April 19, 2020 Divine Mercy Sunday Jn 20:19-31

Dear St. Pius X and St. Anthony Church,

Happy Easter, still! It is the season of resurrection for another six weeks! The second Sunday of Easter was designated an additional Feast in the church calendar by St John Paul II to be called Divine Mercy Sunday. He shared with his fellow Polish citizen St Faustina Kowalski a deep devotion to Divine Mercy, so in addition to canonizing her, he also dedicated this day to the Mercy of God. Of course, this outpouring of Mercy began on Good Friday when Jesus' side was pierced making blood and water flow out, to mark the birth of our being washed of sin and transfused by Christ' blood. His passion is our redemption! There are too many passages of scripture that depict God's Steadfast Mercy to quote all, but we see the pre-eminent one in today's gospel. The pain and suffering of terrible abuse is still felt & shown in Jesus' body, as he appears to the apostles. In this first time without Thomas present, (and then following in the 2nd time when he returns for Thomas), the first word from His lips is "Peace!'. Peace, is His word. Jesus gives us peace, not a dressing down or scolding. He doesn't say, 'Have you got it coming, now', nor does He say 'Do you know what you put me through?'. Nothing condemnatory at all comes from His mouth, but simply 'PEACE'! That is a compassionate Savior who embodies faithful forgiveness. And thanks be to God for Him! What a dramatic return! Did we know just how patient a Savior we had? Imagine that even when Jesus accomplishes such a 'returning entrance' appearing to the apostles, they weren't all there! So, our patient Savior has to appear again making a 'call-back'. A week later (now all there) Jesus patiently repeats His Gift of Peace and the presentation of His resurrected Self to them.

Jesus comes through (literally the locked door!) again to provide not only the demonstration of His really resurrected body as a vindication of God's authority even over death now. But, Jesus also appears to reconstitute the previously divided and scattered apostles. Following Jesus' rising from the dead (and His later ascension in glory to the Father), the apostles will be shifting into 'holy drive' to take up, full-on, the mission of the Kingdom animated by the Holy Spirit given at Pentecost. But not to get too far ahead of this story, we do see the first portion of that Gift of God's spirit today. Jesus gives 1) 'peace', 2) the breath of the Holy Spirit and 3) the commission to liberate those bound in sin and to bind up with grace the broken ones who are wandering lost without an anchoring faith (John 20:21-23).

Thomas is such an interesting character. Sometimes we all have different reactions to scripture readings, or they stir particular memoires or different emotions in each of us. I encourage you to read this account slowly, noting details and ask why those details are significant. A big question I have is that 'Since Thomas wasn't with the others, where exactly was he and what was he doing wherever he was?" It wouldn't seem to be the best time right after Jesus' traumatic torture and death, to be out in the city wandering around alone. Some have suggested that Thomas was Judas' one-time partner in the 'buddy system' established by Jesus (sent them out 2x2- Mark 6:7) Yet, 'Inquiring minds want to know'! Maybe the journalist or scientist part in Thomas wanted to explore and find out things for himself. Maybe he was out scouting the Jerusalem streets to find out if the authorities had further ideas on handling the rest of Jesus' group. But regardless, Jesus always meets us where we are. Though Thomas had set the 'believing' bar high, by demanding to touch and probe the physical wounds of Jesus, in fact, Thomas ends up believing without touching Jesus. The mere appearance of Jesus and His spoken invitation to Thomas leads Thomas to deep belief. The scripture does not say anything about Thomas actually following through with a forensic exam of Jesus lacerated body. And Thomas, among all the apostles, gives the most definitive and declarative identification of Jesus as Divine Messiah, when he states "My Lord and My God" (John 20:28). Peter had come close earlier calling Jesus, "the Messiah, the Son of the living God" (Matthew 16:16). Yet Thomas' confession goes further identifying Jesus as true living God, 'God from God-Light from Light', as we profess in the Nicene Creed every Sunday. Also, I hope everyone is aware of the older tradition of prayer and worship offered at the consecration of Mass that was taught through the Baltimore Catechism lessons given by our teaching sisters. This acclamation 'My Lord and My God' is to be offered as an internal heart prayer at every mass during the consecration as the host and chalice are elevated, the very presence of Christ in Body & Blood. That is a recognition, like Thomas', that we see and encounter the very flesh and blood of Jesus' presence. He is really alive and really present in the Sacrament of Holy Eucharist that He initiated at the Last Supper! I love how Jesus notes that only a few people (out of how many believing Christians over how many years from His ascension until now), only a few will experience/see Him walking around after his resurrection until His Ascension to the Father's glory. So He adds this commendation to believers who do not demand physical, touching proof. Jesus says in John 20:29 "Blessed are those who have not seen and have believed." That includes all of us on this side of history after His resurrection/ascension. So in faith, and by His inviting word, Jesus comes to us in the weekly celebrating of His sacramental presence. We will hear some wonderful readings about Jesus appearing in the 'breaking of the bread' from Luke's gospel in this Easter season (Luke 24:35). What a gift the Holy Eucharist is! I still keep hearing what Jesus said back on Holy Thursday, too, "If you understand this, blessed are you if you do it" (John 13: 17).

