Menu for the day: Fishy Fruit Slices
- Text in Context: Luke 5:1-11

Read the scripture or re-tell the story briefly, so that children may learn about Jesus' call of the first disciples

Luke 5:1-11 One day as Jesus was standing by the Lake of Gennesaret, with the people crowding around him and listening to the word of God, ² he saw at the water's edge two boats, left there by the fishermen, who were washing their nets. ³ He got into one of the boats, the one belonging to Simon, and asked him to put out a little from shore. Then he sat down and taught the people from the boat. ⁴ When he had finished speaking, he said to Simon, "Put out into deep water, and let down the nets for a catch." ⁵ Simon answered, "Master, we've worked hard all night and haven't caught anything. But because you say so, I will let down the nets." ⁶ When they had done so, they caught such a large number of fish that their nets began to break. ⁷ So they signaled their partners in the other boat to come and help them, and they came and filled both boats so full that they began to sink. ⁸ When Simon Peter saw this, he fell at Jesus' knees and said, "Go away from me, Lord; I am a sinful man!" ⁹ For he and all his companions were astonished at the catch of fish they had taken, ¹⁰ and so were James and John, the sons of Zebedee, Simon's partners. Then Jesus said to Simon, "Don't be afraid; from now on you will catch men." ¹¹ So they pulled their boats up on shore, left everything and followed him.

[Ingredients] Original recipe makes 24 servings

- 1 dozen oranges
- -11b black berries
- 1 bag of carrots

(Preparation)

- 1. Slice orange for fishy body as shown in the picture.
- 2. Cut carrot in pieces for fins.
- 3. Make small pieces of carrot for mouth
- 4. Wash blackberry gently with running water and sort in three sizes
- 5. Place fruit pieces to serve

- 7. Have a biblical literacy, esp. for "Sermon on the Mount" Matthew 5-7





Jeacher's Help - Jesus' Call of The Gifted

Further Study

Disciples, Who Are they?

Disciples are apprentices or pupils attached to a teacher or movement; one whose allegiance is to the instruction and commitments of the teacher or movement. Closely paralleling rabbinic custom, most New Testament references to "disciples" disignate "followerer" of Jesus, often a large group including both his cloest associates (the Twelve) and a large number who followed with varing positive response (Luke 6:17). Disciples are not simply Twelve disciples we recognize from the gospels in the New Testament, but ones who would like to learn Jesus' teachings for His Kingdom.

The Twelve and Other Disciples

"The Twelve" is a group chosen by Jesus to accompany him and share his ministry (Matthew 10:1-4; Mark 13-19; Luke 6:13-16; John 6:70' Acts 1:13). The number apparently refers to the twelve tribes of Israel (Matthew 19:28) and symbolize the restoration of Israel. As witnesses to his ministry and resurrection, the Twelve authenticate the church's postresurrection proclamation of the tradition about Jesus. (from *Harpercollins Bible Dictionary*)



Gospel writers include many others, like women and children. Apostle Paul list these disciples in his letter to the Corinthians chapter 15.

³ For what I received I passed on to you as of first importance: that Christ died for our sins according to the Scriptures, ⁴ that he was buried, that he was raised on the third day according to the Scriptures, ⁵ and that he appeared to **Peter**, and then to **the Twelve**. ⁶ After that, he appeared to more than **five hundred** of the brothers at the same time, most of whom are still living, though some have fallen asleep. ⁷ Then he appeared to **James**, then to **all the apostles**, ⁸ and last of all he appeared to **me [Paul]** also, as to one abnormally born. **(1 Corinthians 15:3-8)**

Peter: A rack or stone (Sign of Aries, Tribe of Zebulon)
Simon: That hears; that obeys (Sign of Taurus, Tribe of Joseph)
James: Same as 'Jacob' - that supplants, undermines, the hee/(Sign of Gemini, Tribe of Benjamin)
Andrew: A strong man (Sign of Cancer, Tribe of Issachar)
John: The grace or mercy of the LORD (Sign of Leo, Tribe of Judah)
Philip: Warlike, a lover of horses (Sign of Virgo, Tribe of Naphtali)
Bartholomew: A son that suspends the waters (Sign of Libra, Tribe of Asher)
Thomas: A twin (Sign of Scorpio, Tribe of Dan)
James the Great: Same as 'Jacob' - that supplants, undermines, the heel (Sign of Sagittarius, Tribe of Gad)
Matthew: Given, a reward, (Sign of Capricorn, Tribe of Simeon)
(Jude) Thaddeus: That praises or confesses (Sign of Aquarius, Tribe of Reuben)
Matthias/Judas: The gift of the LORD (Sign of Pisces, Tribe of Levi)


- Children learn about becoming good and faithful children of God through good examples.

