## Rebuilding and Renewing

Throughout the month of July and beginning of August, Paul's letter to the Romans has been the focus text for our worship together. Paul's words of encouragement and hope – the Good News for this faith community experiencing difficulty – feel so very relevant today during this time of uncertainty. Each Sunday we have attempted to piece back together a broken pot. The reconstruction of this pottery reminds us that God continues to restore us in the midst of our brokenness. Brokenness comes in many shapes and forms – this pandemic has made us

more aware of systems that were broken long before we ever heard the name "Covid-19." Mental health issues, inequality, poverty, lack of access to adequate and affordable healthcare, overburdened and underfunded school systems, systematic and institutionalized racism, and unemployment and underemployment are just a few of the concerns that weigh upon all of us during this unprecedented time in our history. With over 150,000 deaths since March in the United States alone, how do we find hope? How do we find resurrection? We remember the words Jesus said when asked to tell the greatest commandment: 'You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind.' This is the greatest and first commandment. And a second is like it: 'You shall love your neighbor as yourself.' (Matthew 22:37-39) As we love God we find that love revealed through the way we work for justice and equality and in our care for others.

Rev. Cameron Trimble recently offered this meditation in the Convergence Newsletter, Piloting Faith:

The center is not holding. All that we trusted - institutions, leaders, corporations, multinational agreements, democracy, capitalism - it's all falling apart. When the center does not hold, we instinctively turn to the Center that always holds. We seek God, the One that was, is, and will always be. But we come with new questions because we know that the institutions of faith that got us to this point cannot take us forward. So we seek the Sacred anew. Some of us were made for this moment. You have been waiting for the center to fall apart so that the margins could finally be seen. You sense the way forward. You speak of new worlds. You lead with vision; you never lead with fear. Listen for the new visions emerging around you. The center is not holding, and the Center always holds. We can trust in the "falling apart" because we can trust the Source that rebuilds.

I appreciate Rev. Trimble's reminder of moving past the fear and noise that distracts us and to trust God, our Creator and source of all hope. As I prepared this series on Romans, I used Kintsugi as my inspiration. Kintsugi is the Japanese art of repairing broken pottery by mending the areas of breakage with lacquer dusted or mixed with powdered gold, silver, or platinum. What is created from broken pieces is a work of art – the brokenness actually transforms the pottery into something new and beautiful. The pottery is different than it looked before, and is reborn as new work of creative art. What is God creating anew within each of us, within this faith community? How is Hope Growing now and in the days, months, and years ahead?

The answers to these questions will continue to be revealed as we experience transformation and growth. I have faith that God is with us and God's Spirit is guiding us through it all. I am so thankful to be on this journey with you all. Hope Grows!





Volunteers will be spending the day cleaning up the streets of litter, pulling weeds on the sidewalks, engaging with residents from the community, and participating in a post-discussion on issues relevant to the Floreciente area and the Quad Cities community. ## **Hope UCC Mid-Year Financial Report**

Hope UCC's Church Council and Trustees Ministry have asked that Pam, as Bookkeeper, and I, as Treasurer, provide the congregation with a financial update halfway through the fiscal year with all income and expenses recorded. If, after reading this report, you have any questions feel free to contact me by phone (764-8507) or e-mail (<a href="mailto:roberttallitsch@augustana.edu">roberttallitsch@augustana.edu</a>) or Pam at the office (762-1419) and we will do our best to answer them for you.

**Income:** The budget, as amended at the annual meeting, called for a total income for 2020 of \$168,798.83. If we are on budget by the completion of June income should be \$84,399.42. As of June 30 all forms of income were \$60,795.52, or 36% of the amount budgeted, which is less than the projected amount to be raised by June 30.

**Expenses:** As outlined in the Annual Report, each Ministry of the Church has its own budget, so we have broken down expenses thus far in the fiscal year by category.

**Personnel:** Amount budgeted for personnel expenses was \$125,793.33. Amount expended thus far is \$41,716.56 or 33.2% of the budgeted amount. Therefore, as of June 30, personnel expenses are less than budgeted. There are at least three reasons for this:

- We have yet to find and hire a Youth Leader, so none of the \$5,408.00 budgeted for that position has been spent.
- Our organist resigned in November of 2019 and because an accompanist was not hired until June we have not spent as much on supply organist/accompanist salary payments as was budgeted.
- Hope UCC applied for, and was granted a Small Business Administration Paycheck Protection Program loan for nonprofit organizations. The amount paid to Hope UCC was \$10,685.00 As outlined in the PPP loan guidelines, these funds are being used to pay staff salaries and utilities. The loan funds will be completely spent by the end of July, at which time Hope UCC will file the required paperwork with the lending institution. If it is determined that Hope has followed the PPP guidelines correctly, the total amount of the loan will be forgiven.

**Trustees:** Amount budgeted for Trustees expenses was \$33,000. Amount expended thus far is \$10,968.49 or 33.2% of the budgeted amount. Therefore, as of June 30, Trustees expenses are less than budgeted. There are several reasons for this:

- Payment of utilities through the PPP loan funds
- Significantly reduced garbage service costs due to a renegotiated contract
- Reduced snowplowing expenses thus far in 2020
- Reduced expenses for Repairs and Maintenance and Other Property Expenses line items thus far in 2020

**Faith Exploration and Education Ministry:** Amount budgeted for Faith Exploration and Education was \$1,600. Amount expended thus far is \$603.07 or 37.7% of the budgeted amount. Therefore Faith Exploration and Education expenses are less than budgeted.

**Worship and Music Ministry:** Amount budgeted for Worship and Music was \$2,950. Amount expended for the first half of the fiscal year is \$1,177.59 or 39.9% of the budgeted amount. Therefore Worship and Music Ministry expenses are less than budgeted.

**Mission and Outreach Ministry:** Amount budgeted for Mission and Outreach was \$5,700. Amount expended for the first half of the fiscal year is \$1,575 or 27.6% of the budgeted amount. Therefore, as of June 30, Mission and Outreach expenses are less than budgeted.

**Summary of Income versus Expenses:** Although income thus far in 2020 is less than was budgeted, overall operating expenses are also less than budgeted, mainly due to the CoVid-19 pandemic and the PPP loan. Therefore, as of June 30 Hope UCC's income is \$4,754.81 more than expenses, and no funds have been transferred from savings into checking.
