

Eucharistic Revival in the Catholic Church:

Weekly Bulletin Articles

The Catholic Church in the United States has been on a 3-year process of Eucharistic Revival, and we are now in the 2nd year and focusing on revival at the parish level (see this website for more, https://www.eucharisticrevival.org). In addition to trying our best to celebrate every single Mass reverently, attentively, and prayerfully, one effort we will be making is **to** *write a small bulletin article every week for a year* in order to help all people understand the Catholic Mass more fully. Not only can this help us understand how each prayer and symbol and movement has deep meaning and symbolism, but all the prayers, symbols, and movements should also lead us into the reality of Christ's love on the Cross and His grace poured out from the Resurrection and how we can encounter Him present to us today throughout the entirety of the Mass! Please consider reading along each week with these bulletin articles to help you better understand the history, meaning, beauty, and reality of what we celebrate every weekend as Catholics. This can help us to have a Eucharistic Revival at our parish, and to know, love, and serve Christ more fully every time we attend the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass here at OLV.



Behold the Lamb of God - (Am I worthy? ... Yes, the Wedding Supper of the Lamb)

One of the most emotional parts of the Mass for me as a priest is the last dialogue prayer between the priest and the people before Holy Communion begins. After singing the Lamb of God (*Agnus Dei* in Latin), everyone kneels, and then the priest holds up the newly consecrated host along with the chalice and the new precious blood, and he declares,

"Behold the Lamb of God. Behold Him who takes away the sins of the world.

Blessed are those called to the supper of the lamb."

And the people respond with their hearts full of faith,

"Lord, I am not worthy that you should enter under my roof,

but only say the word and my soul shall be healed."

This is emotional for me as a priest for a number of reasons. First of all, there are many prayers that the Church says the priest should refrain from saying with the people in order to emphasize the dialogue between the priest and the people. This is especially important to help the people realize the special presence of Jesus in the priest during the Mass, which allows the Catholic Priest to stand in His place and Jesus can truly work through the priest's words, actions, and movements to speak to each person and to consecrate the bread and wine into Jesus' very body, blood, soul, and divinity in the Eucharist. However, on this occasion, the rubrics of the Mass mandate that the priest says the response along with the people. The priest is truly not worthy to be standing where He is standing and doing what He is doing during each and every Mass. It is only through God's grace that every priest can become a worthy instrument of Christ to the world in this way.

Secondly, I also get emotional because of the beauty of the prayer itself. The priest is quoting John the Baptist who pointed out Jesus as the lamb of God to some of his first disciples (see John 1:29), which is a reference in and of itself to fulfilling all the Old Testament prophecies about the Lamb of God, the Passover meal, the Old Testament covenants, and the Jewish messiah figure who dies for his people. In addition, the priest's prayer here is also referencing Revelation 19:9 and the wedding supper of the lamb in heaven. Bread certainly symbolizes all food and sustenance in general, but this bread of the New Covenant, this is truly Jesus Christ, and this wedding feast or wedding supper is what is TRULY satisfy our hearts and souls for all eternity.

Finally, the response that the priest says to the people is also such a beautiful refence in Scripture. This is a reference to a number of scripture passages, but it especially brings to mind the Roman Centurion who asks Jesus to heal his servant (Matthew 8:8 etc.). Jesus is about to follow the soldier to the proper location, but this influential man (a centurion was in charge of 100 soldiers) instead declares that he is not worthy to have Jesus follow him. Instead, out of great faith, he says that Jesus has the power to heal his servant from a long distance because he is in charge of all spirits and has power over all things in a real way. The humility and faith in this passage brings a strong reaction and teaching from Jesus to his other followers. We are not worthy of the depth of God's infinite love, but through Jesus, we can have the confidence to ask for Him to come to us, to heal our souls, and to lift us up to new levels of faith and relationship with God. May we ask God today for that humility and faith, and may we be thankful once again for the gift of Jesus in the Eucharist, who comes to us fully at every Mass in the Eucharist. We see visibly the Lamb of God and truly the Wedding Supper of the Lamb!

Register Now for Vacation Bible School!!!


There is NO COST, but spaces are limited— so don't wait! VBS is for students in pre-k (4 & 5 years old) through 5th grade.

Book of the Month – May and June 2024

The Father: 30 Meditations to Draw You Into the Heart of God

Saying the Our Father prayer that Jesus taught us from 2,000 years ago when He walked this earth is a fairly normal thing for most Christians. Many of us as Catholic Christians, say the Our Father prayer many times every single day. However, how often do we take some time to reflect on God relating to us in personal way as a true and real father. Fr. Mark Mary Ames is a young Capuchin Franciscan priest in New York City, and he does a remarkable job in his new book, The Father, to

bring our belief and Scripture itself into a new light in this way. Fr. Mark Mary uses real stories and examples to easily bring the reader into a new understanding of Scripture and help us to pray through our relationship with God as a Father. These reflections and stories are split up into 30 different chapters or days, and they are only a few pages long, which make this book easily readable and digestible for the average person. When we think of Jamaica, we think of Ocho Rios, beautiful beaches,

vacations and wonderful scenery. But, just beyond all of that, Jamaica is among the poorest countries in our hemisphere and the Dioceses of Mandeville is the poorest of the three dioceses in Jamaica. Many of the people have no running water. Many youth are "functionally illiterate;" there is an alarming number of destitute elderly and abandoned children; and, the average Sunday collection is 10% of the operating cost at half our parishes The Diocese of Mandeville is very poor!

The Word of **God Alive: Discussing the Readings with** your children



Cedar trees can grow so large, more than 100 feet tall! Cedars are

used to build things and the wood stays strong for a long time. For the people of Israel, the cedar tree reminded them of God as well as their king.

Ezekiel was a prophet of Israel. It was a great time of sadness for the people because armies from another country came to Israel to overpower them. During this time, God gave words to Ezekiel about a cedar. We heard these words today. God said, " I will pluck from the crest of the cedar the highest branch and transplant (it) on a high and lofty mountain. "

What was God talking about?

God was speaking about a shoot just beginning to grow with new life. This shoot came from the very top of the tree, the place that is closest to the light of the sun. God said this shoot would be moved to a new place on the top of a mountain in Israel. A mountain top is even higher that the top of the tree. For the people of Israel, who thought of God as above us all and in the highest heavens, mountains were places to get closer to God.

What would happen to this shoot once it was replanted?

The prophet continued, "It shall put forth branches and bear fruit, and become a majestic cedar. Even small birds will nest under it.

In the midst of the sadness of the people, God was talking about someone else. A new king would come to the people of Israel. This king would have light, would be close to God, would bring great life and growth. We know this king is Jesus. the one who helps us become closer to God.

Who are the birds who enjoy the shade of the cedar shoot?



God promised a moment in which all people (the birds) will enjoy being in the presence of this cedar sprout, when everyone will fully know Jesus as King.