- O Menu for the day: Watermelon Lollipop
- Text in Context: Luke 6:43-45
- Read the scripture and let the students talk about the examples about bearing bad fruits in their behaviors to others.

Luke 6:43-48 ⁴³ "No good tree bears bad fruit, nor does a bad tree bear good fruit. ⁴⁴ Each tree is recognized by its own fruit. People do not pick figs from thornbushes, or grapes from briers. ⁴⁵ The good man brings good things out of the good stored up in his heart, and the evil man brings evil things out of the evil stored up in his heart. For out of the overflow of his heart his mouth speaks. ⁴⁶ "Why do you call me, 'Lord, Lord,' and do not do what I say? ⁴⁷ I will show you what he is like who

comes to me and hears my words and puts them into practice.

A gentle answer turns away wrath, but a harsh word stirs up anger. (Proverbs 15:1)

Teacher's Help - Good Fruit from Good Tree

You can name a tree by its fruit. Look at a tree full of apples. That's an apple tree. Pick an orange. You've picked it from an orange tree.

You can even know a tree's health from its fruit. Does this tree grow many juicy plums? It's a healthy plum tree. Does that tree bear small, dry pears? It's a sick pear tree.



Jesus compares people to trees. He says that good people do good things. Their hearts are full of good fruit. Bad people, Jesus warns, do bad things. Their hearts are full of bad fruit.

Jesus gives you a gentle reminder. Check your fruits.

Jesus also gives you a gently warning. You can know people by their actions and their words. Keep your eyes and ears open. Choose your friends by their fruits. Jesus wants only the best for you.



What are your "fruits"? Why should you check them? Should you check your friends' fruits? Why?



Ask Jesus to keep your heart good. Pray for help in picking your friends. Try to name some trees by their fruits.

"You can tell each tree by the kind of tree it bears" (Luke 6:44).



Discipline in the Christian Life - "Three Simple Rules"

Jesus invites all who love him and those who would like to live with others in peace to a faithful Christian living. The life is not easy and needs a discipline to maintain the unity of faith and good works through "the means of grace."

John Wesley insisted that evangelical faith should manifest itself in evangelical living. He spelled out this expectation in the three-part formula of the rules: First, by **doing no harm**, by avoiding evil of every kind...; secondly by **doing good** of every possible sort, and, as far as possible, to all...; thirdly, by **attending upon all the ordinances of God**, such as: the public worship of God, the ministry of the Word, the Supper of the Lord, family and private prayer, searching the scriptures, fasting or abstinence. These three rules show how the Christian conscience might move from general principles to specific actions.



Assimilation Process

Dur church would like its members and friends to grow spiritually through the gospel of Jesus Christ. The Assimilation process is an intentional demonstration of "equipping" new disciples to deepen their relationship with Jesus and His work. For the beginner or visitors spiritual leaders may help them go through 1) Awareness Phase, 2) Ownership Phase, and 3) Fruit-bearing Phase of their spiritual growth. Confident as Paul, the spiritual leaders must have strong faith in leading others: "Therefore I urge you to imitate me." (1 Corinthians 4:16)