Another Saint for a Time of Plague: Saint Sebastian (c. AD 256 – 288)

St. Sebastian was an early Christian saint and martyr, who served in Roman military and government, until being discovered a 'covert Christian'. He is claimed to have suffered 'two martyrdoms'! According to an account reportedly recorded by St Ambrose, Sebastian was killed during the Roman emperor Diocletian's persecution of Christians. He was initially tied to a post and shot full with arrows as target practice for the archers, and left dead to be buried. He was rescued and healed by Saint Irene (a widow of another Roman Christian Sebastian had helped save but was eventually martyred). After St. Sebastian recovered, he went to the palace and knowing the emperor's movements, he waited by a staircase that the Emperor Diocletian frequented. He shouted warnings for him to repent of his unjust rule and sins, and though surprised, the Emperor then had Sebastian beaten to death with clubs and thrown into the sewer.

Though little is known of his childhood and family, in 283, Sebastian entered the army in Rome under Emperor Carinus to assist the Christian martyrs. Because of his courage he became one of the captains of the Praetorian Guards under Diocletian and Maximian, who were unaware that he was a Christian. Sebastian witnessed prudently to others serving in the Roman government and gave hope and strengthened all of the Christians jailed and persecuted in the penal system. He was known to convert many in his interactions through personal testimony. He once even inspired a jailer and other guards to release Christians from prison and encouraging them to flee to the mountains, repenting for their crimes against humanity. Yet, eventually, Diocletian discovered Sebastian's Christian faith and work, and declared that he be executed in 288.

St. Sebastian's association with divine interventions during times of plague stemmed from his care/treatment of prisoners who may have suffered cycles of disease in the poor, unsanitary conditions of Roman jails. Also, throughout the middle ages, he was frequently invoked for prayer/protection during episodic bouts of plague in Europe. His intercession was often credited in the recovery and survival of victims to plague. Seeing statue representations of St Sebastian and his many arrow wounds that appeared to fester, this sight cemented his connection to those suffering from the bubonic plague of the 1300's. The arrow gashes reminded everyone of the terrible bubonic patch skin wounds. Many found strength and comfort in his prayer and intercession. His own blessed ability to rebound from destruction (underground trials and two martyrdoms) gave great hope to sufferers of the plague. St Sebastian is known as the patron saint of soldiers and athletes, and of those who are persecuted and faithfully persevere. St. Sebastian, pray for us!

St. Sebastian, who, inflamed with love of God, who withstood pains inflicted by a tyrant,

St. Sebastian, who for defending the truth was wounded by arrows, Pray for us.
St. Sebastian, who was put to death with clubs, Pray for us.
St. Sebastian, who was crowned with eternal glory, Pray for us.
St. Sebastian, endowed with power from God to avert pestilence and contagious diseases,

May you intercede for those who are weakened from the effects of disease. May their bodies be miraculously strengthened physically and spiritually, as was yours through the grace and mercy of Christ. Bless us and keep us safe in this time of history, suffering a virus plague. May we be always as strong in our faith as you so clearly have been. Amen.

Merciful Father, may the glorious intercession of Your blessed martyr Saint Sebastian be our protection. Bless us and keep us safe in this time of history, suffering a virus plague. Grant all that we humbly ask for, in these days of prayer, according to your will, through our Lord Jesus Christ your Son, Who lives and reigns with You in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. Amen.
