Calling of the Pastor

Shortly after twelve noon on Sunday afternoon, May 19, the congregation broke into applause as our District Minister Beth Sollenberger led Doug and Tasha Veal to the front and announced: "You have a new pastor." The day started at 9:00 A.M. as many folks from the congregation greeted Doug and Tasha during a fellowship coffee hour. Next, during the morning worship, Doug preached a trial sermon. A church Council Meeting was convened right after the service, and two separate votes were taken as a part of that meeting. The first vote to "call" Doug as our pastor came in at over 97%. In a second vote, there was unanimous approval of a proposed financial package.

At that time, Doug and Tasha were waiting back in the pastor's office. As she left to tell them the results, Beth explained that if they wanted, they could take some time before they gave their answer to our call. As a way to pass time, we started singing a hymn.

Their response was quite quick, as we were not even through all the verses in that hymn when Beth ushered them up front and announced their "yes" decision. As they both smiled in response to the applause from the congregation, Doug shared that he is really looking forward to "serving with us" as we continue to do the work of Jesus.

They have already begun the process of buying a house in Wabash as they look forward to the start date of Monday, July 1st. They will attend Annual Conference which begins later that week, and Doug's first Sunday in the pulpit will be July 14. Under the ³/₄ time contract, Doug will work and preach three weeks each month (four weeks in months with five Sundays) and be off one Sunday/week each month.

We welcome all who are on the journey to know Jesus, who share in his love and who choose to embrace the diversity within this community of believers. As individuals we may be at different places along the path, but as a community, we are all traveling together in faith, trusting God to show us the way.

Random Thoughts

Inviting In... Pastor Deb Peterson

"It's time to say goodbye, but I think goodbyes are sad and I'd much rather say hello. Hello to a new adventure." (Ernie Harwell, sportscaster)

Over a year ago when I was approached by Beth Sollenberger about taking an interim pastorate here at Wabash, I had been "retired" for nine years. I had been "disabled" in October of 2009 by sepsis and a rare bacterial virus that attacked my brain, leaving it changed. I lost about half of my short-term memory, began having anxiety attacks which were foreign to me, often have trouble finding the word I want to describe something and brain fog that comes from nowhere in an instant. These changes left me with Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD) which lasted over two years, even with intense psychotherapy. Although I preached and attended a board meeting at my congregation of nine years the week prior to my hospitalization, I never returned.

It's been a long way back from that, which rapidly and radically changed my life and my direction. I had bouts of depression, not able to see what God had in store for my future. I felt like I was spinning in place. Gradually I developed a life of "retirement," reading a lot, spending time with my grandchildren, becoming active in my church.


When Beth talked to me about Wabash Church of the Brethren, my first thought was the distance! It's 43 miles from my house, all but the last 5 minutes on State Road 13 which is narrow, bumpy and takes me through 5 towns to get to Wabash (meaning I have to slow down to 35 mph to get through each of those!). But I began praying about it: "God, is this what you have for my life right now?" A few weeks later I traveled to my brother's house south of Indianapolis. The route takes me from SR13 to US 24 and as I passed the turn to Falls Drive, I realized it wasn't so far to the church.

Your congregation is the first interim pastoring I've ever done! I have enjoyed every part of my service to you (including long church board meetings from which I sometimes didn't get home until 11:00 p.m.). Part of Matthew 25:35 says, "I was a stranger and you invited me in." I came here as an unknown and you received me and you have loved me generously. It wasn't because I deserved or earned it, but because of your existing relationship with Jesus Christ. Because of your openness to the spirit and your belief that God IS love, we have shared together—laughter,

June Update

Friends,

There are lots of pieces in this email that I hope will be engaging for you. We need volunteers for different BDM assignments. Figure out how you can go and invite friends and colleagues to join you. 1. The story went something like this. A BDM team in North Carolina had been assigned a project in a nearly inaccessible mobile home community that had been hard hit by both Hurricanes Matthew and Florence. The home owner was quite lethargic as the team worked on the roof, floors and ceilings of her home. As she was physically able, the team groused that she did nothing to assist or clean up her cluttered home. The second day continued as the first. Again the questions among the team. The third day there was a bit to finish so the team returned. The clothing on hangers that had been piled on the couch had been neatly hung in the closet that now had a new ceiling without leaks. The bed that earlier had been reached by walking gingerly across the open floor joists was nicely made and the room cleared of clutter. The dishes were washed and the kitchen was like new. The home owner was renewed; her home was livable. A few repairs had allowed life to return to this home! So it is critical for BDM work crews to have some patient understanding eyes as they move into new situations.

2. BDM continues to work in Lumberton, North Carolina. Floods from the two hurricanes mentioned in the above story continue to be the cause of families being homeless. FEMA has a waiting list of nearly 10,000 families waiting for assistance. In August BDM will open a new project either in a new location in North Carolina or in Florida to respond to earlier storm Irma.

3. S/C Indiana District needs 15 volunteers September 8-14. Those volunteers will be assigned to either the site in Florida or the new site in North Carolina. Please respond to this email so we can start to build this team. An assistant cook will be a key addition to the operation of the team. Other volunteers can be skilled artisans or beginners. All help can be used.

4. BDM continues to work hard in Puerto Rico. Volunteers and construction leaders are needed this summer and through the fall for building and rebuilding. Volunteers should expect two week stints with heat, sun and hard physical labor. If you would like to go or have questions please send an email to Cliff: kindy@cpt.org.

5. The floods from rain and snow melt that ravaged Nebraska and the surrounding area this spring have led to requests for folks to rebuild and restore farms and homes. BDM is not establishing a project there but is working under the umbrella of Mennonite Disaster Services (MDS). If you are able to join that effort please call Cliff at 260-982-2971 to be connected.

6. The increasing number and severity of storms that are requiring a BDM response have led to high demand for disaster cleanup buckets. Those can be sent out quickly and easily to homeowners who are usually the first to respond to weather crises. When you and your congregation want to help renew the supply of buckets, check out CWS Emergency Cleanup Buckets on line or respond to this email.
8. Our district is also responsible for seven volunteers to one of the BDM projects December 1-7. It is not too soon to ask to be part of that team.

Church of the Brethren Minister's Association -Pre-Annual Conference Continuing Education Event "the denomination has very clear policies that advocate and define fair and appropriate considerations of pastors..." (Statement of Ethics for Congregations in the Church of the Brethren, 1996) "I will strive to maintain reasonable expectations for myself and not allow others' unreasonable expectations to endanger my well-being." (Ethics in Ministry Relations, 2008) One's thoughts may tend to turn to misconduct when hearing the term, "setting boundaries." There are, however, everyday boundaries which, when continually crossed, can ultimately lead to an unhealthy ministry for both pastor and congregation. Dr. Olsen and his co-author, Nancy G. Devor, bring to light some of those everyday boundary problems. They offer suggestions for pastors and congregations on how to be aware of possible pitfalls and how to work together to set healthy boundaries.

Dr. Olsen is an Adjunct Professor with The Sage Colleges and Executive Director of Samaritan Counseling Center. 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
