Course description: Spanish 3360 expands on the language conversational skills mastered in SPAN 1-4 \& Intermediate Conversation. It will be a review \& expansion of grammatical \& pronunciation patterns, intensive vocabulary expansion through literary and non-literary readings, and extensive conversation practice. If your proficiency level is higher or lower than what is expected for this course you should see the professor/Dept. Chair immediately to find an appropriate level for you.

Placement policies: This course is available for students who completed SPAN 4 \& Intermediate Conversation or those with an equivalent (or higher) competency as shown in an interview, test, or any other assessment considered appropriate by the instructor. Heritage speakers of the language (those with home knowledge of the language) must talk to the instructor during the $1^{\text {st }}$ week of classes to determine their eligibility to continue in this course. There is A LOT of reading, writing and conversation in this course.

## STUDENT OUTCOMES:

At the end of the class, students will be able to (at an intermediate high/low advanced level of Spanish) appropriately: 1. talk on topics related to politics, civic matters \& justice systems in Latin America and the US; (inter)personal relations; love \& friendship; and ways of living and habits.
2. make oral presentations on the topics mentioned above and others related (eg. each student will make presentations)
3. Secondarily: comprehend reading material (fiction and non-fiction)
4. Secondarily: write letters, summaries, comparisons and essays on the topics above
5. Secondarily: compare and contrast cultural traits (especially Hispanic and American cultures).

## Textbooks:

1) Revista: Conversación sin barreras. $4^{\text {th }}$ ed. (by Jose A. Blanco; Publisher: Vista Higher Learning. 2014). It should NOT be the "Instructors edition". REQUIRED new; student edition. You NEED to have your own access to the movies

3) Spanish Grammar reference or textbook RECOMMENDED

Grading: -tests/final presentation: 60\%; $15 \%$ hwk assignments; $25 \%$ quizzes.
Each test consists of at least 2 parts: 1) a written part (multiple choice/essay) \& 2 ) an oral (interview, presentation, etc)

 NOTE: You must earn a grade or C or higher to advance to the next course in the language.Expectations: The following are the regular expectations for this class. Even if they are not included in the grading system, they might affect your grade significantly.
I will assume you will comply with these. Failing to comply with these may cause a low grade, a failing grade, or being dropped out of the course.
-Regular attendance (check regular NGU policies regarding this and my policies below)
-Read before the class, review after the class, and apply whatever is learned.
-Acceptable in-class conduct (respect for others, cooperation, reasonable participation, and the like)
-Constant homework (not for handing in but for your own practice. It MAY be picked for a grade)
-Cells off. (No e-device is allowed during in-class evaluation: quiz, test, essay, oral interview, etc.)
-Arrive (and leave) on time (tardies may count against your attendance; and I CONSIDER CONSTANT
TARDIES AS A SIGN OF DISRESPECT \& DISINTEREST)
-Talk directly to the instructor first (or email him) regarding any doubts/problems/comments you have about anything related to this class. If the issue is not resolved, you may contact the Dean.
-If you foresee that you may not comply with some expectation or regulation for this course, at a certain point (for ex. You need to leave the class earlier), please, discuss about this with the instructor IN ADVANCE.
-READ the syllabus frequently to keep track of what is going on in the class. I rarely deviate from it.
Incompletes or WPs: Do not consider 'I' or 'WP' as an option in the last weeks of the semester. Students who can not complete the work in the course on time or are seriously struggling otherwise must talk with the instructor and make arrangements at least three class weeks before the course ends.

Attendance policy: You are required to attend classes regularly. Even though there is no percentage of the grade directly assigned to attendance, you may be automatically dropped out of the class due to unjustified absences. If you miss the equivalent to 2 weeks of classes, you may fail the course. You are responsible to keep track of your absences and tardies ( 3 tardies equals 1 unjustified absence). Also, pop quizzes are possible. Pop quizzes are not announced in advance. If you don't show up the day of the pop quiz, you simply miss that grade, unless you justify your absence with proper documentation (doctors' notice, hospital prescription, NGU authorized personnel letter, or similar documents). You're responsible for anything that happens in class, even if you are absent ("I was not here last class" or something similar is not an excuse)