John 6:1-15 ^{NIV} **John 6:1** Some time after this, Jesus crossed to the far shore of the Sea of Galilee (that is, the Sea of Tiberias), ² and a great crowd of people followed him because they saw the miraculous signs he had performed on the sick. ³ Then Jesus went up on a mountainside and sat down with his disciples. ⁴ The Jewish Passover Feast was near. ⁵ When Jesus looked up and saw a great crowd coming toward him, he said to Philip, "Where shall we buy bread for these people to eat?" ⁶ He asked this only to test him, for he already had in mind what he was going to do. ⁷ Philip answered him, "Eight months' wages would not buy enough bread for each one to have a bite!" ⁸ Another of his disciples, Andrew, Simon Peter's brother, spoke up, ⁹ "Here is a boy with five small barley loaves and two small fish, but how far will they go among so many?" ¹⁰ Jesus said, "Have the people sit down." There was plenty of grass in that place, and the men sat down, about five thousand of them. ¹¹ Jesus then took the loaves, gave thanks, and distributed to those who were seated as much as they wanted. He did the same with the fish. ¹² When they had all had enough to eat, he said to his disciples,



"Gather the pieces that are left over. Let nothing be wasted." ¹³ So they gathered them and filled twelve baskets with the pieces of the five barley loaves left over by those who had eaten. ¹⁴ After the people saw the miraculous sign that Jesus did, they began to say, "Surely this is the Prophet who is to come into the world." ¹⁵ Jesus, knowing that they intended to come and make him king by force, withdrew again to a mountain by himself.





Meaning of Holy Communion: The Lord's Supper

John's Feeding of 5,000 is full of sacramental language:

Jesus then **took** the loaves, **gave thanks**, and **distributed** to those who were seated as much as they wanted. He did the same with the fish. (**John 6:11**)

The Lord's Supper is the last meal Jesus shared with his disciples prior to his death. The early Christian celebration receives this name from Paul's reference to "the supper of the Lord" in 1 Corinthians 11:20. The words spoken



over bread and cup were a crucial part of the Lord's Supper liturgy from the beginning. The bread and wine are connected with Jesus' redemptive death.

The Lord's Supper has **multiple meaning**. It is also called as Eucharist, meaning Thanksgiving, which is associated with Jesus' prayer of thanksgiving for the meal. The Lord's Supper is a memorial act of Jesus' life and death. But, it does not simply commemorate what Jesus did in his past public ministry. It recollects the promise of His coming in the future, which symbolize the meal as a heavenly banquet. Many Chrisitian believers call the meal as Holy Communion - a liturgical celebration of the Saints here on earth and over there in heaven. The Lord's Supper is opened to everyone, including children and non-baptized peple in our Methodist tradition as a table set by the grace of God, because we believe that God's grace works beyond human understanding (known as "Prevenient Grace").

The Lord's Supper is also known as "breaking of the bread for the gathering of faithful disciples of Jesus for the transformation of the world." Prior to reception of the elements—bread and wine, the participants are expected for an act of repentance. Celebrated throughout the ages for a spiritual reminder, it serves for eschatological reminder of God's blessing.

Many churches don't offer The Lord's Supper. There is no restriction for frequency. It can be offered at every worship service. Often the Lord's Supper is associated with several other liturgical services, such as Seasonal services at Holy Week, Easter and Christimas and at Wedding and Funeral.

• Read the scripture and let the students talk about what kind of people God would like to have?

Isaiah 1:1-18 The vision concerning Judah and Jerusalem that Isaiah son of Amoz saw during the reigns of Uzziah, Jotham, Ahaz and Hezekiah, kings of Judah. ² Hear, O heavens! Listen, O earth! For the LORD has spoken: "I reared children and brought them up, but they have rebelled against me.³ The ox knows his master, the donkey his owner's manger, but Israel does not know, my people do not understand." $\,^4$ Ah, sinful nation, a people loaded with quilt, a brood of evildoers, children given to corruption! They have forsaken the LORD: they have spurned the Holy One of Israel and turned their backs on him. ⁵ Why should you be beaten anymore? Why do vou persist in rebellion? Your whole head is iniured, your whole heart afflicted. ⁶ From the sole of your foot to the top of your head there is no soundness-- only wounds and welts and open sores, not cleansed or bandaged or soothed with oil. ⁷ Your country is desolate, your cities burned with fire; your fields are being stripped by foreigners right before you, laid waste as when overthrown by strangers. ⁸ The Daughter of Zion is left like a shelter in a vineyard, like a hut in a field of melons, like a city under siege. ⁹ Unless the LORD Almighty had left us some survivors, we would have become like Sodom, we would have been like Gomorrah. ¹⁰ Hear the word of the LORD, you rulers of Sodom; listen to the law of our God, you people of Gomorrah! $^{
m II}$ "The multitude of your sacrifices-- what are they to me?" says the LORD. "I have more than enough of burnt offerings, of rams and the fat of fattened animals; I have no pleasure in the blood of bulls and lambs and goats. ¹² When you come to appear before me, who has asked this of you, this trampling of my courts? ¹³ Stop bringing meaningless offerings! Your incense is detestable to me. New Moons, Sabbaths and convocations-- I cannot bear your evil assemblies. ¹⁴ Your New Moon festivals and your appointed feasts my soul hates. They have become a burden to me; I am weary of bearing them. ¹⁵ When you spread out your hands in prayer, I will hide my eyes from you; even if you offer many prayers, I will not listen. Your hands are full of blood; ¹⁶ wash and make yourselves clean. Take your evil deeds out of my sight! Stop doing wrong, ¹⁷ learn to do right! Seek justice, encourage the oppressed. Defend the cause of the fatherless, plead the case of the widow.¹⁸ "Come now, let us reason together," says the LORD. "Though your sins are like scarlet, they shall be as white as snow; though they are red as crimson, they shall be like wool.

