PASTOR LEANNE'S MESSAGE:

"Give a man a fish and you feed him for a day.

Teach him how to fish and you feed him for a lifetime."

Chinese philosopher Lao Tzu, founder of Taoism

Presbyterians no longer have Missionaries. We have "Mission Co-workers." This is more than just a simple change in nomenclature; it is a change in our church's relational philosophy. Once, along with the rest of the church world, in all good intentions, we sent out Missionaries to share the gospel, but along with our message of hope, we often imposed our cultural priorities with a paternalistic flare. With time, our understanding of the universality of the gospel challenged us to take on the relational approach which was modelled by Christ- rather than standing over others, we seek to stand beside them. Rather than telling them what they need, we seek to equip them for the challenges of faith in their own times, places and terms. It is one of the things I love about being Presbyterian. There is a commitment to equip people for their own development and independent worship needs. The saying above (okay, it's not from a Christian but it is still good common sense) spells out the value of this kind of ministry.

That's why I love the Presbyterian Giving Catalog. (If you haven't seen it, there are several in the church narthex for you to take.) As the holiday seasons come around, and we all begin thinking of ways to celebrate the birth of Christ through giving, I challenge you to check out the gifts that can be given to help others self-sustain. Some of them are expensive, granted – if one has an extra \$15,000 laying around, then one could buy a Deep Rock Well for places in this world where water is scarce. But others are far less expensive: for \$50, one can buy a sewing machine with which a woman in the developing world can make a living. For \$15, one can supply a fisherman with a net. For \$240 one can help heat a family home in Syria during the winter. I get so excited thinking about the major difference one person can make in the lives of others with a small gift.

This year, the youth and kids of our church are participating in such a project. They are making Christmas ornaments which they will sell, and the funds they raise will be used to buy families of chickens (for \$25) and/or piglets (for \$40 each) through the Presbyterian Giving Catalog. The works of their hands will be displayed in the church narthex near Thanksgiving time. I am excited to teach our children the importance of caring for their global neighbors. It is hard for them to imagine people and their circumstances in far away places, but it is not hard for them to picture an actual pig or chicken and understand that they are giving something special in this way. I invite you to join them as they learn to make a difference in our world. Stop by the table on Sunday, November 20th and check out their ornaments.



Here is a simple prayer of gratitude:



endorsement. She enjoyed her years at UND and met many wonderful people. She was especially thankful to have met Sara Hanhan, her advisor; Mae Marie Blackmore, the director at the University Children's Center, Laurel Haulting, her ECE supervisor and Kate Bialke, her mentor during her Early Childhood practicum at the UCC. These four women helped lay the foundation for Shawn by showing her what a quality early childhood program should be. Shawn has been the Director of the Child Care Center

at First Presbyterian Church since June 1995.

If you know Shawn, then you know she is a cat person! Her words, 'I like cats way better than anything. Just ask me about my soul-cat George!"

Shawn had three goals in life. PB&J Donations

Thank you to all who donated peanut butter and/or jelly for the school backpack program. Once again, peanut butter was the most popular donated item. The results were: peanut butter - 71 containers, jelly - 64 containers, and 3 jars of peanut butter/jelly combined. The jars will be distributed in backpacks to school children whose families face food insecurity over the weekends.

Community Action packs and distributes 1,862 bags of food each week to elementary, middle, and high schools. Each bag contains two hot meals and two

breakfast items along with some healthy snacks.

Community Action's backpack program serves Bismarck, Mandan, Lincoln, and several smaller communities in the area. It takes a team of 30 volunteers to pack the bags, and a team of 16 to deliver them.




NOVEMBER DONATION OPPORTUNITY:


The Peace and Global Witness Offering will be Sunday, November 13, 2022.

The Resource Management Committee has chosen to give our 25% of the total offering to Energy Share. It is a cooperative effort of Community Action Agencies in ND, utility companies, and private donors to help low-income eligible households prevent electrical shutoffs when the situation has been deemed an emergency.

Through Presbyterian USA, we are given the opportunity to support many ministries nationwide. 50% of our offering will be used to help and heal through its established programs. 25% will go to our regional Presbytery or Synod that deals with needs in our area including conflicts within the local churches.

