### Jaycees Plan Full Program

What promises to be Dorval's biggest celebration since the Lakeshore centre attained cityhood some six years ago, the 1961 version of Dorval Day scheduled for Saturday next will climax a week of activity set up by the Junior Chamber of Commerce that features everything from the mid-week semi-final judging of beauty contestants to a pre-Dorval Day teen hop Friday night at which this year's Miss Dorval will be selected.

Judges for the Miss Dorval sweepstakes are Mrs. Dorothy Dow, representing the Dorval Recreational Association; Aid. W. C. Wilson, representing the City of Dorval; Gordon Graham of the Dorval Senior Chamber of Commerce; Mr. R. Brunet, representing the Dorval Gardens Merchants' Association and Mike Hildred of Trans-Canada Air Lines.

Dorval Day, originally set up by Mayor MP John Pratt, has been operated every succeeding year since its inception by the Junior Chamber of Commerce in co-operation with the City of Dorval.

In charge of promotion for this year's event, George Zahalan of the Jaycees said: "Of course we say that this year's Dorval Day will be the biggest yet, that's the natural thing to say. But a look at next Saturday's program can't possibly leave any room for argument. For example, the parade will carry more floats than ever before, there are more side features and more groups and organizations co-operating than at any time in the past, and there will be no less than six bands marching in the parade. Given a fair break in the weather next Saturday we'll guarantee those who watch the parade along the route and take part in the ceremonies, a banner show.

The parade will officially commence at 1:30 p.m. from the municipal garage area adjacent to Ballantyne Park. It will proceed along Martin to Church Avenue, east on Church to Green Circle, thence around Green Circle and Handfield to Lakeshore Drive, west on Lakeshore Drive to Dorval Avenue, and up Dorval Avenue to the Shopping Centre, arriving there at approximately 3:00 p.m.

Following the Miss Dorval crowning ceremonies at the Shopping Centre, a civic reception will be held, capped by a mammoth dance at the Dorval Recreation Centre on Lakeshore Drive Saturday night to the music of Herb Picard and his orchestra. Bob Gillies, well-known radio and TV commentator will act as MC.

An added attraction at the Saturday dance will be a floor show staged by the Lakeshore Variety Players, featuring Bob Gillies, Helen Manels, Phil Pitre, Ralph England and Donald Bader.

### Record Vote Cast In Catholic School Commissions Election

On July 12, the largest vote ever cast at a school Commission election in Dorval, returned Dr. Peter Paré who has served on the Commission for six years, and elected Mr. André Lauzon. The total number of votes were Dr. Peter Paré 522, Mr. André Lauzon 476, and Mr. R. Boyer 196.

The interest shown in the election and the number of voters who went to the polls indicate that Catholic voters in Dorval are presenting a united front on the question of a bi-ethnic high school which became one of the major issues of the election.

The appearance of Dr. Paré's name in an advertisement placed by L'Alliance des Associations Paroissiales in The Weekly Herald caused some confusion in people's minds prior to the election. Dr. Paré, who was being supported by the Dorval Parents' Association, had vigorously opposed the platform presented by L'Alliance.

In a statement to The Dorval Reporter following his re-election, Dr. Paré emphasized that he had not given his assent to the use of his

name in the ad in question and had promptly issued a letter to all voters denying any affiliation or community of interest with L'Alliance. The Commission, which (Cont'd on Page 8)

### Early Action On Pollution Urged

Provincial action in establishing a Water Purification Board was lauded by Ross Smyth, chairman of the Dorval Chamber of Commerce's water pollution committee.

"We should have the north shore of Lake St. Louis cleaned up in two to three years," he predicted. "Both provincial and federal financial aid is available and it is now up to the municipal authorities in Dorval, Pointe Claire and Ste. Anne de Bellevue to announce their plans and proposed action."

Smyth participated last week with the provincial Chamber of Commerce committee in a clause by clause study of Bill 88 establishing the new Water Purification Board.

### Canadian Swimming Championships To Be Held In Dorval Next Month

Canada's greatest swimmers will meet in Dorval next month for the 45th annual Canadian Open Swimming and Diving Championships.

The event, sanctioned by the Canadian Swimming Association and sponsored by The Dorval Recreation Association, will be held at Ballantyne Park Pool, Dorval, July 31 to August 3.