[Ingredients] Original recipe makes 24 servings

- 6 cups heavy whipping cream
 6 cups half-and-half cream
 2-1/4 cups white sugar
 3 tablespoons vanilla extract

[Directions]



1. In a large bowl, combine the heavy cream and the half and half. Gradually whisk in the sugar until blended.

2. Whisk in the vanilla. Refrigerate, covered, until very cold, at least 3 hours or as long as 3 days.

3. Whisk the mixture to blend and pour into the canister of an ice cream maker. Freeze accordino to the manufacturer's directions. Eat at once or transfer to a covered container and freeze up to 8 hours.

Teacher's Help - Act of Repentance

Have you ever done something bad that you didn't mean to do? Maybe you ruined someone's homework. Maybe you slammed the door on their hand. And maybe you thought it was fault anyway. You may have said, "They should have put their paper away." Or you may have thought, they should have moved their hand. You don't need to say you're sorry ... right? WRDNG!

You need to say you're sorry any time you hurt someone. It doesn't matter if you wanted to hurt them or not. When you say you are sorry, you show them that you care.

When you do something wrong. God will forgive you if you ask. That doesn't mean God will not punish you. God loves you. He wants you to obey. God tells adults to act like he does. When you break your parents' or guardians' rules, they will punish you. You may think they are mean when they punish you. That's not true.



They love you. But it's their job to teach you right from wrong. They want to help you become a better person.



Do you say you are sorry whenever you hurt someone? How do you feel when someone says they are sorry for hurting you?

God through the prophet Isaiah wants us to learn to do what is right—treating people fairly; giving hope to those who are beaten down, cheering them up. God also will forgive those who repent their wrong behaviors. When repenting, even though their sins are red as crimson they will be white as wool. It means God's forgiveness of sins.



Further Study

Forgiveness of Sins

Forgiveness means "send away," "cover," "remove," and "wipe away." In the New Testament "send away" is used most often; forgivenss is also communicated by words which mean "loose" (Luke 6:37), "be gracious to" (Luke 7:43; 2 Corinthians 2:7), and "pass over (Romans 3:25).

Forgivenss of sins is an important act in reconciling with one another. It leads people to restore a broken relationship with God and with one another. It brings people to the joy of salvation.

Forgiveness is a gift from the merciful and loving. God's forgiveness is variously described as justification, salvation, and reconciliation. It is associated with the celebration of the Lord's Supper (Matthew 26:28) and in some passages Jesus himself forgives sins (Mark 2:5-6; Acts 5:31). Members of the Christian community also have a role in the forgiveness of each other's sin (John 20:23; James 5:13-16).

Forgiveness is an act of love. It is of God; God is love. **Apostle Paul** explains the power of love for the forgiveness of sins from his first letter to Corinthians.

⁴ Love is patient, love is kind. It does not envy, it does not boast, it is not proud. ⁵ It is not rude, it is not self-seeking, it is not easily angered, it keeps no record of wrongs. ⁶ Love does not delight in evil but rejoices with the truth. ⁷ It always protects, always trusts, always hopes, always perseveres. (**1 Corinthians 13:4-7**)

Peter, one of the Twelve emphasizes the importance of love for the salvation.