Once each year, with a special Sunday worship service, many Presbyterian churches observe St. Andrew's Day as a means of celebrating their Scottish roots. Following a form of worship ceremony that dates back to 1564, various traditions are observed, most notably the "Kirkin' of the Tartan" - Kirk being the Scottish word for church. Kirkin' is a "symbol of freedom" that dates back to the defeat of Scottish highlanders by the British in 1746.

English penal laws banned all things Scottish, including wearing clan plaids, speaking or singing in their native Gaelic tongue, Scots dancing and the playing of bagpipes. British troops policed Scottish services to insure compliance. Although unlawful kirkin' was punishable by death, Scots would still sneak a bit of their tartan under their clothing on St. Andrew's Day and when the minister said a certain phrase, they would clutch their cloth and silently say a blessing in Gaelic.

Although there is no set liturgy, the service follows ancient tradition. Tartan banners may proceed the minister into the sanctuary, Highland regalia worn, and scriptures may be read in Scots or Gaelic. Prayers offered to bless the tartans, acknowledge contributions of Scots to the Presbyterian church and to celebrate freedoms we often take for granted are shared. The entrance of the pastor is preceded by a "Beadle" (lay person) bearing the bible. Then, the pastor, accompanied by bagpiper escort, enters the sanctuary to signal the beginning of the service. Music will be Celtic in flavor. Our service includes traditional Highland bagpipes, flute and guitars, Celtic hymns and anthems (including some sung in Gaelic).

Later in the service the tradition continues with the presentation of a Scottish person bringing their distinctive plaid (representative of their clan, region or family ethnicity) forward at the Kirkin' ceremony for blessing by the pastor.

We encourage all people, whether Scots or other, to reflect with thanksgiving on their own family ethnicity by bringing an article representative of their heritage forward for blessing. It is a response of faith and acknowledgement of the sovereignty of God and a way to ask for God's blessing.

In keeping with the spirit of the occasion, all are encouraged to wear plaid or clothing representative of their heritage **Sunday**, **November 20**. Help us celebrate God's grace poured out to all generations.

SESSION HIGHLIGHTS OCTOBER 25, 2022

CLERK'S REPORT

The death of Jonathan Thomson October 17 was reported. Membership is 321. Session approved the baptism request of Marete and Colby Farver for their son, Finn Howard Farver. The baptism will be on December 25.

The Clerk fulfilled the Presbytery requirement of having the Session Records and Rolls reviewed on September 28; both were approved with no exceptions.

MODERATOR'S REPORT

Pastor Leanne stated that Elder and Deacon Training will be November 5, beginning with breakfast at 9:00am.

Called Session meeting will be at lunchtime with attendance of all current Elders requested to examine new candidates and vote. "Future Thinking Playbook" will be the basis of the afternoon discussion.

Gratitude was expressed for Interns Mark Jensen and Sophie Svihovec for helping with children/youth.

Grael Gannon has donated many theology books which will be placed on bookshelves being assembled.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Hospitality—Thanks to all those who helped serve the Banquet on October 20. Ministry on the Margins will organize Thanksgiving dinner at the Dream Center; 10 volunteers are needed.

Proclamation-Worship and Music- November 6 is recognition of All Saints Day; November 20 is St. Andrew's celebration and new officer installation. Decorating the church for Christmas will begin at 9:30am on November 26. Children's Christmas program and Red/Green Potluck will be December 11.

Proclamation-Christian Education—Presentation of Bibles was changed to October 30. The church hosted a Presbyterian Youth event over the October school break. Children will make ornaments to sell to raise funds to buy an animal for a family in a developing nation. (Presbyterian Giving Catalog)

Property and Equipment—The committee will likely approve adding outside lights on the east side of the church.

Resource Management—US Bank representatives met with the committee to discuss options for use of part of the \$450,000 in operating funds that could be invested.

Joe Bachmeier will conduct the practices/procedures audit.

To date about \$262,000 and 103 pledges have been received in the Stewardship drive. Session approved the preliminary budget based on 3% staff increase. Total income \$524,787 and total expense \$590,995, for a deficit of \$76,208.

Board of Deacons—Please volunteer to usher and invite like-minded members to help as a group (like golfers, teachers, hunters). Disposable communion cups will be continued throughout the flu season.

Child Care Center Board—Breakfast with Santa will be December 3. The center received a stabilization grant of \$5,350.

The center will be eligible for one more grant.

Anniversary Committee—Many events are being planned for June 17-18. High tea will be held after Easter.
