Suffering and Sacrifice



Peter! Peter! The impetuous guy is at it again. This time he wants to save Jesus from suffering. Imagine that! He wants to save Jesus from Himself. The disciple (one still in training for that matter) is trying to direct and

counsel his Master. It's all in today's gospel from Mark 8:27-35. I mean, there's nothing wrong in correcting or advising one's boss or teacher but the topic matters a lot and you really have to know what you're talking about. If Peter was advising Jesus on how to fish on the Sea of Galilee. that would be a little bit understandable. Even at that, recall that Jesus once told a tired and worn out Peter and his companions to cast into the deep, after fishing all night with not even a single fish to show for it (Luke 5:5-10).

However, there's enough reason and evidence for us to be careful as we disapprove of Peter's action. Many of you who are parents have been there! Many of us who are not even parents have been there! I'm talking about those situations when we long or yearn to protect a loved one from suffering. Often it's a son or daughter, a spouse, a brother or sister, a father or mother, a niece or nephew or cousin, a friend or even a stranger. And like Peter, we do so with the best of intentions.



Firmly, without mincing words, but also lovingly would come offer **me**, Jesus let Peter know that His work/mission had take up his cross been cut out for Him and that carrying His cross follow me." was a key component. He was basically saying to Peter: It is what it is.

A lesson for us today could be, among others, to remind ourselves that there is a time for everything. There will be a time to save or rescue others, especially our loved ones. And if we fail to do so, it becomes a sin – at least a sin against charity. And there will be a time to let others. including our very loved ones, suffer or as Jesus says, carry THEIR cross. We may, or rather should, be there to support them as they carry their cross. But carrying it for them or preventing them from carrying it might also be a sin or at least a disservice to them, no matter how well intentioned we might be.

So, as we get down to business after the summer break and Labor Day holiday, things will get tough, probably sooner than we'd like. Our loved ones will be, if not already, facing one situation or another. Be sure to be there for them.

If it is a situation that they should really be embracing, be slow in hindering them from doing so or even in aiding them. For instance, our kids should be growing in their relationship with God and this takes time, energy and sacrifice. It involves coming to Mass and attending religious education classes every week and doing their homework. To many of them this is a big cross they'd love to give up entirely or at least avoid.

If it is a situation they should really be avoiding, be slow in indulging their tendency to embrace it, just because avoiding it will be a big sacrifice or worsen things temporarily. Some examples are: keeping bad company, holding onto a bad habit, or holding onto an old grudge.

As difficult as these and other sacrifices may be, it is moments or situations like these that build character. Better still, by doing so, they too, like Jesus, will be fulfilling their own mission.


MESSAGE FROM THE MUSIC DIRECTOR

OUR LADY OF SORROWS SEPTEMBER 15TH - MEMORIAL



For a while there were two feasts in honor of the Sorrowful Mother: one going back to the fifteenth century, the other to the seventeenth century. For a while both were celebrated by the universal church: one on the Friday before Palm Sunday, the other in September.

The principal biblical references to Mary's sorrows are in Luke 2:35 and John 19:26-27. The Lucan passage is Simeon's prediction about a sword piercing Mary's soul; the Johannine passage relates Jesus'

words to Mary and to the beloved disciple.


Many early church writers interpret the sword as Mary's sorrows, especially as she saw Jesus die on the cross. Thus, the two passages are brought together as prediction and fulfillment.

Saint Ambrose in particular sees Mary as a sorrowful yet powerful figure at the cross. Mary stood fearlessly beneath the cross while others fled. Mary looked on her Son's wounds with pity, but saw in them the salvation of the world. As Jesus hung on the cross, Mary did not fear to be killed but offered herself to her persecutors.

COMMENT: John's account of Jesus' death is highly symbolic. When Jesus gives the beloved disciple to Mary, we are invited to appreciate Mary's role in the church: She symbolizes the church; the beloved disciple represents all believers. As Mary mothered Jesus, she is now mother to all His followers. Furthermore, as Jesus died, He handed over His Spirit. Mary and the Spirit cooperate in begetting new children of God. - almost an echo of Luke's account of Jesus' conception. Christians can trust that they will continue to experience the caring presence of Mary and Jesus' Spirit throughout their lives and throughout history.
