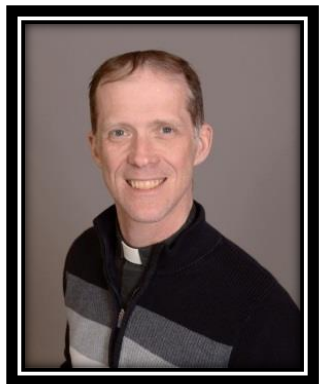

Avoiding the Broad Brush this Holiday Season *With Pastor Eric*

I used to put together plastic models of all kinds – planes, dinosaurs, tanks, space ships...- you name it. Model building was almost as fun as Legos and became one activity that I shared with my parents. My father trimmed the pieces and laid out the parts and I helped him glue those pieces together. He applied the glue and I held the

pieces together and blew on them with a steady stream of air. My mother was the painter. She asked me what color things should be and I would look at the picture on the box. At some point, I got to glue pieces myself and paint the models. I discovered the hard way that the key to success in gluing and painting was the motto “*a little dab will do you!*” I did glue my fingers together and ruin some clothes in the process, but more devastating was when I mangled the model. I cried for hours when my first model went from fighter plane to a red and purple mess, as if it crash-landed in the middle of a fashion show. I remember my mother telling me not to use such a broad brush because each part of the plane is unique and requires my careful attention. My father simply purchased a large can of turpentine and had some ready along with a box of q-tips rather than a glue brush.

When it comes to applying the Bible and its principles, directives and guidance we might apply the same broad brush without considering the complexities of life. I believe that grace demands that we listen and consider other’s stories and situations before we make decisions and take steps. I am still frazzled by the parables of the workers in the vineyard in which the owner paid everyone the same daily wage from those who worked all day to those who only worked one hour (Rd Matthew 20:1-16) If that parable is not difficult enough, then I remember the parable of the prodigal son! The youngest son squandered everything while the eldest son worked hard and did what he was told and yet the father loved them both the same and wanted to celebrate the youngest son’s return home! (Rd Luke 15:11-32) This





behavior vexes my sense of fairness from time to time and then I remember this story.

There's a play by Timothy Thompson based on this parable in which he depicts two brothers vying for work. John is strong and capable; Philip is just as willing but has lost a hand in an accident. When the landowner comes, John is taken in the first wave of workers, and as he labors in the field he looks up the lane for some sign of Philip. Other workers are brought to the field, but Philip is not among them. John is grateful to have the work but feels empty knowing that Philip is just as needful as he. Finally, the last group of workers arrive, and Philip is among them. John is relieved to know that Philip will get to work at least one hour. But, as the drama unfolds, and those who came last get paid a full day's wages, John rejoices, knowing that Philip – his brother – will have the money necessary to feed his family. When it comes his turn to stand before the landowner and receive his pay, instead of complaining as the others, John throws out his hand and says with tears in his eyes, "Thank you, my lord, for what you've done for us today!"

My struggles come with the sweep of the broad brush while God takes a loving and caring look at each person and each situation and covers it with grace in ways that I might never know especially if I don't ask, or at least consider. Entering into the holiday season of 2020 brings with it challenges to our sense of fairness and most likely some unreasonable expectations of both people and events? Let's try not to paint it with a broad brush but realize that this year is different for all of us and pay more attention to the details of God's love and grace at work.

Let us pray. Heavenly Father, who entered into my life at the beginning and took up residence at baptism in my heart, shower me and fill me with grace that leads to thankfulness and to generosity, so that each person might be blessed through me with your attentive love and care especially when it might not seem fair, or right, on the surface to others. Help my heart to know and act in grace always, in Jesus's name I pray. Amen
