THE TRUE KINGSHIP OF JESUS CHRIST

What kind of King is Jesus? How do you envision him? Remembering that they were promised a king from the line of David, the Israelites hoped for a Messiah, who would set their political problems aright and bring about a worldly kingdom of Judaic power. Even Psalm 122 seems to describe this type of ruler. Luke's Gospel today shreds that image after the whip of the Roman soldiers tore at Jesus' flesh. Still, the Romans flaunted the traditional notion with their ironic inscription above King Jesus' crown of thorns. Soldiers and ordinary people jeered the royal title at him. Yet the throne of Jesus was the cross of Christ, from which he dispensed kingly mercy and justice toward the humble criminal who shared his execution. Writing to the Colossians, Saint Paul describes the truth about Jesus and his kingship, using words like fullness, peace, and forgiveness. So, let us go rejoicing!

FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

Dear parishioners,

Thanks to a very generous donor in the parish, who wishes to remain anonymous, OLGC has recently received a wonderful gift in the form of a new organ for the church. The small keyboard that was previously used during Mass to accompany the hymns and as a solo instrument, while certainly better than nothing, was lacking in a number of areas such as volume and the variation of *stops* (the voices or sounds that an organ can produce). The new organ, now in the choir loft, is a tremendous improvement and of great benefit to the liturgical life of the parish. I want to express my gratitude for this significant donation and take the opportunity to thank David Brown for generously offering his time and talent to play this new instrument reverently and beautifully. I would like to offer a few thoughts below on the important role of the organ in our Catholic liturgical tradition.

The organ plays a unique role in the liturgical life of the Church. The organ is referred to as the "voice" of a church building, and has a long history of the church. In modern times, the Second Vatican Council ("Vatican II") provided an important directive on the organ by stating that "in the Latin Church the pipe organ is to be held in high esteem, for it is the traditional musical instrument which adds a wonderful splendor to the Church's ceremonies and powerfully lifts up man's mind to God and to higher things" (Constitution on the Sacred Liturgy, No. 120). The word "esteem" in this passage is significant because, while other musical instruments are permissible, it is the organ that is preferable, as it directs our minds to God and the things of heaven.

Pope St. John XXIII referred to the organ as "the king of sacred musical instruments" because "its melodies make it easier for the mystical movements of the sacred event to penetrate into the depths of the soul; admiration of virtue or desire for it; resolutions of penance and purification; a longing for a more intimate union with God; a pledge to struggle against evil; a foretaste of the happiness of heaven." (Vatican Basilica, September 27, 1962).

Pope Emeritus Benedict XVI reflected more deeply on this point in a 2006 papal address: "The organ has always been considered, and rightly so, the king of musical instruments, because it takes up all the sounds of creation...and gives resonance to the fullness of human sentiments, from joy to sadness, from praise to lamentation. By transcending the merely human sphere, as all music of quality does, it evokes the divine. The organ's great range... makes it an instrument superior to all others. It is capable of echoing and expressing all the experiences of human life. The manifold possibilities of the organ in some way remind us of the immensity and the magnificence of God." (Regensburg, 13 September 2006).

The above quotes eloquently express the significant connection of the organ to the sacred liturgy. A number of you have already noted to me after the Sunday Masses the difference that the new organ makes in the Church. It is my hope that this bulletin entry will help draw even further appreciation for this thoughtful and generous donation, and that it helps us to better understand the important role of sacred music in our worship.
