

#### Grace & Peace : From the Pastor's Desk

One of the most powerful verses in the Bible is found in the book of Job when God asks, "Where were you when I laid the earth's foundation? Tell me if you understand." (Job 38:4)

I cannot imagine being Job. God allowed the devil to walk the earth and find Job, a faithful servant, and "torture" him hoping to turn him against God. God had all confidence that Job would stay faithful. Job lost his children, his house, his livestock and all his crops. He finally lost his health as well. Job's friends and wife had determined Job to be guilty of some sin against God, told him to repent and have his earthly wealth restored.

Job, knowing he had done nothing wrong, refused to confess to sins he had not committed, and stood his ground. Job cried out extolling all his virtues and asking why he was suffering for sins he had not committed; where was God so that he could speak with God face to face and challenge him for the misery God was putting him through when he deserved no such thing? After all those who

were there to support him had abandoned him, a younger man spoke of the glory and majesty of God.

God then responded letting Job know that God is all powerful; God created earth and all living beings on the earth and in the seas. Job became humbled at God's power, realizing that he spoke of things he did not understand. He repented for his arrogance. After rebuking Job's friends God restored everything to Job in twofold.

Some people have been turned away from God because of the story of Job. Why would God allow such suffering to happen to a person who was righteous and upright in God's sight? Why wouldn't God defend Job before allowing Satan to torture him? And why is God in conversation with Satan to begin with? We struggle with this every day. Why does God allow suffering in this world?

There have been many reasons given... One of them is we wouldn't know how blessed we are if we don't have something to compare it with. One that my seminary professor wrote a book about is that God doesn't have the power to control evil in this world. This is another way of stating what Rabbi Kushner said in his book "When Bad Things Happen to Good People", that's just it... bad things happen. Our human actions don't earn us earthly pleasure, nor do they bring about calamity (although bad choices can, and most often will do so). God doesn't stop bad things from happening.

The good news is that God is there, walking with you through the turmoil. God doesn't desert you. God will not abandon you. Then, in many cases, God will use the bad to bring about good. No matter what the circumstances, God is still in control and in the long run God's will will be done.

# Quilt Blessing

On October 1st, Immanuel Lutheran held a Quilt Blessing. The Quilting Group has worked all year, making 128 beautiful, unique quilts. So far this year, 55 quilts have been donated to various organizations and groups, including: 46 to those suffering from the war in Ukraine, four to the Liberty House for homeless Veteran men, one to the Bethany Outreach Center for their annual golf fundraiser, and one to a local homeless man.

After the blessing, the remaining quilts were sent to Lutheran World Relief. LWR ships the quilts all over the world, including places like South America and Africa. Immanuel's quilters are giving a special blessed momentum to families all over the world.

# Lutheran Disaster Response: Maui Collection

As many are aware, beginning on August 8th, Maui, one of Hawaii's most beautiful and densely populated islands, was ravaged by wildfires. There was very little warning time, leading to panic and intense confusion among residents of this usual paradise. Locals began fleeing to escape the flames, attempting to save children, pets and neighbors along the way.



Hundreds lost their lives. Thousands upon thousands are completely devastated, left with nothing more than their current clothing. The town of Lahaina alone, where fires began, reported early estimates of over 2,700 homes destroyed.

Lutheran Disaster Response, an organization grounded in Lutheran theology, sharing God's hope, healing and renewal with people whose lives have been disrupted by disasters in the United States and around the world, has organized a collection fund for Maui.



Due to the island location and everchanging hurricane weather, getting resources to and from Maui is nearly impossible at times.

The U.S. Coast Guard, Hawaii's National Guard and active-duty forces on the island have all been a great resource in aiding the locals. Right now, the best way you can help is by making a financial donation. It provides immediate funds to supply the most crucial resources.

The Social Ministry Committee at Immanuel encourages anyone that would like to assist those suffering from wildfires in Hawaii, or other places in the US, to donate as you are able to Lutheran Disaster Response.

#### Herbs in the Fall

As Autumn approaches, we often think that our herb gardens are finished for the season. They still have lots of life in them! Consider these ideas:

- Identify those herbs that can "winter over". Cut them back to 4-6", place mulch (dried leaves, etc.) over them, and let them sleep over the winter. Herbs that are perfect for this include sage, oregano, mint, chives, thyme, fennel, lavender, and tarragon. Be sure to remove the mulch as new growth appears in the spring.
- Some herbs, like parsley, rosemary and basil, are perfect for moving indoors. Check for insects. Re-potting in fresh soil is always a good idea.
- Annual herbs such as dill and coriander survive for a single season. Pull the dead herbs and clear the plant debris, so that pests don't find a hiding place.
- Left on the stem, hardier herbs like rosemary, dill, thyme or sage can be spread in a single layer on a plate and placed in freezer. Transfer to bags for storage.
- Freezing parsley and basil is easy to do. Place in ice cube trays, add water or olive oil, freeze and then place in plastic bags.
- Drying herbs is also a good idea (check the website below for instructions).
