




2024 Meeting Schedule

Note that we're moving some of our meetings this year to the fourth Thursday of the month.



- September 26 7:00 pm at Daniel Peel's and Lewis Wayman's pond.



Our July Meeting

On a very hot July evening, pond club members gathered in the Avellars' back yard for our July meeting. Our speaker was Frank E. Fink, owner of Living Artscapes, Inc. He is an award-winning professional pond contractor with over 25 years of experience in the fields of landscaping and water gardening. His company designs and installs custom waterscapes, landscapes, and hardscapes, that enhance the natural beauty of their client's surroundings. They also perform all types of maintenance services for ponds.

Frank is a very passionate speaker and clearly enjoys his profession. He began by talking about his background and then moved on to pond design. He gave some great tips about what to consider when you want a new pond or want a redesign of your existing pond. He explained how the line of sight should be one of the first things to consider. Also, how and where you want to observe your pond.

He spoke about how to control algae and the best way to clean out your pond in the spring. He is a proponent of saving as much as two thirds of your existing pond

water when you do a clean out, leaving the final third to be sucked out during the power wash. The reason is there is valuable bacteria in that water that you would loose if you totally replaced it with fresh water. The end result will be cleaner water and less algae growth. He is very positive about adding bacteria to your pond on a weekly basis as the best way to control algae.

He spoke about some of his larger projects and experiences in pond design and construction. He answered





many questions that members had for him - he is a wealth of information.

Our snacks were provided by the Craguns, who made delicious homemade cinnamon rolls – Thank you again for your effort! All in all, the meeting was delightful with a hint of cooling raindrops to take the edge off the heat.



Yellow Pitcher Plant

Plant Name: Sarracenia flava
Common Name: Yellow Pitcher Plant
Height: 3–4 feet (about 1 meter) tall
Spread: Clumping habit
Flowers: Green-yellow with veining and coloration
Sun: Full sun to light shade. Preferably 6+ hours of direct

sunlight.

Zones: USDA 5 to 9

Type of Plant: True bog plant. Carnivorous.

Native To: The United States of America, from southern Alabama, through Florida and Georgia, to the coastal plains of southern Virginia, North Carolina, and South Carolina.

Growing Conditions: Moist soil that never dries out is preferred or soil that is consistently wet without long-term flooding. They have few requirements: never let them dry out, no fertilizer, or chlorinated water. Given the right circumstances, they will grow for many years.

Short Description: There are many varieties of Sarracenia flava. Natural hybrids occur all the time since crossbreeding occurs quite often on its own. Variations include colors of green, yellow, copper, bronze, burgundy-veined, and red-throated, to describe a few. Some have been selected and named. Seed pods and flutes make exceptional cut flowers.
