# **STEP EIGHT**

Made a list of all persons we had harmed, and became willing to make amends to them all.

STEP SUMMARY (from Take the Twelve)

An apology is quite different from an amends.

One dictionary defines an apology as: "an admission of discourtesv error or accompanied by expression an of *regret*, " and it defines and amends as: "reparation or compensation for a loss, damage, or injury of any kind." I offer you an apology when I accidentally step on your toe. I offer you an amends when I have caused you hurt or harm in some way.

Many of us were taught by our sponsors that if we wanted to learn how to be in healthy relationships with the world around us, we could take a deeper look at the Traditions. Woven throughout each of the Traditions are wonderful suggestions on how we can better show up to those relationships. Interestingly enough, Steps 8 & 9 do that as well. On page 77 of the 12 & 12 it states, "STEPS Eight and Nine are concerned with personal relations. First, we take a look backward and try to discover where we have been at fault; next we make a vigorous attempt to repair the damage we have done; and third, having thus cleaned away the debris of the past, we consider how, with our newfound knowledge of ourselves, we may develop the best possible relations with every human being we know."

Important Reminder: As we continue this journey of being of maximum usefulness, when preparing to make our amends it is helpful to remember to not minimize our faults and failures by focusing on the faults of others, and to realize that we hurt others as well as ourselves with our drinking. In looking beyond our obvious defects and in doing a thorough examination of our flaws, we must avoid judgments of others. It's OUR inventory that uncovered harm done – not theirs.

Many members of A.A. think that creating a list of those we have harmed is ONLY about cleaning up the wreckage of our past with those people, places or things. While that is certainly a huge part of it, another reason Step 8 is important is because it's about continuing the process we have already started back in Step 3 of being a maximum usefulness to God and his kids. Is it possible that Steps 8 & 9 are not about getting back in the good graces of those we've harmed, but about being willing to do the footwork and, once again, leave the results up to God? Yes, it's entirely possible. Love of ourselves, love of others and love of God is the foundation to this Step.

Important Side Note: Remember, this Step is ONLY about making the list. No action other than writing the list happens in this Step (EXCEPT OF COURSE having the willingness to act upon the list as you move

*into Step 9*), so there is no need to fear (as so many of us do when we start thinking about having to make amends). It's JUST a list my friend!

#### **MYTHS ABOUT THIS STEP**

Your drinking hasn't harmed anyone but yourself. People often think that if the damage isn't extreme and noticeable, then there isn't anything beneath the surface. This is a dangerous misconception and something AA calls "purposeful forgetting." We can't get the most out of the 12 Steps if we aren't willing to be vulnerable and rigorously honest—even if what we discover about ourselves and others is painful to accept.

# **EIGHTH TRADITION**

Alcoholics Anonymous should remain forever nonprofessional, but our service centers may employ special workers.

### Giving It Away

Tradition 8 allows contributions to be used for support services while the groups provide only non-professional, mutual support, ensuring AA or Al-Anon remains an unpaid, nonprofessional organization. Anytime a newcomer reaches out for help, they will receive it, free of charge. In turn, members freely share their as own experiences, strength, and hope with the newcomer, they help themselves and reinforce their own recovery.

#### **Non-Professional Mutual Support**

That's not to say that members can't be doctors and professionals, but they leave those outside affiliations at the door. It's how the 12-step programs work. There is a saying in the rooms, "In order to keep it, you must give it away."

Going to a professional counselor is different from going to a group of others who are in recovery. Twelve-step groups are different from professional recovery services, offering the support that the members feel in sharing and listening to each others' stories. There is no authority the member can rebel against.

#### **Hiring Special Workers**

Twelve-step organizations at the national, state, and regional levels may have service centers which serve the fellowships as a whole by printing and distributing literature and meeting schedules, maintaining answering services, and other tasks.

Many times, these central offices and service centers involve more work than volunteer service workers can provide, so some hire full- and part-time employees to do the necessary labor to keep them running smoothly. Tradition 8, therefore, allows for the "special workers" to be hired and paid a salary to do the work that volunteers cannot cover.

Special workers may be employed to keep the AA message alive around the world through printing, communications, and other technology. This is not paying for 12-step work but paying for the services needed to

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support it with literature and outreach. Members understand the difference between paying for support services but not paying for professional counselors.