⁸ Above all, love each other deeply, because love covers over a multitude of sins. (**1 Peter 4:8**)

The greatest love is shown by **Jesus** at His crucifixion. He laid down his life for the forgiveness of sins of the world, reconciling it with God. He even forgave the ones who crucified him.

³⁴ Jesus said, "Father, forgive them, for they do not know what they are doing." (**Luke 23:34**)





- Text in Context: Hebrews 5:7-6:3
- Read the scripture concerning mutual accountability for the act of faith.



Hebrews 5:7 - 6:3 ⁷ During the days of Jesus' life on earth, he offered up prayers and petitions with loud cries and tears to the one who could save him from death, and he was heard because of his reverent submission. ⁸ Although he was a son, he learned obedience from what he suffered ⁹ and, once made perfect, he became the source of eternal salvation for all who obey him ¹⁰ and was designated by God to be high priest in the order of Melchizedek. ¹¹ We have much to say about this, but it is hard to explain because you are slow to learn. ¹² In fact, though by this time you ought to be teachers, you need someone to teach you the elementary truths of God's word all over again. You need milk, not solid food! ¹³ Anyone who lives on milk, being still an infant, is not acquainted with the teaching about righteousness. ¹⁴ But solid food is for the mature, who by constant use have trained themselves to distinguish good from evil. ^{6:1} Therefore let us leave the elementary teachings about Christ and go on to maturity, not laying again the foundation of repen-

tance from acts that lead to death, and of faith in God, ² instruction about baptisms, the laying on of hands, the resurrection of the dead, and eternal judgment.



No branch can bear fruit by itself; it must remain in the vine. Neither can you bear fruit unless you remain in me. ⁵ "I am the vine; you are the branches. If a man remains in me and I in him, he will bear much fruit; apart from me you can do nothing. ⁶ If anyone does not remain in me, he is like a branch that is thrown away and withers; such branches are picked up, thrown into the fire and burned. ⁷ If you remain in me and my words remain in you, ask whatever you wish, and it will be given you. ⁸ This is to my Father's glory, that you bear much fruit, showing yourselves to be my disciples. ⁹ "As the Father has loved me, so have I loved you. Now remain in my love. ¹⁰ If you obey my commands, you will remain in my love, just as I have obeyed my Father's commands and remain in his love.

He called his twelve disciples to him and gave them authority to drive out evil spirits and to heal every disease and sickness. ² These are the names of the twelve apostles: first, Simon (who is called Peter) and his brother Andrew; James

son of Zebedee, and his brother John; ³ Philip and Bartholomew; Thomas and Matthew the tax collector; James son of Alphaeus, and Thaddaeus; ⁴ Simon the Zealot and Judas Iscariot, who betrayed him. ⁵ These twelve Jesus sent out with the following instructions: "Do not go among the Gentiles or enter any town of the Samaritans. ⁶ Go rather to the lost sheep of Israel. ⁷ As you go, preach this message: 'The kingdom of heaven is near.' ⁸ Heal the sick, raise the dead, cleanse those who have leprosy, drive out demons. Freely you have received, freely give. (Matthew 10:1-8)


Faithful Connection for Mission Outreach

Teacher's Help - "Bearing Fruits"



A branch is connected to a vine. You can't see all those connections. They're hidden inside the plant. Inside the branch are tiny tubes. They tie the branch to the vine. Everything the branch needs flows through these tubes and keeps the branch alive.

Jesus is like a vine. You are like a branch. You can't see or touch the connections between you. But you can feel them deep within yourself.

Love and care connect you to Jesus. He sends you blessings every day. He comforts you with his presence. He leads you with his teachings in the Bible.

Jesus wants you to stay close to him. He wants you to keep the connections open and strong. Then he will bless you freely. His love will flow in you. Your soul will grow strong.



How can you keep your connections to Jesus open? Can any person help you do that? Does Jesus help?




Ask Jesus to keep you close to him. Pray for people who are not close to Jesus. Gently remove one branch from a plant. Look at the tiny tubes inside of it.



