August 9, 2020 Nineteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time Mt 14:22-33

Dear St. Pius X and St/ Anthony Church,

Sometimes God comes to us in the thunder of night (Psalm 18:13 'The LORD thundered from heaven, And the Most High uttered His voice'), Sometimes God comes to us in the gentle breeze of the day (Genesis 3:8 'they heard the sound of the LORD God walking about in the garden at the *breezy time* of the day). Our first reading today tells how Elijah heard a stormy wind, but did not hear God. Then Elijah heard an earthquake, but did not hear God. Then Elijah heard a raging fire, but did not hear God. And then finally, Elijah heard a 'whispering sound' and it was God's voice (1 Kgs 19:12)! God is our 'human whisperer'! I wonder if that whispering sound is like sound of cola fizz, or the buzz of a fly, or the hum of my tinnitus? But Elijah knew that it was God speaking to him at the entrance of the cave on the mountain. I've only been deep in a cave once in my life, but it was a remarkable experience. I was with a youth group doing a community clean-up day in the park and afterward we were given a cave tour. We are on what they call the 'Frozen Niagara' Tour of Mammoth Cave, KY. When we were down in the cave's belly, the guide turned out the lights. She told our group to be really quiet to experience the complete darkness and to hear the constant draft of wind that passes through the tunnel. It was a powerful experience to know that when our sight went dark, our other senses of sound and touch came online stronger (as you heard the gentle breeze, you also could feel it on your skin!). If we can tune down all the other noise in our life, what more might we hear and feel? What a lesson in tuning our ears finely to hear the voice of God. God may broadcast loudly at times, but most likely God will be speaking to us in subtle sounds and sensations.

Psalm 46:10-11 tells us to "Be still, and know that I am God". At the Transfiguration of Jesus, God the Father spoke to the apostles, saying, ""This is my dearly loved Son, who brings me great joy. Listen to him" (Matt 17:5). And Jesus, our Good Shepherd, teaches us that His 'sheep follow Him, because they recognize His voice" (John 10:4). We see this in the gospel today as Jesus goes to the apostles in their troubles as they begin to be tossed in their boat on the sea. Jesus was anticipating their trouble, and he was approaching them. Surprisingly, they become more anxious (terrified?) by His sudden appearance walking on the water. But Jesus tries to soothe them, "It is I; do not be afraid" (Matthew 14:27). That is not enough for Peter. In his own 'Doubting Thomas episode', he challenges Jesus to give him the ability to walk on the water and physically go to Jesus' side. Of course, Jesus does grant it to Peter, but Peter takes his eyes off Jesus too quickly and begins to sink. In Peter's defense, though, he knows well enough to call out for help. Of course, Jesus saves. Matthew 14:31 says Jesus stretched out his hand 'immediately'. Jesus is not going to unnecessarily endanger His own. Taking Peter's hand, Jesus and Peter get into the boat and the wind dies down. To which Jesus sternly (Did they step into the back of the boat?) challenges them all, "O you of little faith, why did you doubt?" (Matt 14:32-33). Of course afterward, they offer a confession of faith, "Truly, you are the Son of God". What was the 'breaking point' that inspired their conviction? The sight of Jesus walking on water? The miracle of Peter receiving 'water-walking abilities? The saving of Peter from drowning in the depths? Or the calming of winds, after Jesus steps into the apostles' boat? I think Jesus was teaching us that in the boat with him or out of the boat, during a storm or after a storm, or when we visibly see Him or cannot see Him at all, our faith-trust in Him will carry us. Jesus, the Shepherd, takes care of His sheep. Or as the music group Of Monsters and Men say in their song, "Little Talks", Jesus is the "ship that will carry our bodies safe to shore", though I add "our souls", too! Our Blessed Assurance!

Another Saint in a Time of Plague: St. Francis of Assisi (born 1181 died 10-4-1226)

Yes, St. Francis of Assisi is claimed as the patron saint for many causes (animals, ecology, poets, etc), but he is also invoked by those suffering in 'hotspots' of contagious disease, or local epidemics such as leprosy. This stems from his conversion experience one day with a leper along the road. Francis had had great fear of contagious illness and felt disgust at the wounds of lepers until God touched him most powerfully through as leper one day. Francis was riding along one day and encountered a begging leper at the roadside. He felt compelled to dismount his horse, and he embraced and kissed the leper. The leper had opened his hand to ask for alms, and Francis not only gave him money but also affirmed the leper's dignity by kissing his skin. After a brief conversation, Francis continued on the road and when he looked back, he could not see the leper anywhere. He was convinced then, that he had met Christ disguised as the poor wounded leper. So continued Francis' conversion to a life of service and loving care of the poor and sick. In his Testament, Francis wrote, "When I was in sin, the sight of lepers nauseated me beyond measure; but then God himself led me into their company, and I had pity on them. When I became acquainted with them, what had previously nauseated me became the source of spiritual and physical consolation for me." He kept active in ministering to lepers among a colony of lepers two miles south of Assisi, outside the city walls. Francis and several friars lived among them, serving them by tending to their wounds and feeding them. Francis had so closely identified with the wounded lepers, that later in life he received the stigmata wounds of Christ in his body due to his deep meditation on the Passion of Christ. Francis always gave hope and comfort to the sick.

Francis was born into a wealthy family of cloth merchants. He was very privileged and had a lively 'troubadour' youth of festive excess. Seeking glory as a soldier, he joined a band of soldiers to serve a local Prince but was injured and captured by an enemy. He was a prisoner for a year until his father ransomed him. This period began his turning to God and eternal matters. He started having visions and feeling God's pull upon his life's direction. Once when he was passing a dilapidated church at San Damiano, a beautiful crucifix caught his eye, and he heard Jesus' voice tell him, "Rebuild my church." Francis began a physical renovation of the chapel, but then realized Jesus was actually calling him to reform the whole church by a new way of life preaching the gospel. So began the Franciscan way of preaching the gospel through poverty, service and humble love of all neighbors. Francis surrendered all of his father's money and any claim to family wealth. He took off fine silk clothes forever and put on a hairshirt and simple burlap to live poorly and simply as Jesus did. Many stories tell of his creative ways of preaching the gospel and ministering to people in need using whatever means available. He was always joyful and known to sing even in the worst of deprivations or sacrifices, as if the harder a time he had of it, the happier he was to serve. The simplest summary of his Rule of Life was to follow the teaching of Jesus, and to walk in Christ's footsteps. If Jesus lived among the poor, then Francis would too. If Jesus was always with the sick, then Francis would be too! It is said that he died joyfully singing Psalm 141. He was declared a saint by the Church after only two years following his death. St. Francis, patron saint of the sick and of true joy, pray for us!