Among the swimming stars expected to compete in the event are the members of

Canada's 1961 Olympic swimming and diving team, composed of Sara Barber, of Brantford, Ont., Judy McHale, Margaret Iwasaki, Mary Stewart, all of Vancouver; Steven Rabonovitch and Dick Pound, of Montreal; Bob Wheaton, of Victoria; Ernie Melsner of Kitchener and Irene MacDonald, of Vancouver.

Officials stress that some 40 per cent of the points Canada earned at the Rome Olympics last year were won by the swimming and diving team. They firmly believe that Canada has the raw material to produce an outstanding swimming team both for the British Empire Games in Australia in 1962, and even more so in the Tokyo Olympics.

For instance, Mary Stewart, already an Olympic veteran and only a growing girl of 15, has had aim on at least two medals, quite conceivably the gold kind. Last year in Rome Mary swam with the world's best in the 100-metre freestyle Olympic final and finished eighth. Getting to the final was an astounding feat in itself, officials point out.

Some 200 entrants from all over Canada are expected to compete in the Canadian Swimming Championships at Ballantyne Pool. The meet will be divided into 30 events, and will include special age group

**Library To Be Closed During July**

During the month of May, three thousand, one hundred and thirty eight books were on loan at the Dorval Civiv Library. In other works, the monthly circulation has more than doubled since the re-opening of the new quarters. This also represents many

working hours of service to the community by the members of the volunteer staff. The Library will be closed for the month of July, and will re-open on Tuesday, August 1st. Library hours for August will be from 9:30 a.m. to 11:30 a.m. and from 7:30 to 9 p.m., every Tuesday.

**Blood Service For Tourists**

As the tourist season is again with us the Canadian Red Cross has sent out a reminder about a vital service for those of us who may become hospitalized in the United States or those tourists from south of the border who may become hospitalized while in our midst. Under reciprocal agreement with the American National Red Cross, American residents hospitalized in Canada receive blood free of charge, while domiciled Canadian residents, hospitalized in the United States, received similar services in most American communities. Since the inauguration of this agreement between the two Red Cross organizations, hundreds of Canadians and Americans have realized a considerable reduction in medical expenses, particularly in those areas in the United States not served by the Red Cross service. Whole blood and blood products are supplied free of charge by the Canadian Red Cross to 85 per cent of Canadian hospitals. Canadians requiring blood in the United States are advised to have their doctor or hospital contact the nearest Canadian consulate, American Red Cross Chapter or the Canadian Red Cross blood transfusion service anywhere in Canada.

It is of utmost importance that all books now on loan be returned by June 29th; however, additional reading may be borrowed for the closed period. Donations are still being received in connection with the recent annual campaign for funds. Results to date give a figure of \$1,345.29. According to Mrs. Ann Lachance, Librarian, the French section of the Library is growing and will continue to grow according to the membership. Library users are asked to note that current afternoon hours have been changed. Instead of 2-5 p.m. they will be 2-4:45 p.m. This is necessary in order to enable the staff to prepare the Library for the evening hours.

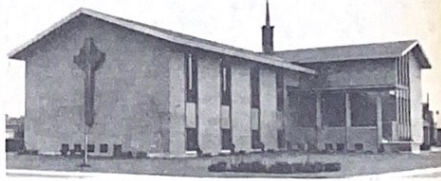

## IN FOCUS

Some people may question the advisability of holding Civil Defence exercises on the grounds that Nuclear warfare is immoral, which indeed it is, and that by preparing oneself to survive one is contributing to the belief that Nuclear War is inevitable. I cannot agree with this line of thought, neither can I subscribe to the dangerous theory that Canada should hold herself up as an example to the world by scrapping her defences, small as they are, and becoming a neutral power.

Dorval's Disaster Control organization is more concerned with the local aspect of survival at present, than with Nuclear warfare. We are an airport city where thousands of aircraft take off and land each year. We have never experienced a major accident within our borders; the fact remains, however, that a disaster of this nature could happen.

Consider what would happen if a jet crashed into a row of homes, a school, or even in the neighbourhood of either. Without a well-trained organization many lives, which otherwise could have been saved, would be lost.

In November 1958 Mayor John Pratt asked me to take on the massive task of organizing a Civil Defence Corps. I agreed with, I admit, a great deal of trepidation. It was frustrating and discouraging work at first.