Further Study

Wine and Vine (From "Vine," Harpercollins Bible Dictionary, pp. 1192-93) **Wine** is generally viewed as a blessing (Genesis 27:28; Deuteronomy 7:13) that "gladdens the heart" (Psalm 104:15) suppresses pain, and banishes misery in forgetfulness (1 Timothy 5:23; Proverbs 31:6). Its absence on special occasions such as weddings was a misfortune, and on one occasion Jesus remedied such a lack by maraculous means (John 2:1-10). Wine was offered to God in Israelite worship (Leviticus 23:13; Numbers 28:14) and was employed medicinally to adminster drugs (Matthew 27:34), to treat wounds (Luke 10:34), and to cure digestive ailments (1 Timothy 5:23). **The vine** was a rich



source of symbolism in ancient Near Eastern literature, ritual and art. The twining branch signified life and the grape cluster, or vineyard, fertility (Song of Solomon 7:12). Raisins pressed into cakes were used in the cult of the goddess of love (Hosea 3:1). Wine was the "blood of the grape (Genesis 49:11; Deuternomy 32:14), an image recalled in Jesus' words over the cup of the Last Supper (Matthew 26:28). God's judgment of the wicked is like the treading of a winepress (Isaiah 63:1-3; Revelation 14:18-20).

Israel accepted the vine and its fruit as gifts of the Lord, not the land (Hosea 2:8-9, 15). Israel itself was likened to a vine, planted and tended by God (Jeremiah 2:21; Psalm 80:8-9). The New Testament applies the image to Jesus and the church: "I am the vine, you are the branches. He who abides in me... bear much fruit" (John 15:5).

God, as Gardner, Jesus as True Vine, Disciples as Branches

Jesus is the true Israel, in whose stem are incorporated the branches of the people of God, who find their fulfillment and life in him. This lesson is associated with "I Am" saying - a biblical expression of Divine revelation. When Jesus speaks of himself as the vine, his words are not only self-revelatory, but are revelatory of the interrelationship of God, Jesus, and the community in the life of faith as well. All three elements—gardener, vine and branches—are essential to the production of fruit. God is the source and guiding hand that governs Jesus and his work (John 4:36-37; 10:28-30).

Church, The Branches of Christ

(from "John 15:1-17" *New Interpreter's Bible Commentary*, pp. 754-760) In a vine, branches are completely indistinguishable from one another. It is impossible to determine where one branch stops and another branch starts. All run together as they grow out of the central vine. To live according to this model, the church would be a community in which members are known for the acts of love that they do in common with all other members. It would be a community built around the corporate accountability to the

abiding presence of Jesus and corporate enactment of the love of God and Jesus.



Are you learning to work hard? Are you learning to take care of yourself? If not, you'd better take lessons from Professor Ant!



Further Study

Wisdom Literature

(From "Wisdom Literature" Harpercollins Bible Dictionary, pp. 1214-1215)

In the Old Testament, "wisdom literature" is generally understood to refer to Proverbs, Job, and Ecclesiastes. An outstanding trait of biblical wisdom is the personification of Lady Wisdom in Proverbs 1; 3; and 9. She is described as orginating from God and is associated with creation (Proverbs 3:19; 8:22-31). Among the biblical scholars, like G. von Rad it is understood as "the self-revelation of creation" and one might add, the revelation of God in and through creation (Psalm 19:1). This understanding gave birth to "Wisdom theology," which is a theological insight on creation and human experience that the Hebrew sages operated.

Jesus is presented in the Synoptic gospels (Matthew, Mark and Luke) as a wisdom teacher, a rabbi. The wisdom of Jesus is "greater than Solomon" (Luke 11;31; Mark 6:2). In Matthew 11:2-19 and Luke 7:18-35 Jesus is implicitly designated as wisdom. What appears as a threat by wisdom in Luke 11:49-51 is a means for Matthew to identify Jesus as wisdom (Matthew 23:34-36). Like wisdom in Proverbs 8, Jesus issues an invitation to all to follow him and take up his yoke (Matthew 11:28-30).

Wisdom Quoats from the Book of Proverbs

Honor the Lord with your wealth, with the firstfruits of all your crops; then your barns will be filled to overflowing, and your vats will brim over with new wine. 3:9-10