The success of our organization can only be attributed to the wonderful efforts of such men as Major Lloyd George, Lt. Col. Harold Hurdle, Capt. Pierre Gariepy, Gordon Webster, and to the citizens who have volunteered in such numbers to aid this worthy cause. We have a cross section of the finest people in Dorval in our ranks, which is something to be proud of.

I would like also to pay tribute to the Boy Scouts whose enthusiasm is so contagious. They have been of great help in acting as messengers and in manning radio sets, as they did during the sleet storm of last winter.

The ladies, God bless 'em, have set an example which should make most mere males blush. Practically all our First Aid members are ladies, Mrs. Godbeer and Mrs. Black even insisted on taking the Rescue Course, which they did and came through with flying colours.

On Sunday, June 4th, the first large-scale combined exercise was held between the City of Dorval Disaster Control Organization and the 34th and 37th Field Regiments, R.C.A. It was called Combo 1. Purpose of the exercise was to practice rescue, first aid and welfare operations, and to measure the amount of co-operation which could be expected from the Militia. On all these points the exercise was a success.

What of the future? It is our hope that each section of the City will have at least two rescue teams on which to call in the event of disaster. The City has been divided into six sub-divisions; each sub-division has a Rescue Headquarters and two rescue teams. It is up to you, the citizens of Dorval, to make sure that when called upon you will volunteer your services.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank all those who have worked so hard and diligently towards the success of our organization. We are about half-way to our goal. We need at least another hundred volunteers to fill our ranks. I think this is a small price to pay for the safety of our community.

Think it over seriously.

## Hospital Fund Reaches 48.8%

Public subscriptions to the Lakeshore General Hospital Fund have reached \$1,225, it was announced this week.

J.M. Wells, chairman of the Fund, said that this represents some 48.8% of the \$2.5 million public subscription objective, with over two weeks still to go before the campaign period ends officially on June 24th.

Mr. Wells said that a large amount of the total to date comes from the corporate gifts division canvass, which has been underway in industrial and business circles for some time and is now almost 75% complete.

He stressed that it takes time to do a good job of canvassing, and that for that reason only a small proportion of the returns expected from the personal gifts division have thus far been received. However, the average level of giving among those who have subscribed to date is over \$104 per family, and Mr. Wells said that this promises well for the success of the campaign.

"The way in which individuals and business have responded so far has been very heartening," he declared. "As each day's returns come in, it becomes more and more obvious that people recognize the need for the hospital and realize, too, that the only means of obtaining it is through their own efforts and those of their neighbours."

### BREAK THROUGH IN ANTI-POLLUTION:

As widely publicized in the press last week, our Provincial Government has enacted anti-pollution legislation that,

coupled with the Federal measures, amounts to a coup-de-grace for the many sources of pollution that have turned our lakes and rivers into flowing cesspools.

The Province will now grant municipalities 1/6 of the cost of sewage treatment plants which when added to the Federal offer amounts to a reduction of 1/3 for plant costs. Both Provincial and Federal offers have a March 1963 deadline so that if local municipalities are to take advantage of these savings they had best shake a leg.

Now is the time for our local municipalities to show cooperation and lacking that let's hope that the new Provincial Water Purification Board will lay down the law.

Taking all into consideration, things look very promising. Who knows? Maybe by the summer of 1963 Lake St. Louis will be a fit place for recreation.

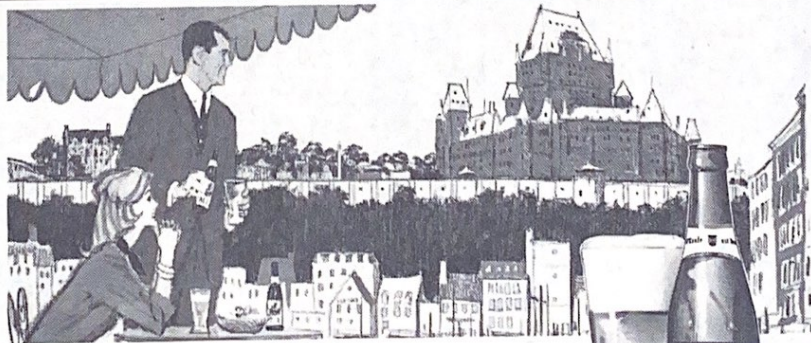
